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## Executive Summary for 2010 Annual Report

In review of the year 2010 the success of the Lakewood Police Department Public Safety Initiative continues to provide for an increasing level of safety to our residents. We have been very vigilant about increasing our visible presence on our streets and in our community. The increased efforts are showing positive results with decreases in several felonies along with violent crimes. The work of our Uniform Patrol Division I believe has a direct impact on these crimes and improves the quality of life in Lakewood. The presence of our officers and the aggressive enforcement of our ordinances reduce the opportunity, ability, and perception of success in committing these offenses.

Our Uniform Patrol Division continues to be the front line in our service to the community. The officers in the Division have committed themselves to addressing the perceptions of safety by remaining visible in identified problem areas and increasing arrests across many levels. A substantial increase in drug related arrests by the Patrol Division belies the ever present problem with narcotics in our community and the criminal behavior that illegal narcotics fuel. The total arrests made by the Department increased by 4% in 2010. Further emphasis on drug arrests and traffic violations in 2011 are expected to contribute to a further reduction of the perception of successful criminal activity. Our goal of keeping Lakewood a safe community is supported by having no tolerance for those found breaking the law.

Our Training Division continues to do an excellent job in handling many different functions for the Department. The Lakewood Police Department stands apart from many of our contemporaries in the amount and depth of the training we undertake every year. Appropriately training police officers is one of the most important and cost effective ways to provide quality service to our citizens. The officers assigned to the Special Operations Unit continued to work effectively with the youth of our community, whether in school or on our streets and parks. The Neighborhood Police Officers have been a very visible and positive presence in the community and have done exceptional work in keeping our citizens connected to the Lakewood Police Department.





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The Investigative Division remains committed to supporting the arrests made by the Patrol Division through the investigation, processing, and presenting of the cases to the appropriate courts. The benefits of the Detectives work is seen across all the Divisions but most notably the Jail where our population has been reduced due to the Detectives ability to swiftly complete their cases and transfer felons to the County Jail. This results in our ability to maintain our costs to operate the jail to a minimum. The important work done by the Narcotics Unit is a critical component of our overall strategy to addressing crime in Lakewood. A significant portion of our criminal activity is a direct result of illegal drug use. Having a dedicated Narcotics Unit is not a luxury for our community but a necessity. I believe that if we did not target this particular problem with the directed efforts of the Narcotics Unit the quality of life in Lakewood would be directly impacted.

The Administrative Division continually provides support to all the members of the department. Dispatch, Jail, and Records all have performed professionally in the execution of their duties. The Dispatchers and Records Clerks are sometimes the first point of contact for citizens and their professional demeanor and response sets the tone for positive interactions with the public. Increased coverage issues for the Dispatchers due to some personnel situations were handled professionally by all involved. A decrease in staffing of the Record Room also resulted in additional duties and responsibilities for the clerks which were handled in an exemplary manner.

The Animal Control Unit added two new members. These new officers were given basic and advanced training for their positions and have performed admirably in their new positions. The functions of administratively handling parking tickets were incorporated into the Lakewood Police Department from the Municipal Court of Lakewood. After an initial learning period the collection of fines from citations has improved and will continue to be an asset to the city in the future. The Parking Enforcement Officers have embraced the new technology of electronic ticket writers and are more efficient in the performance of their duties.

Included in this report are charts and graphs that track some of our important functions, responsibilities, and efforts during 2010 and are compared to prior years. This report gives an accurate view of the efforts of the Lakewood Police Department in keeping Lakewood a safe community. We will continue to face challenges due to the economic predicament the future State of Ohio budget puts us in. Whatever changes the future may hold for the Lakewood Police Department I am confident that each and every one of us will remain dedicated to our profession and service to the citizens of Lakewood.

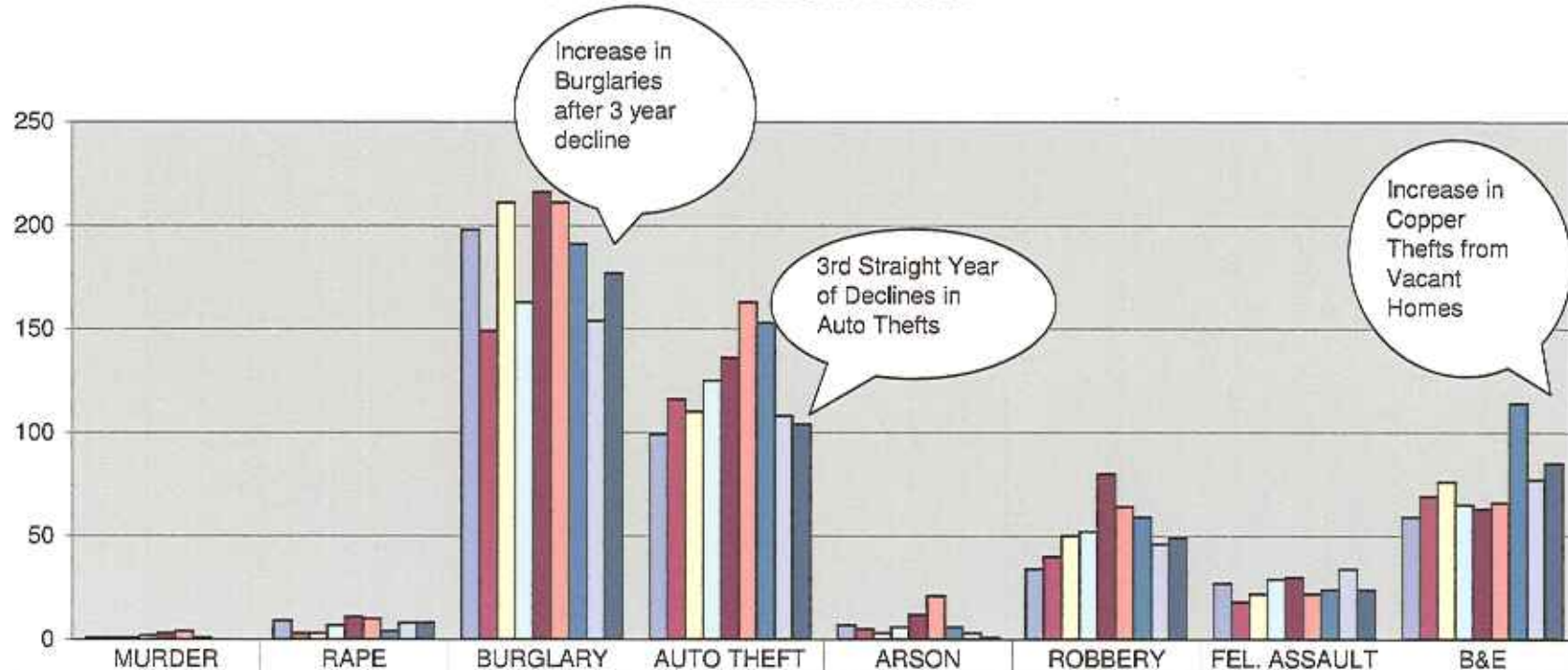

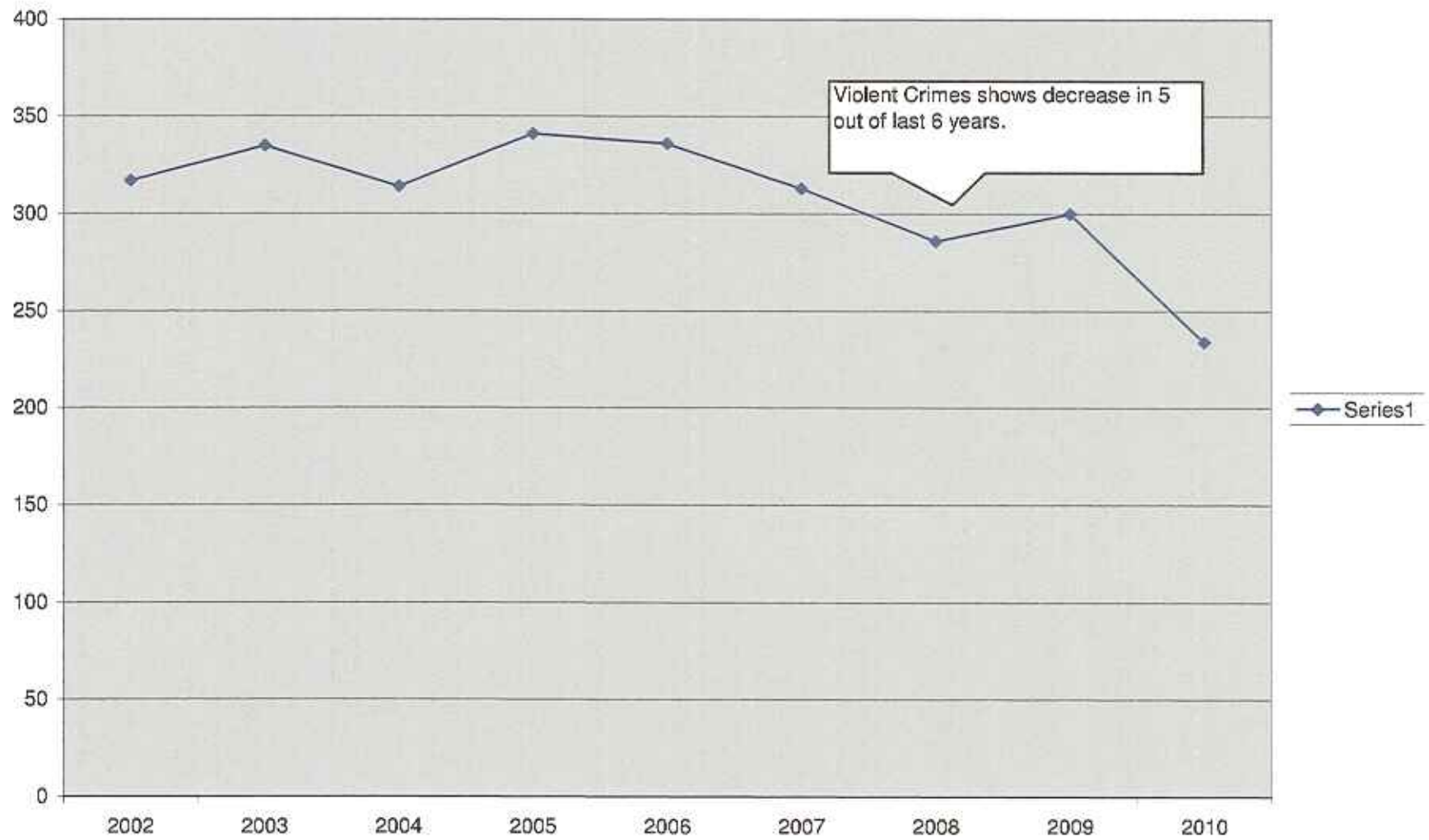

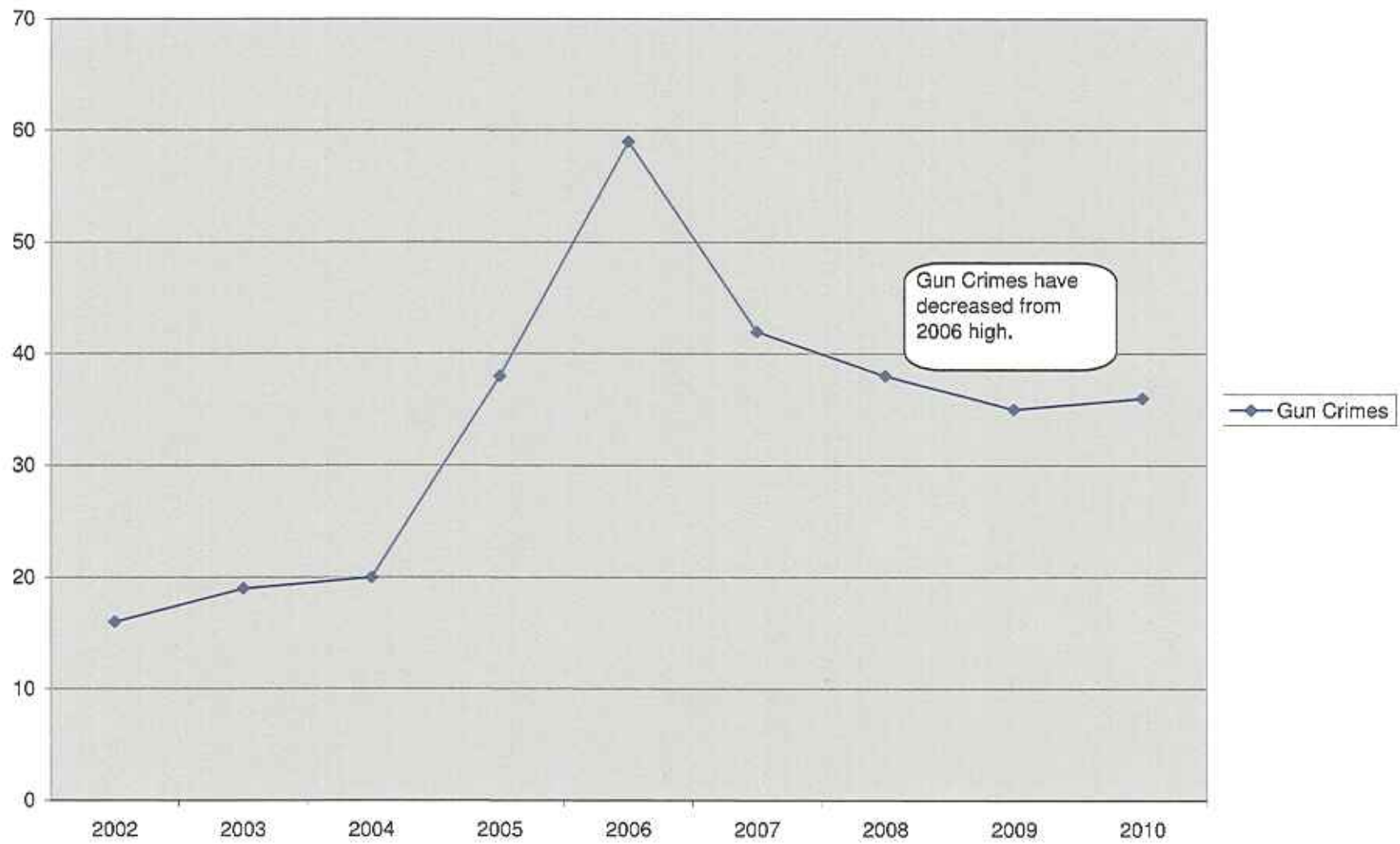

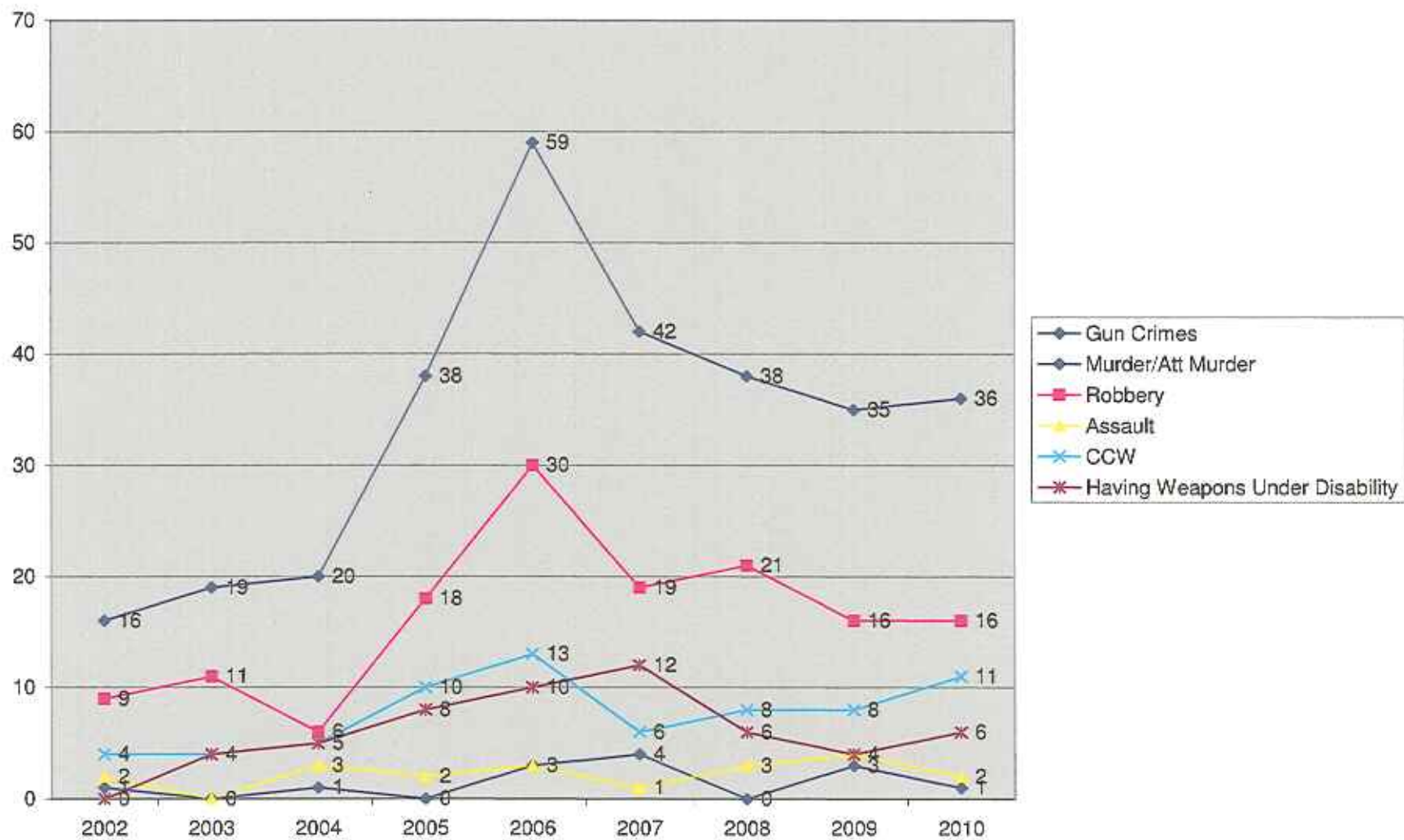
Violent Crime Percentage



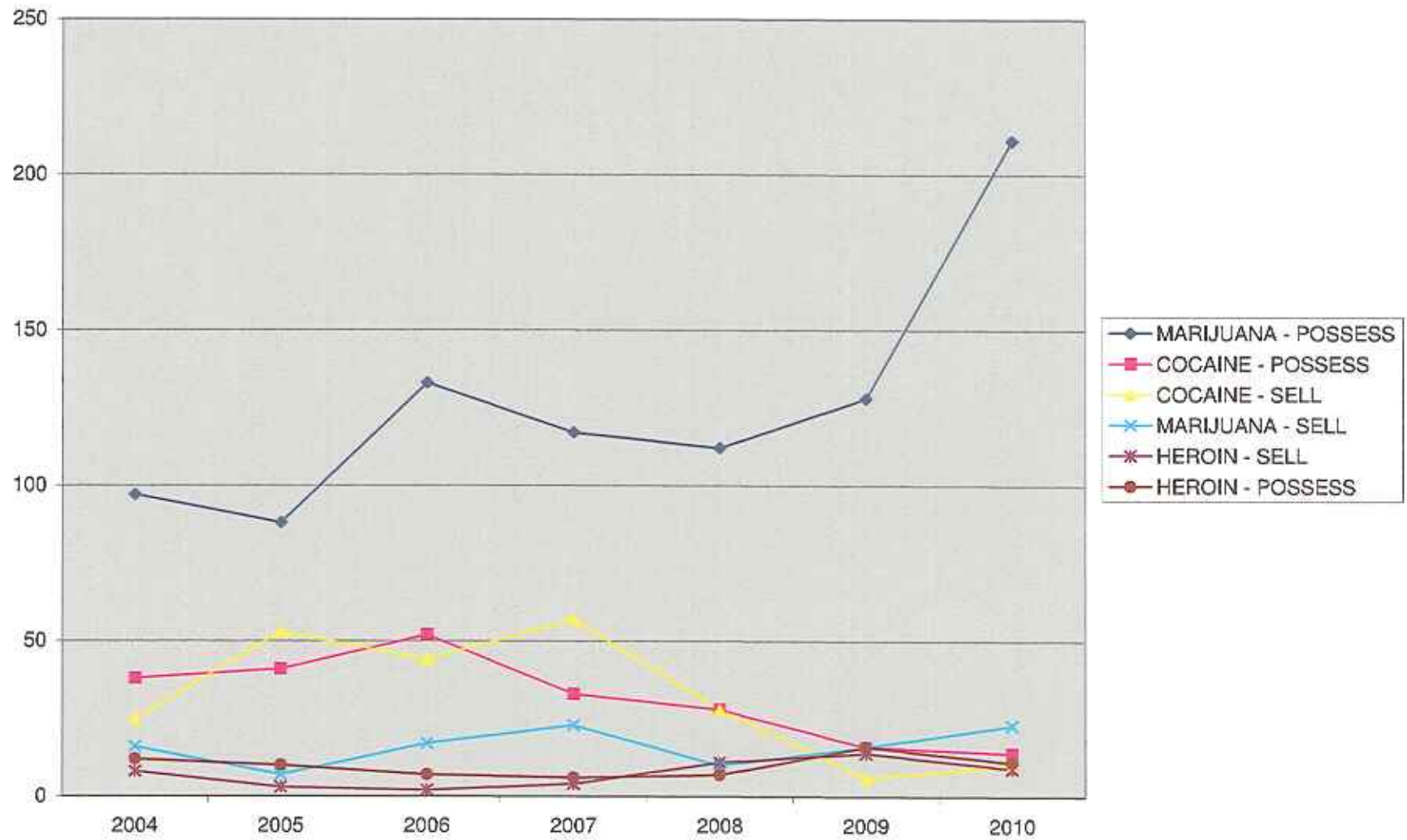

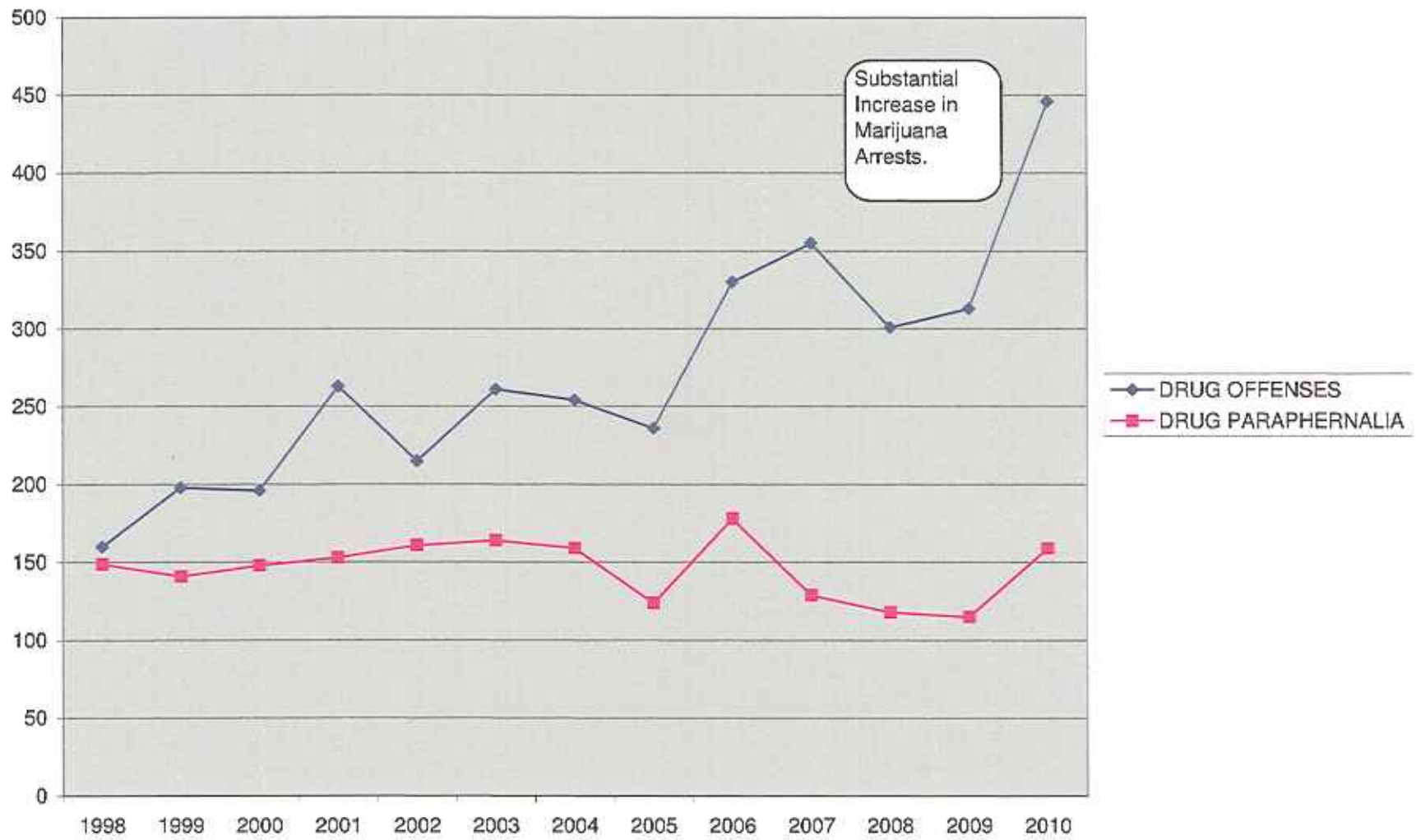

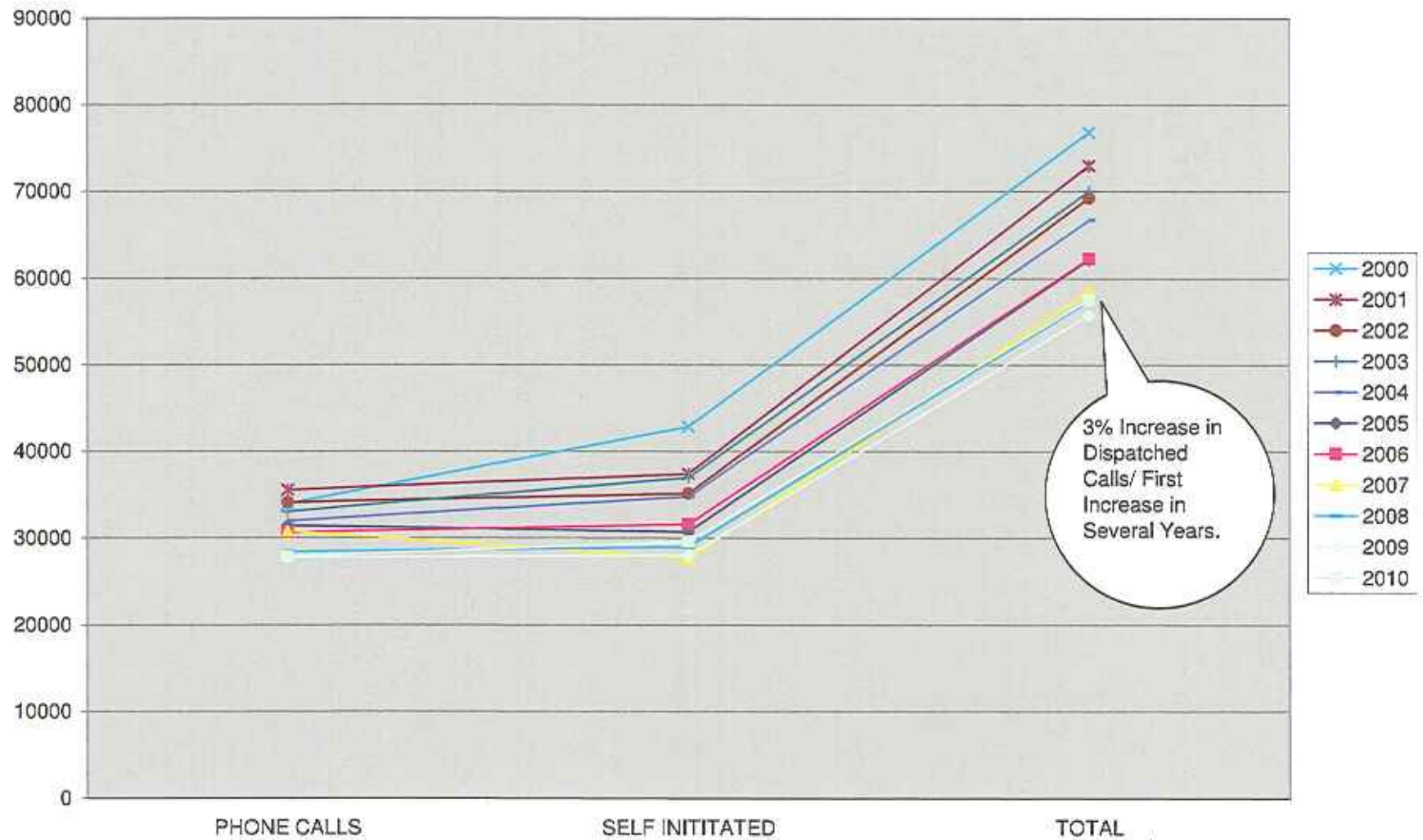
Major Drug Comparison



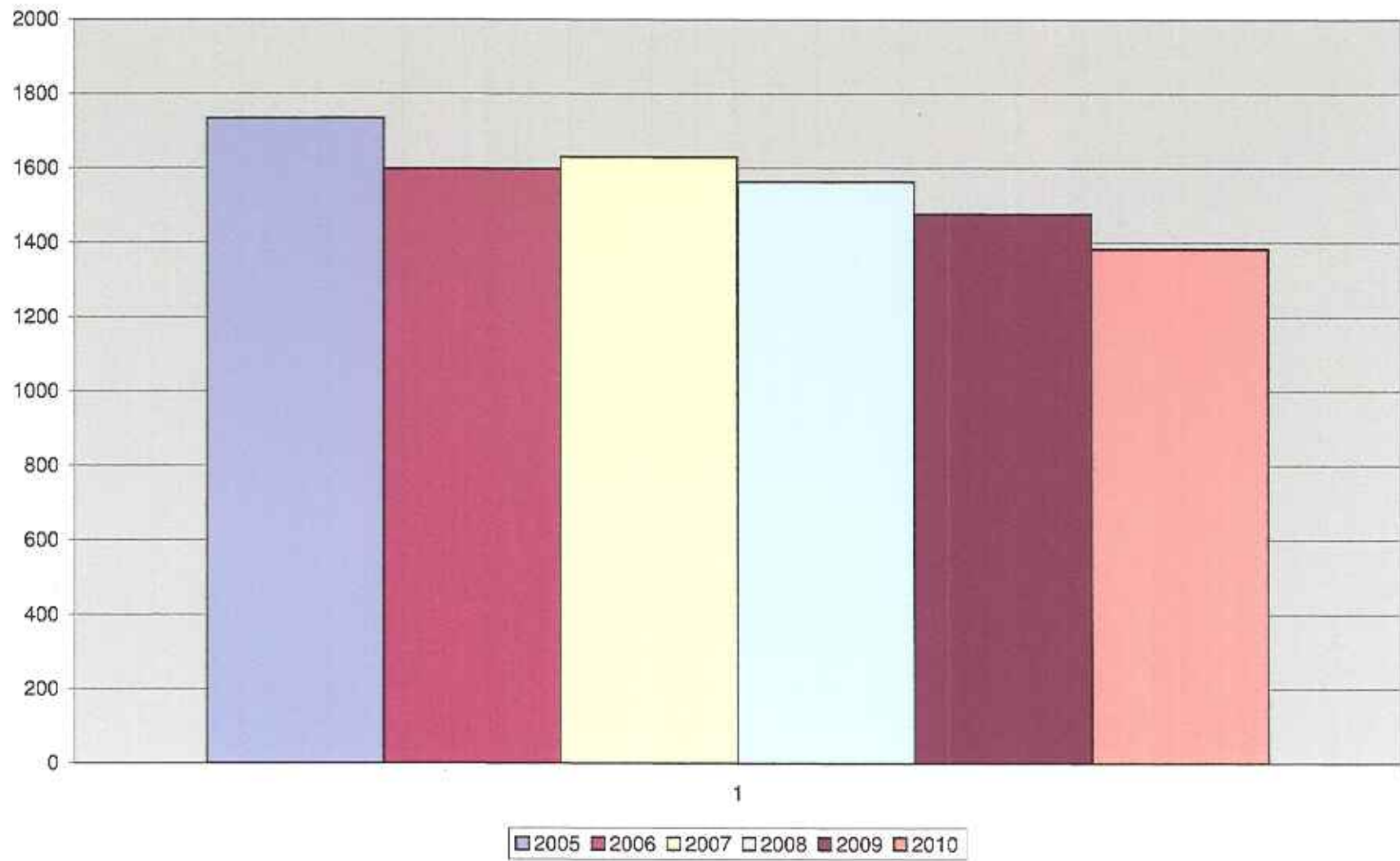

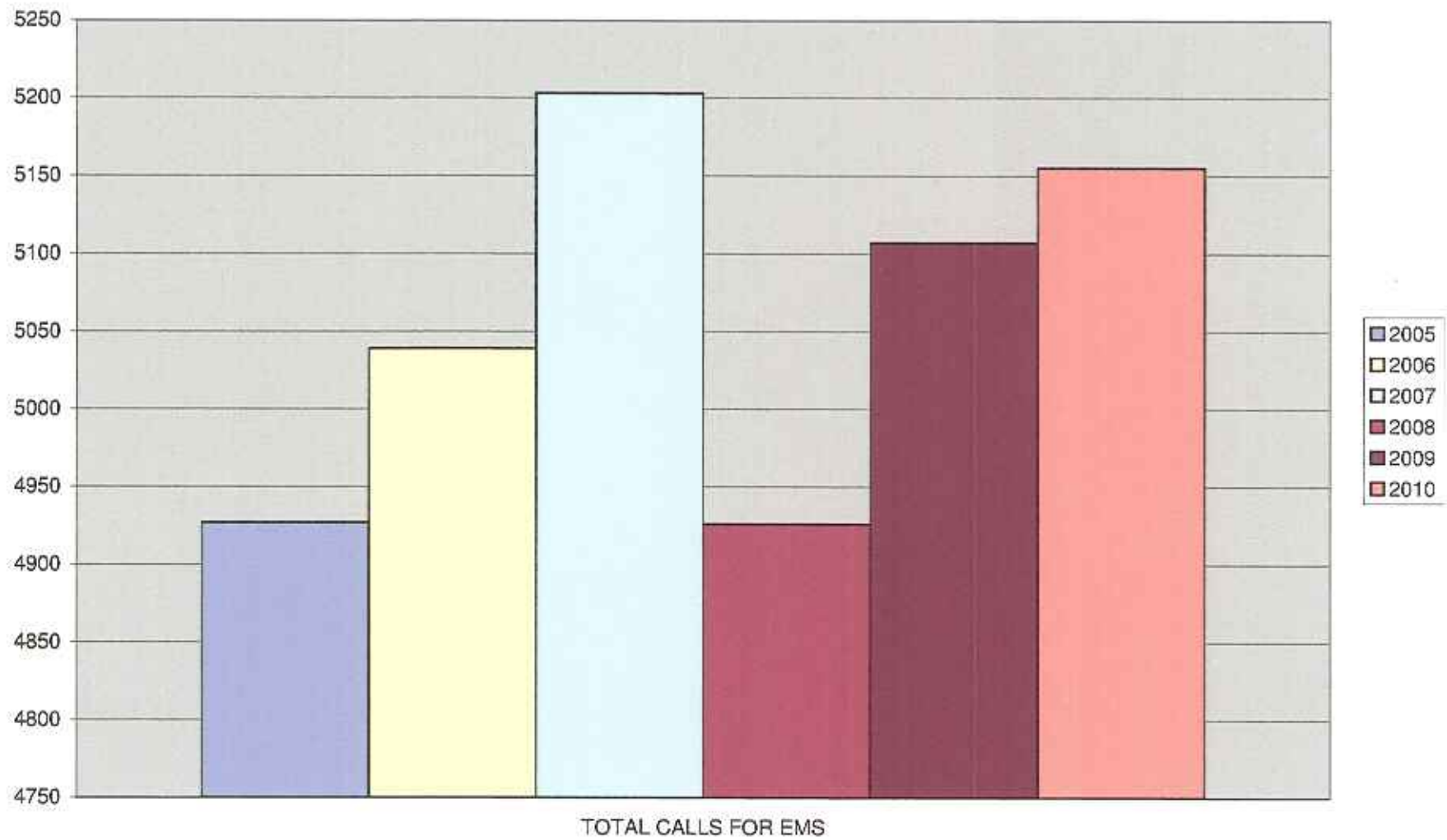

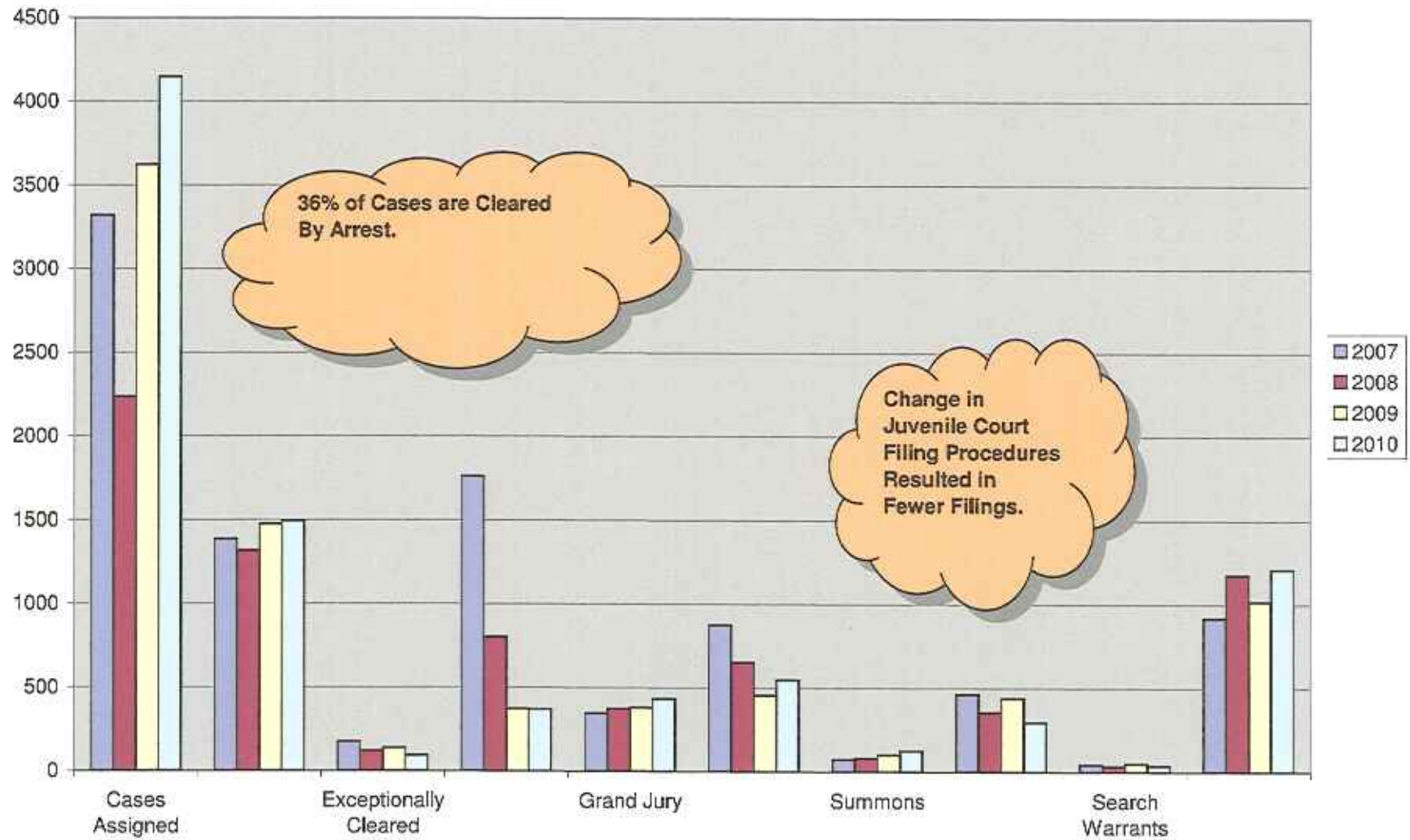

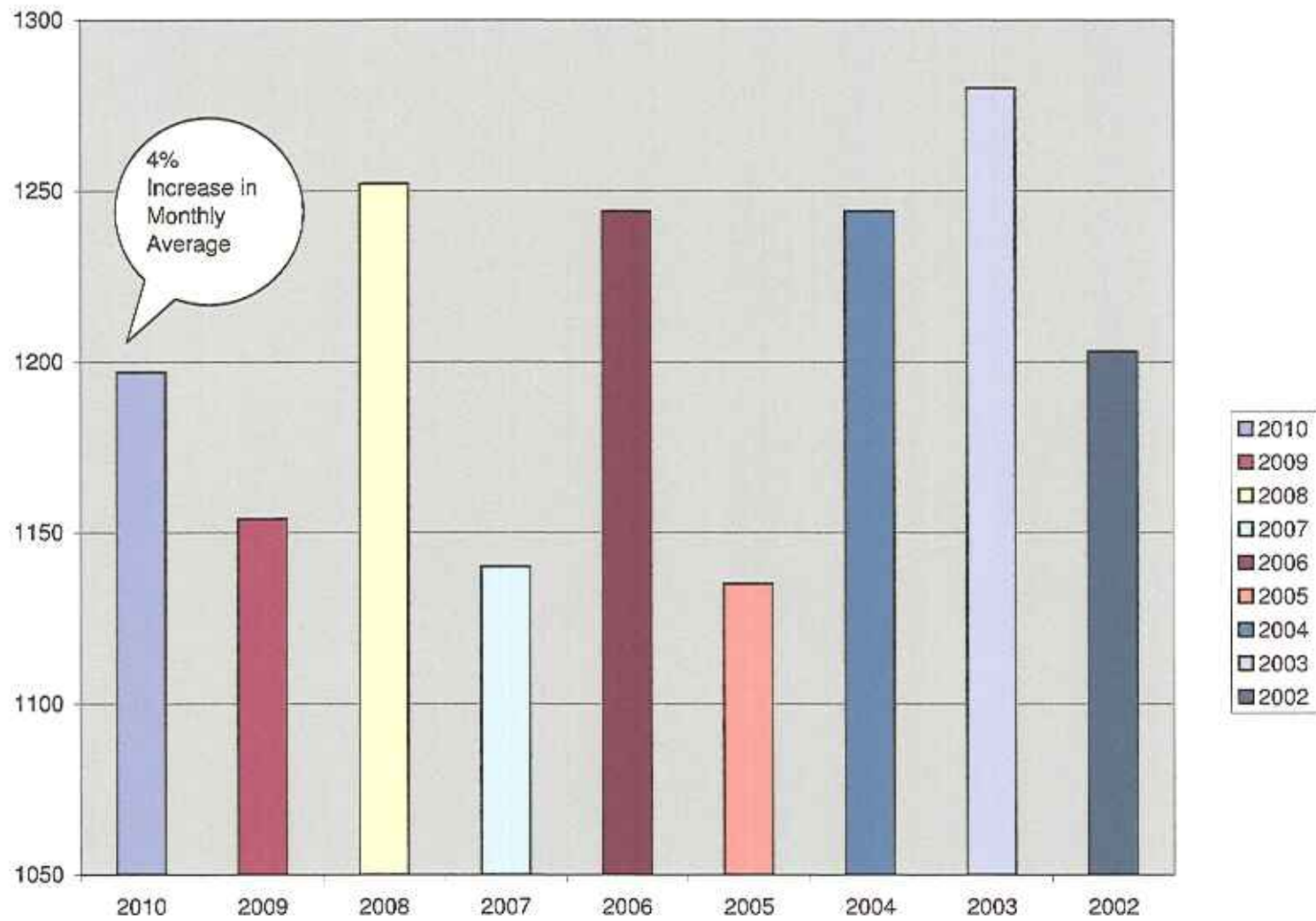

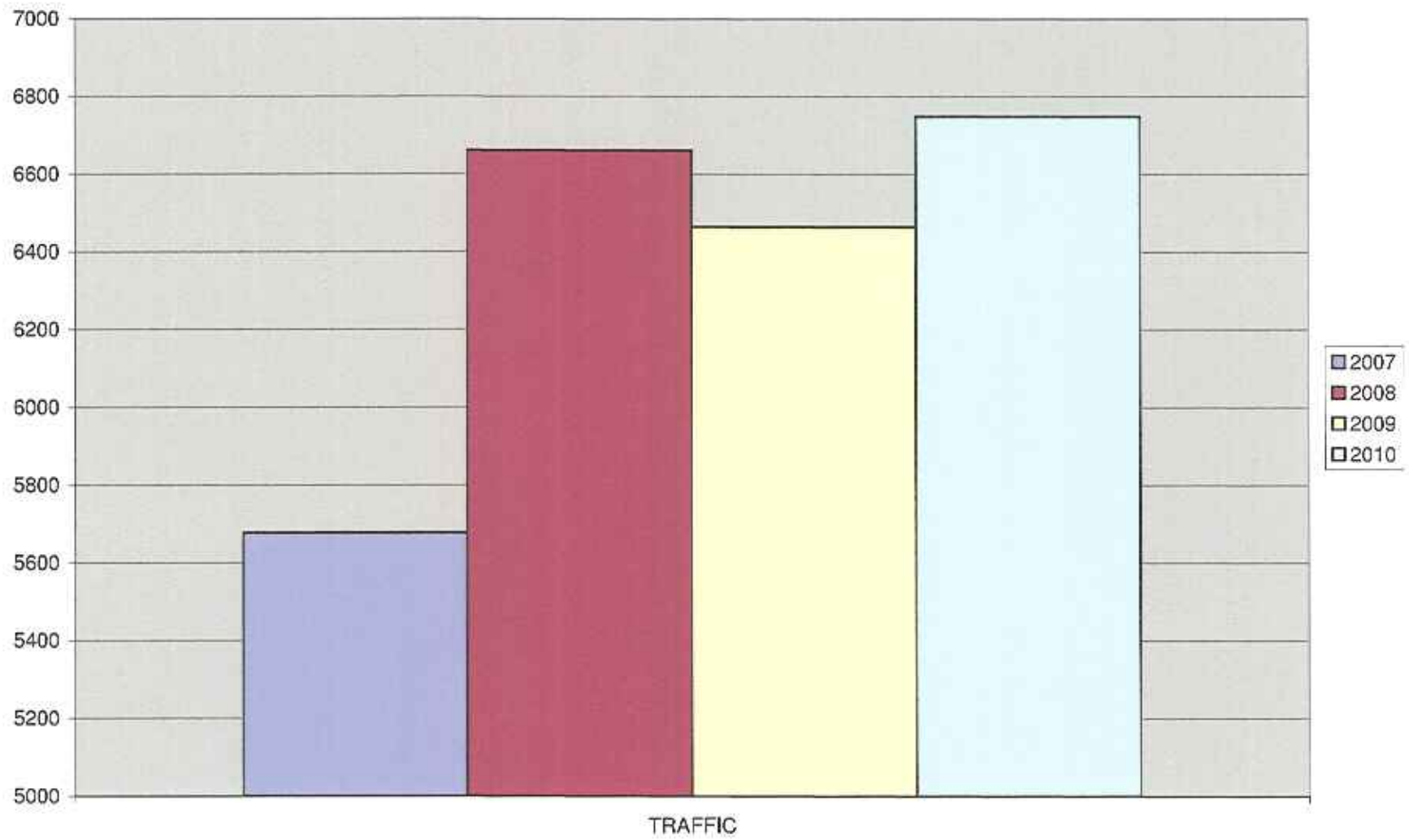

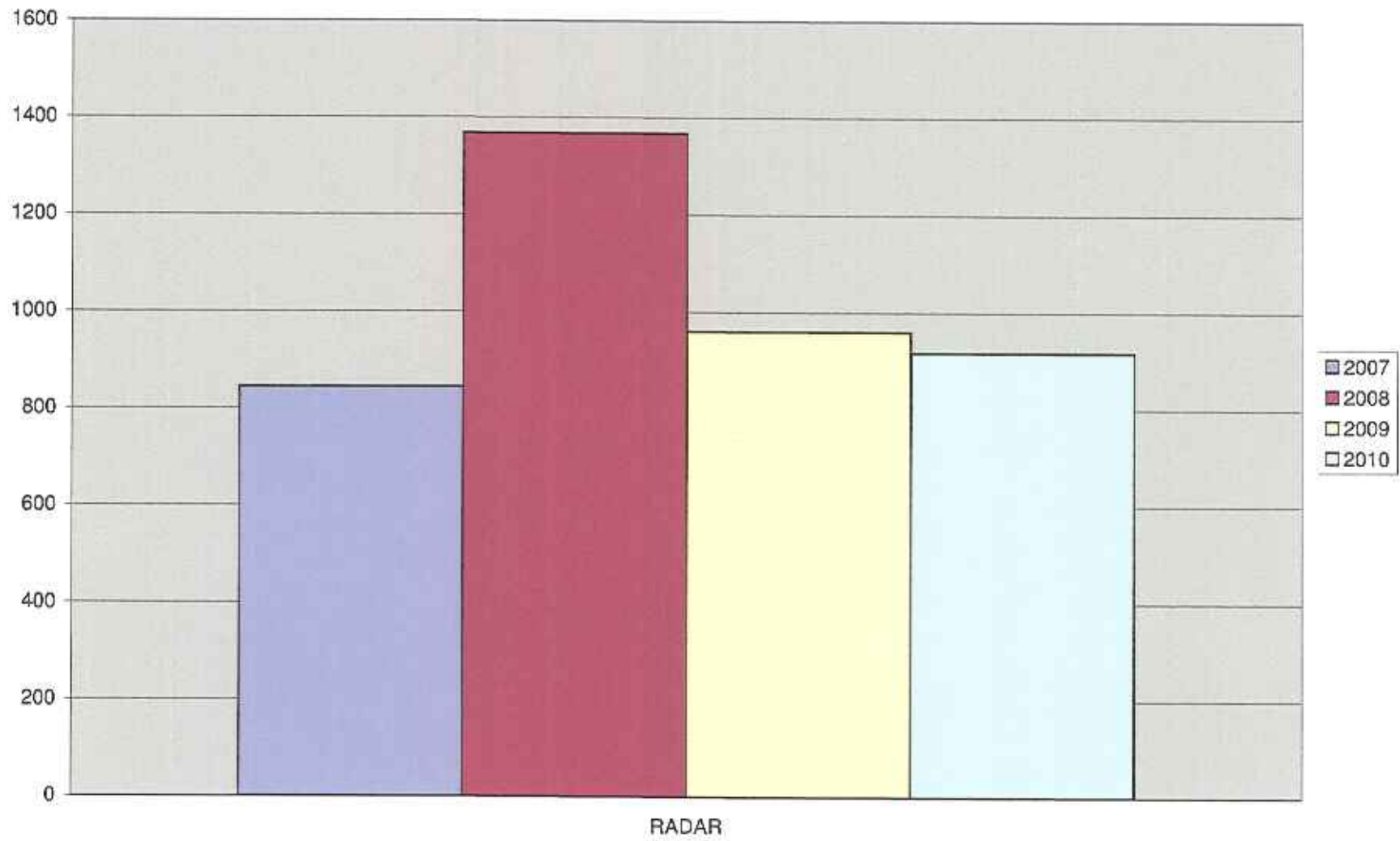
Average Arrests Per Month



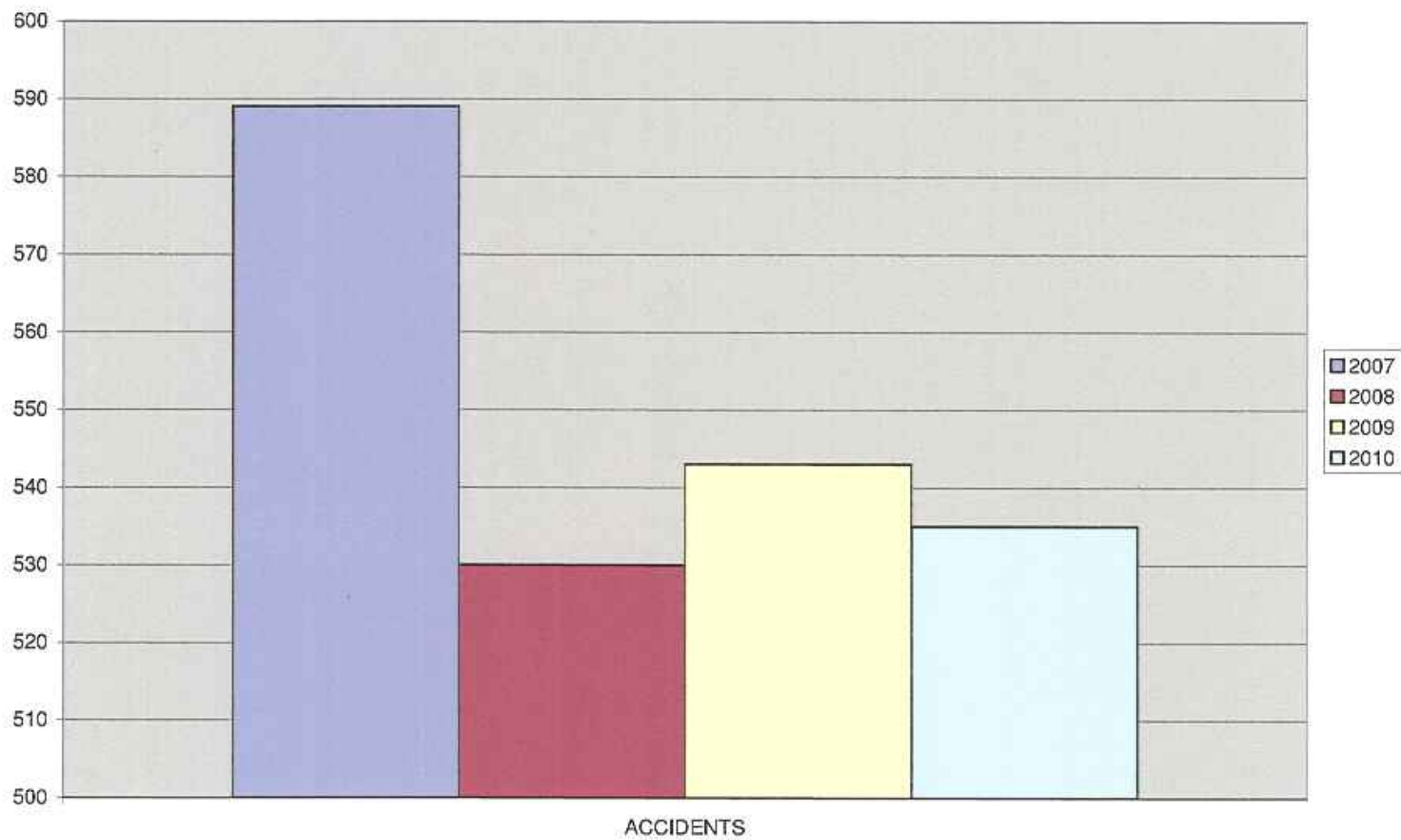

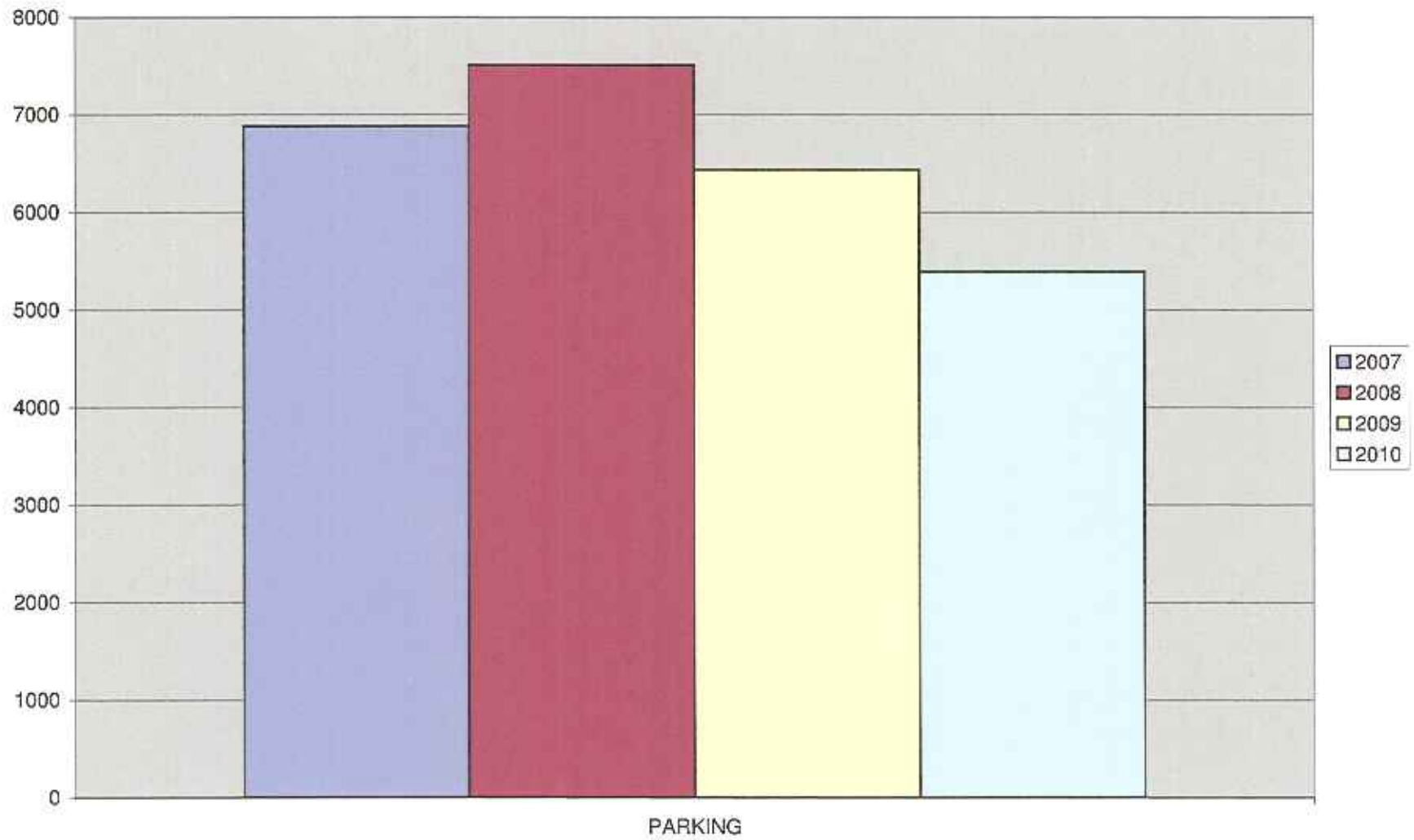
### RADAR 4 YEAR TOTALS



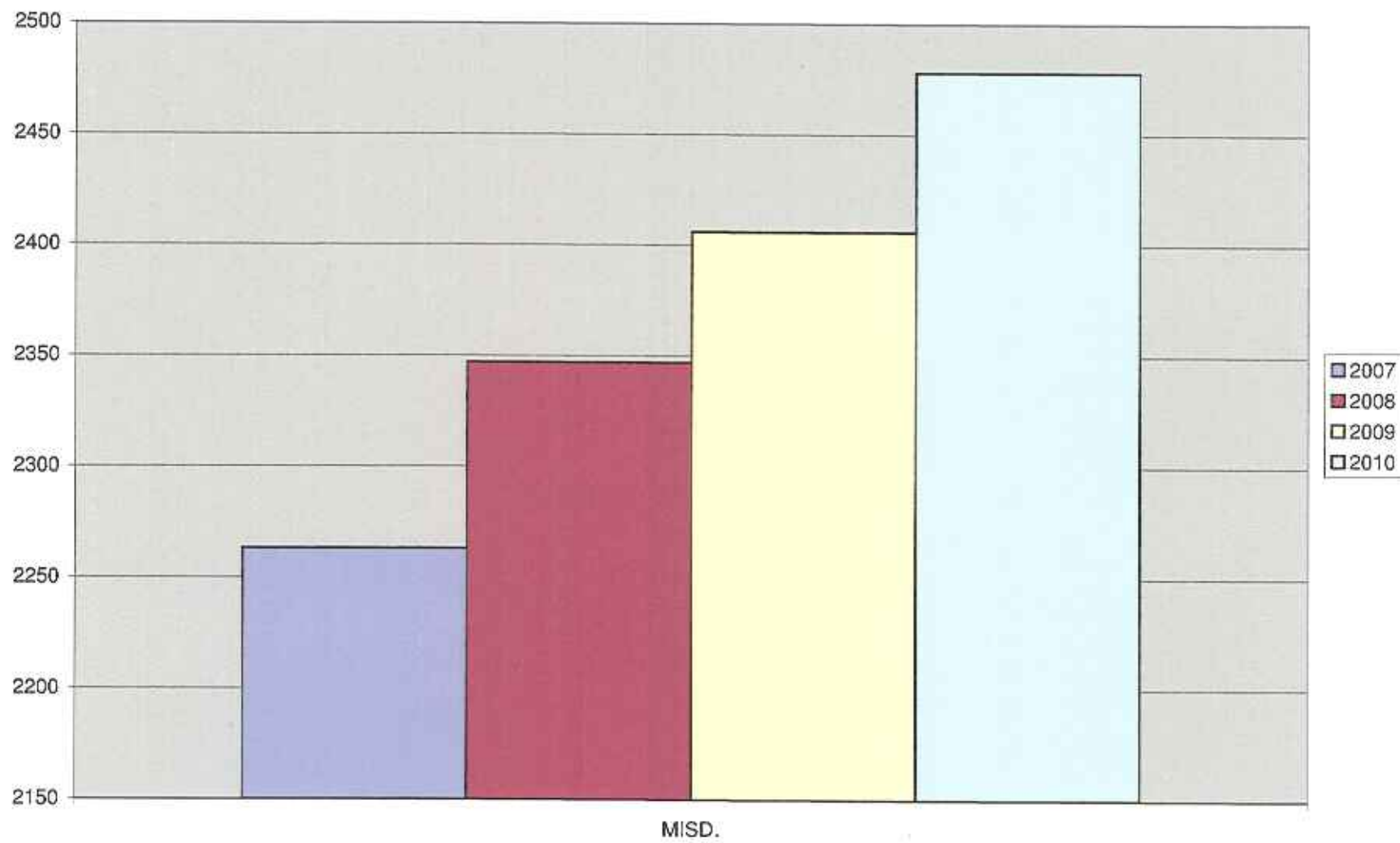

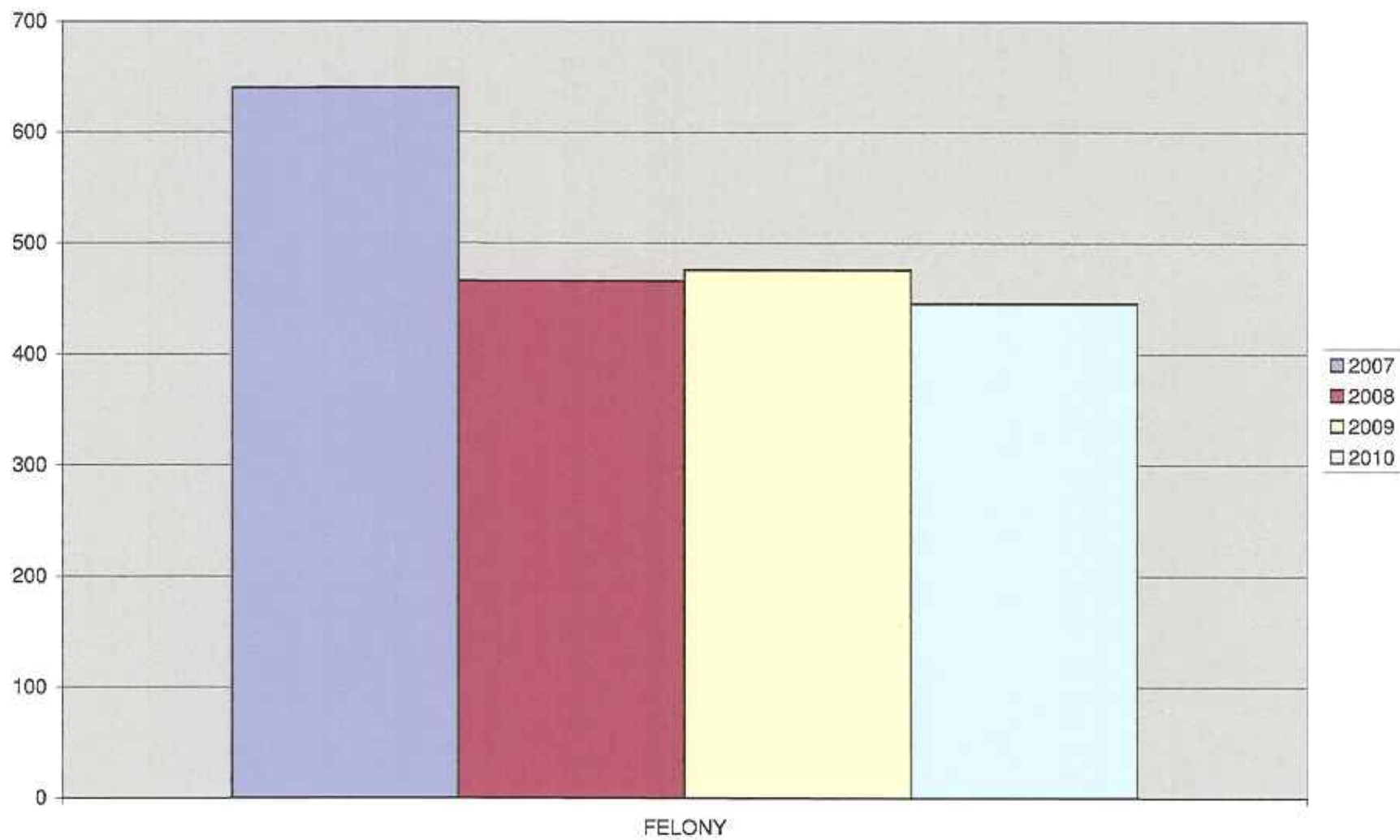

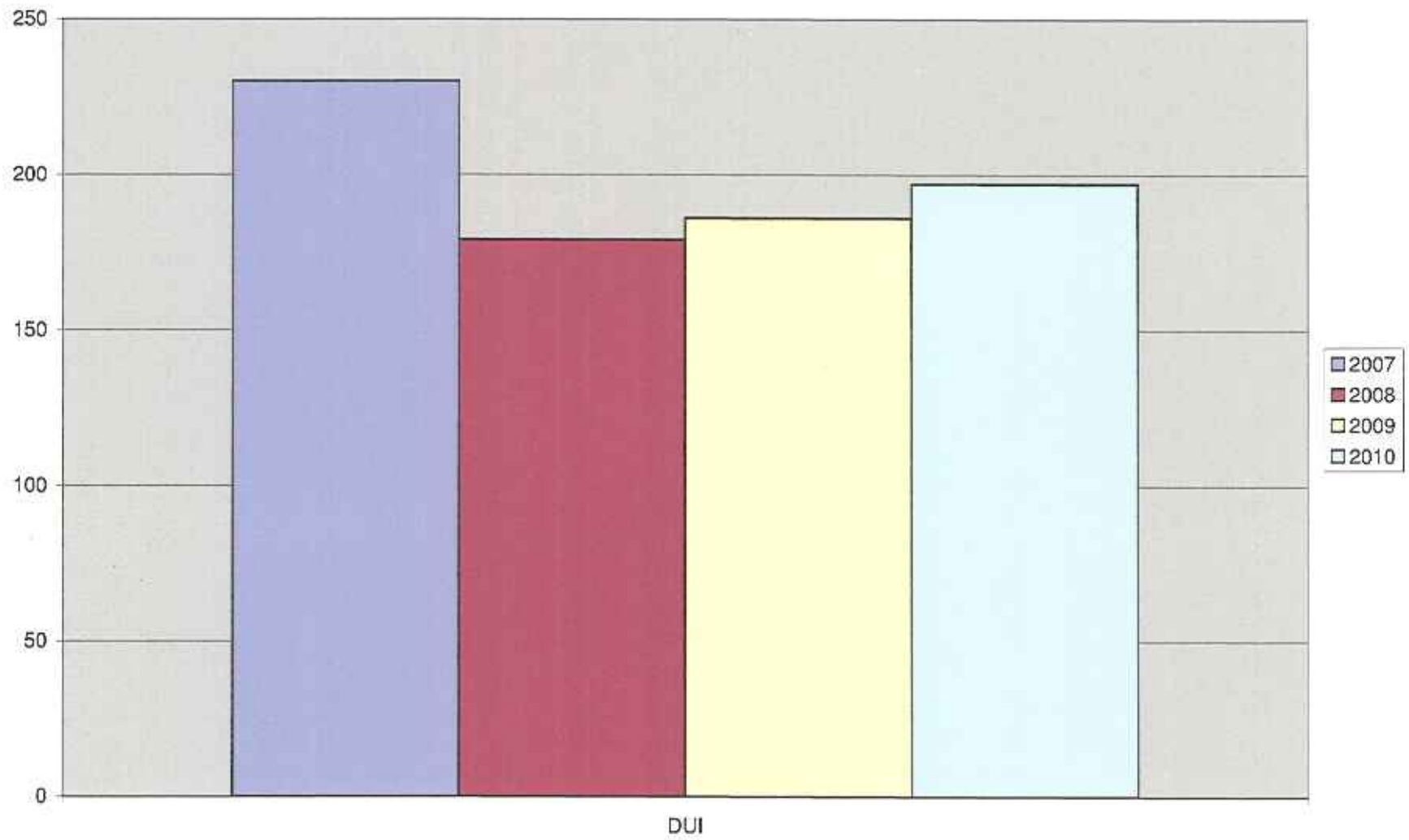

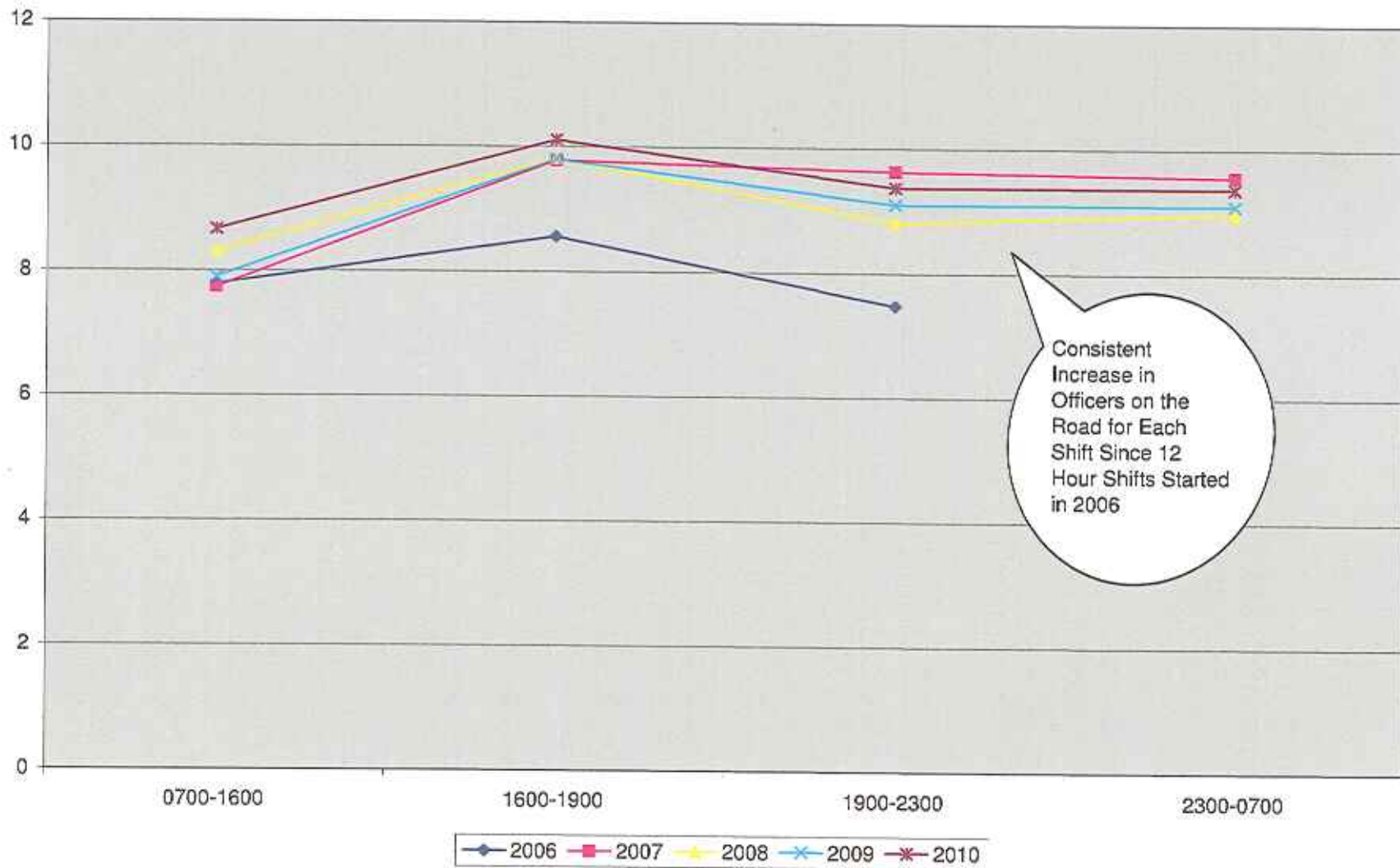

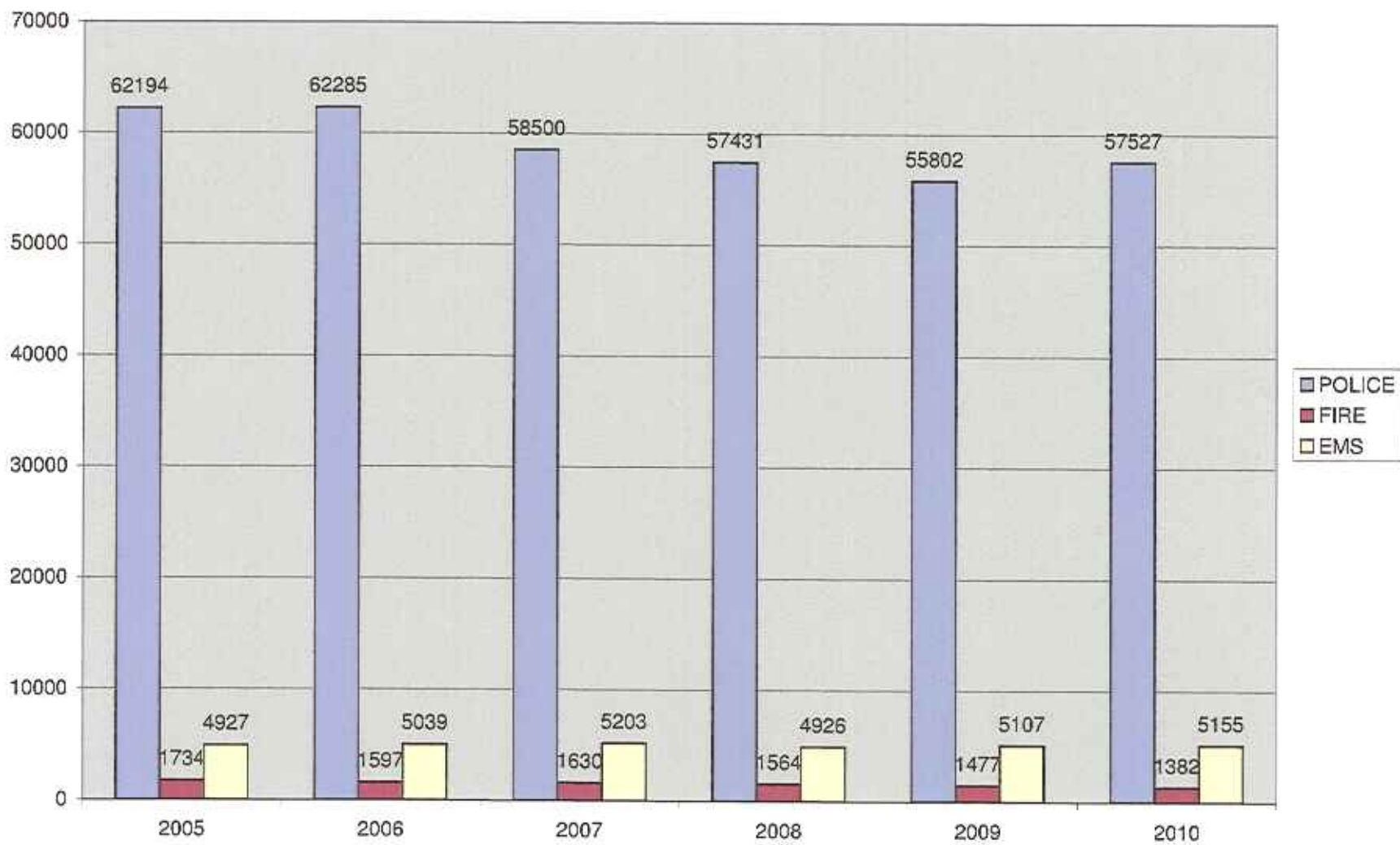

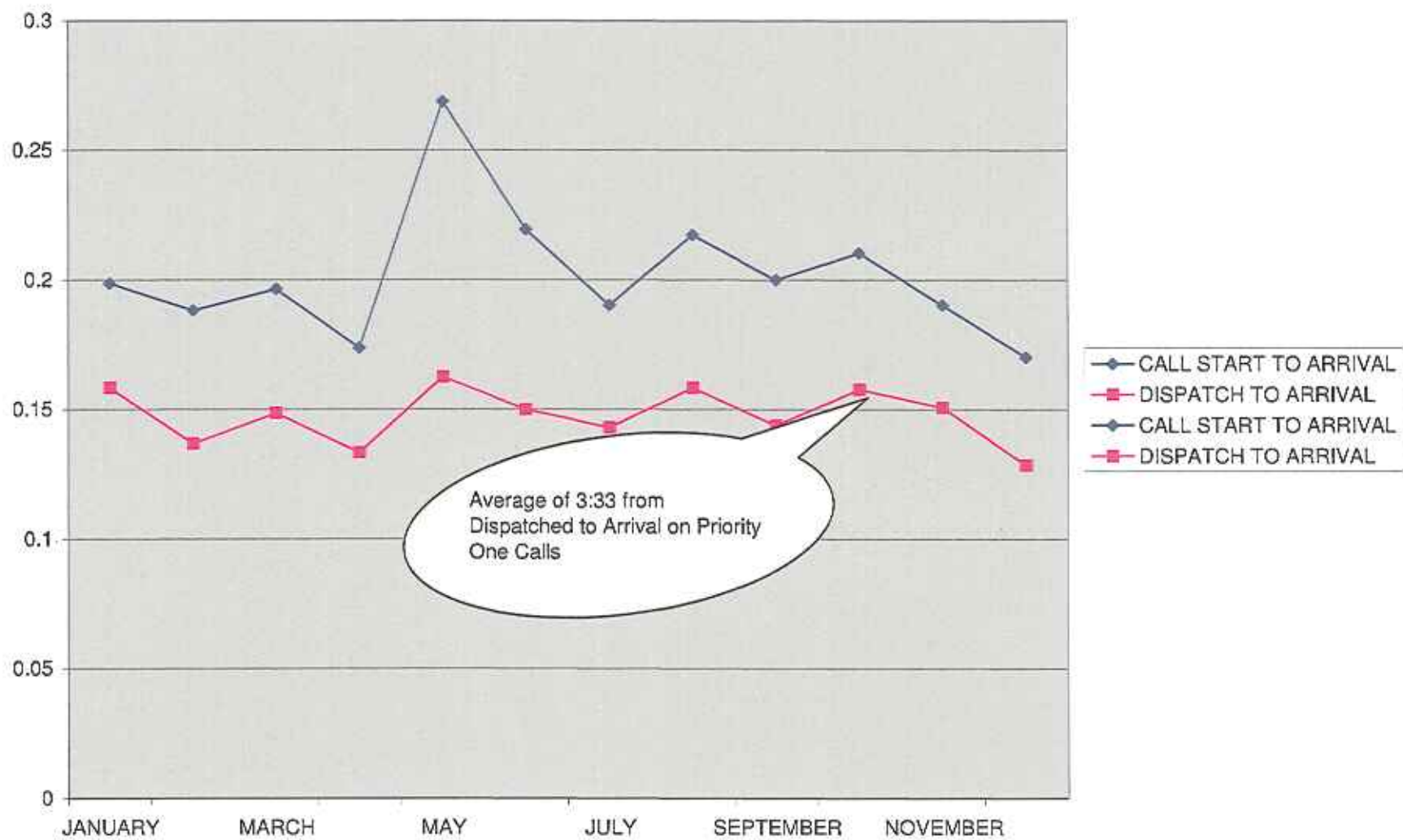
**Average # of Officers for Eight Hour Shift 2010**

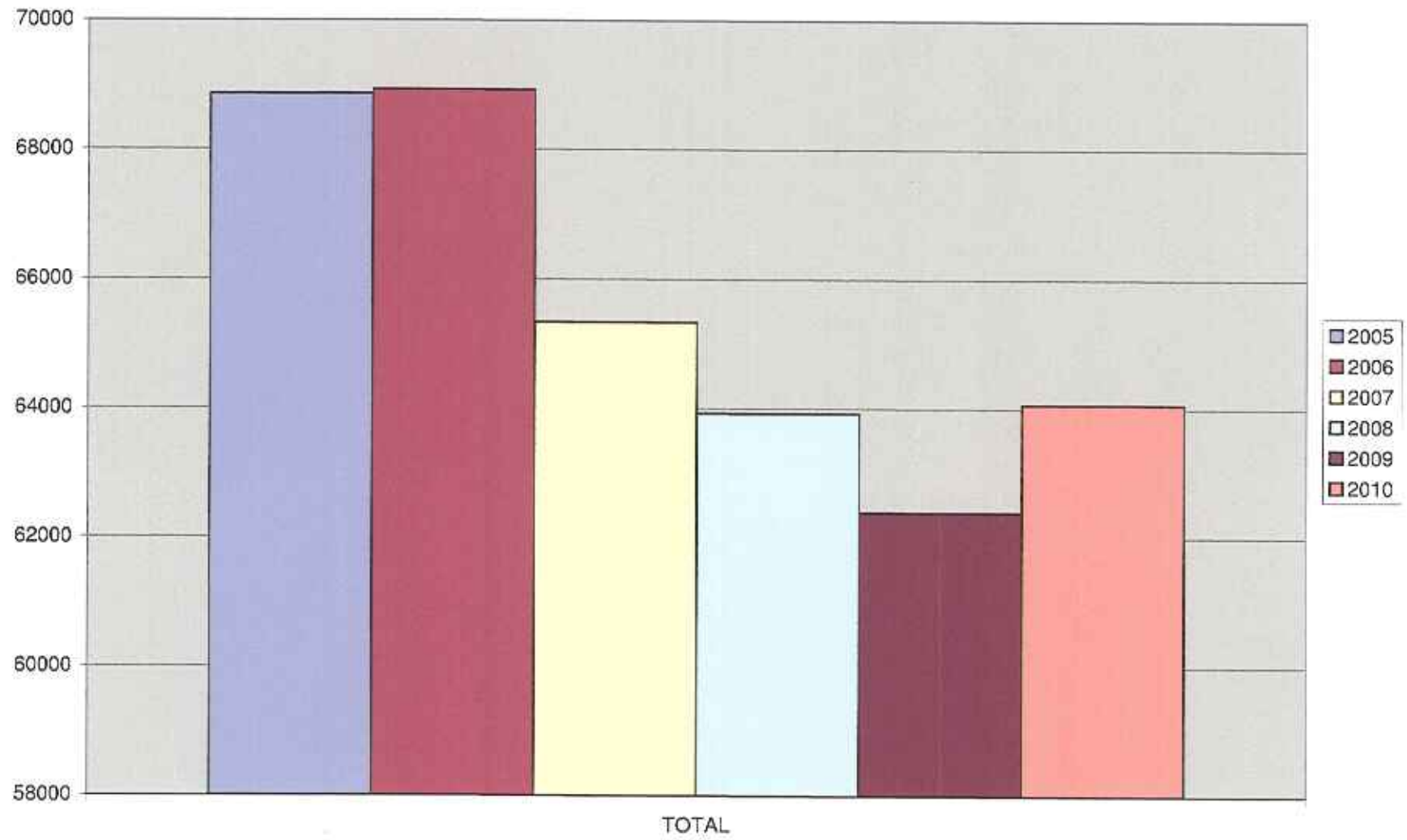

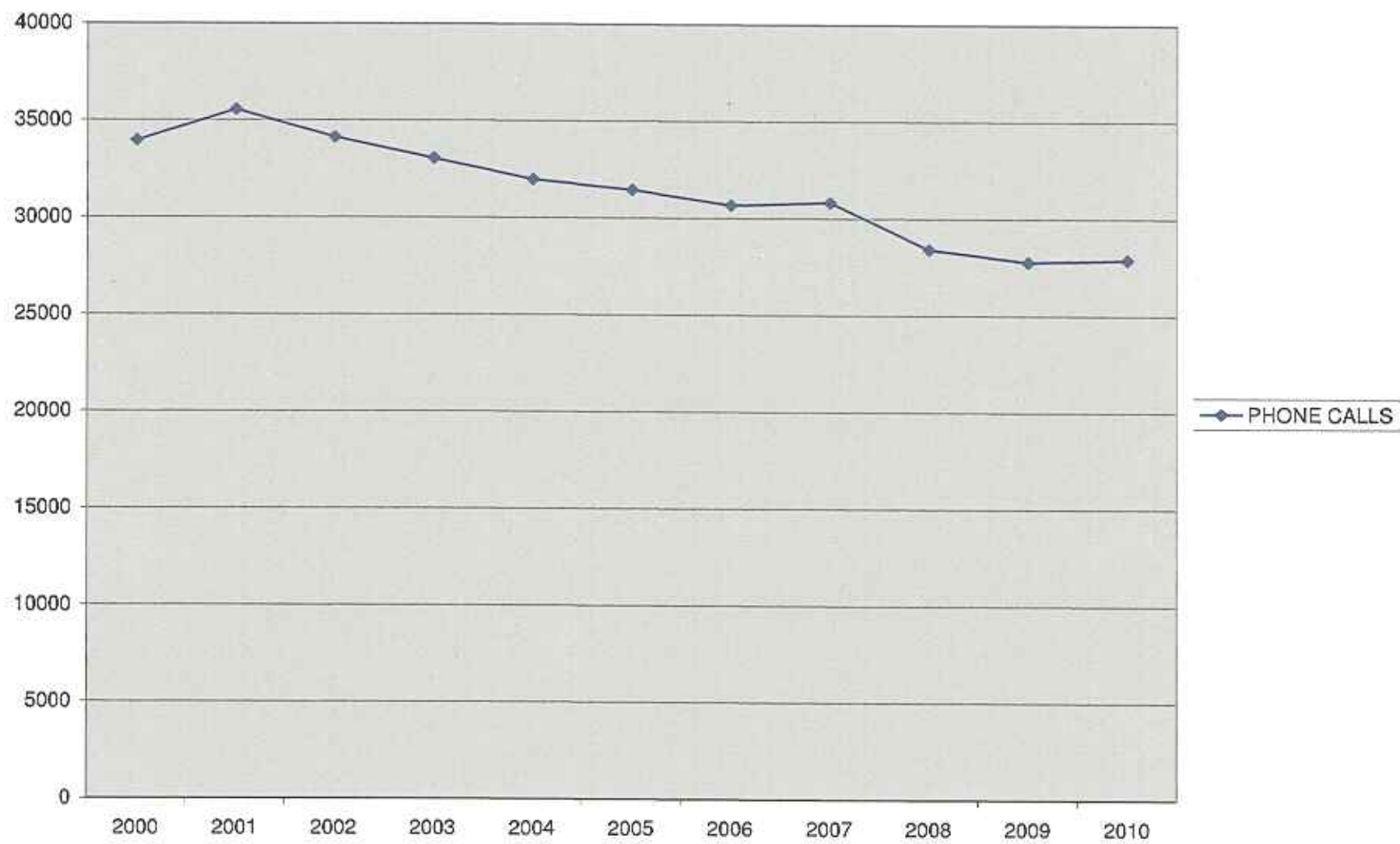

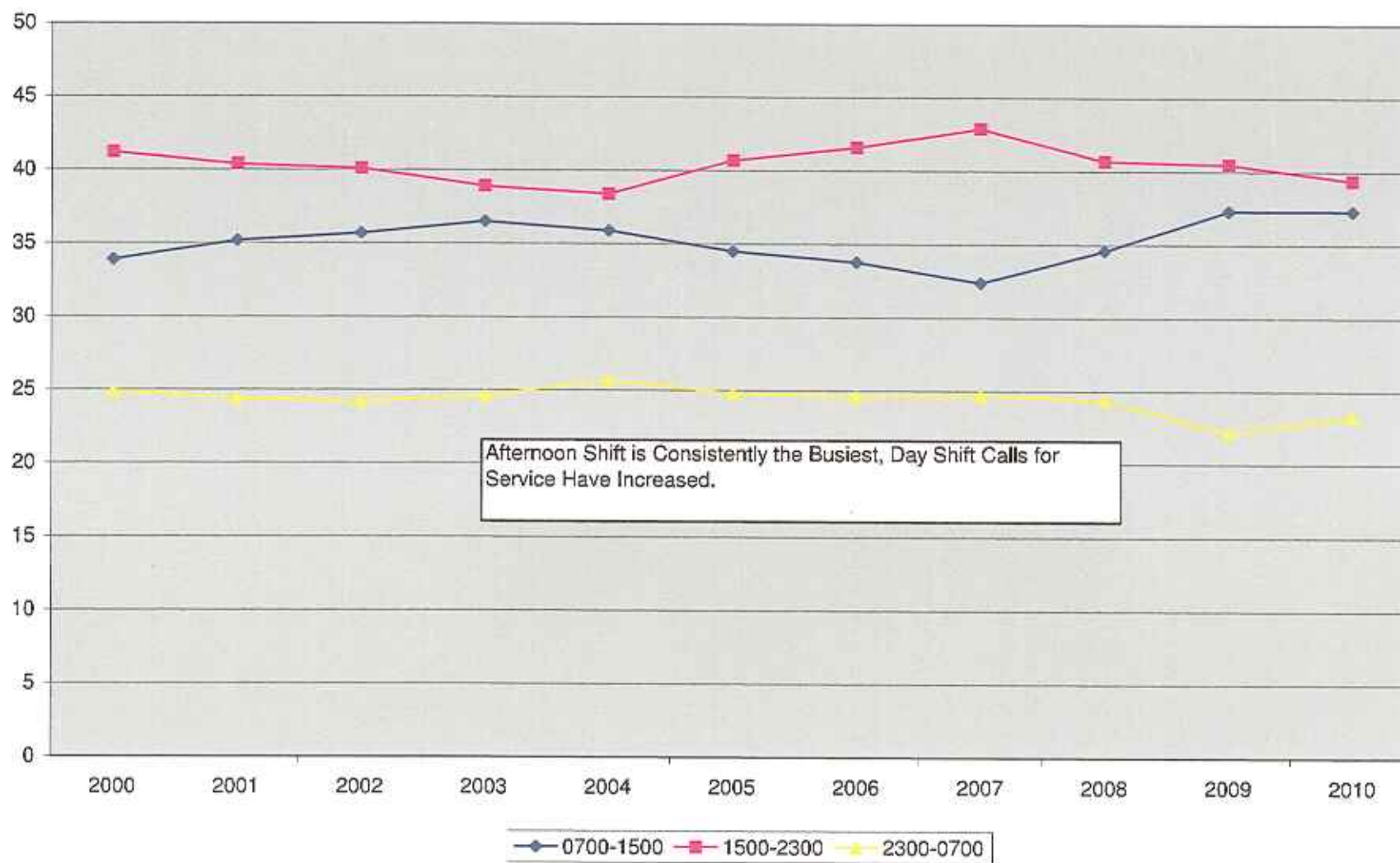

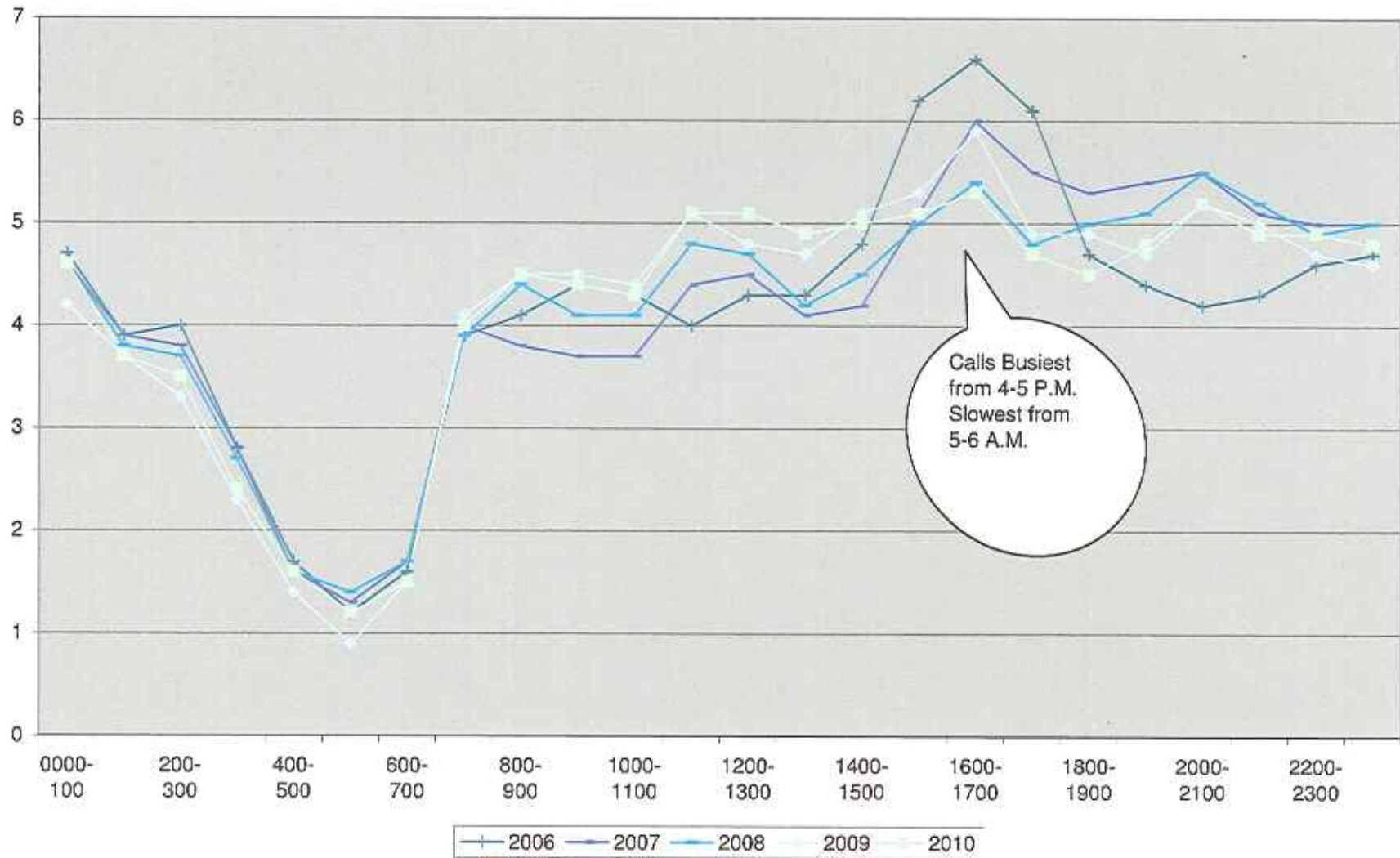

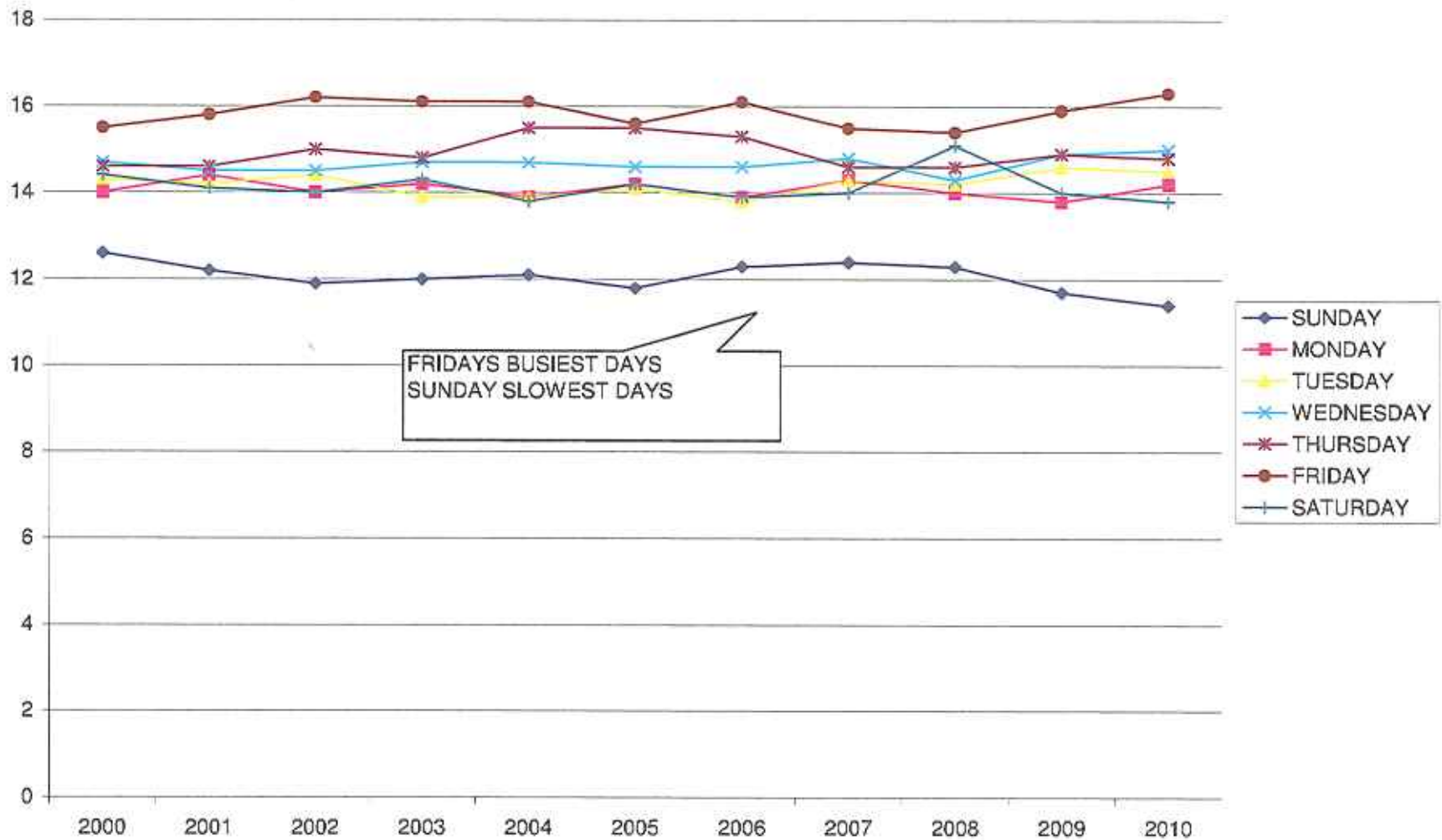
Dispatch Percentage Summary by Shift



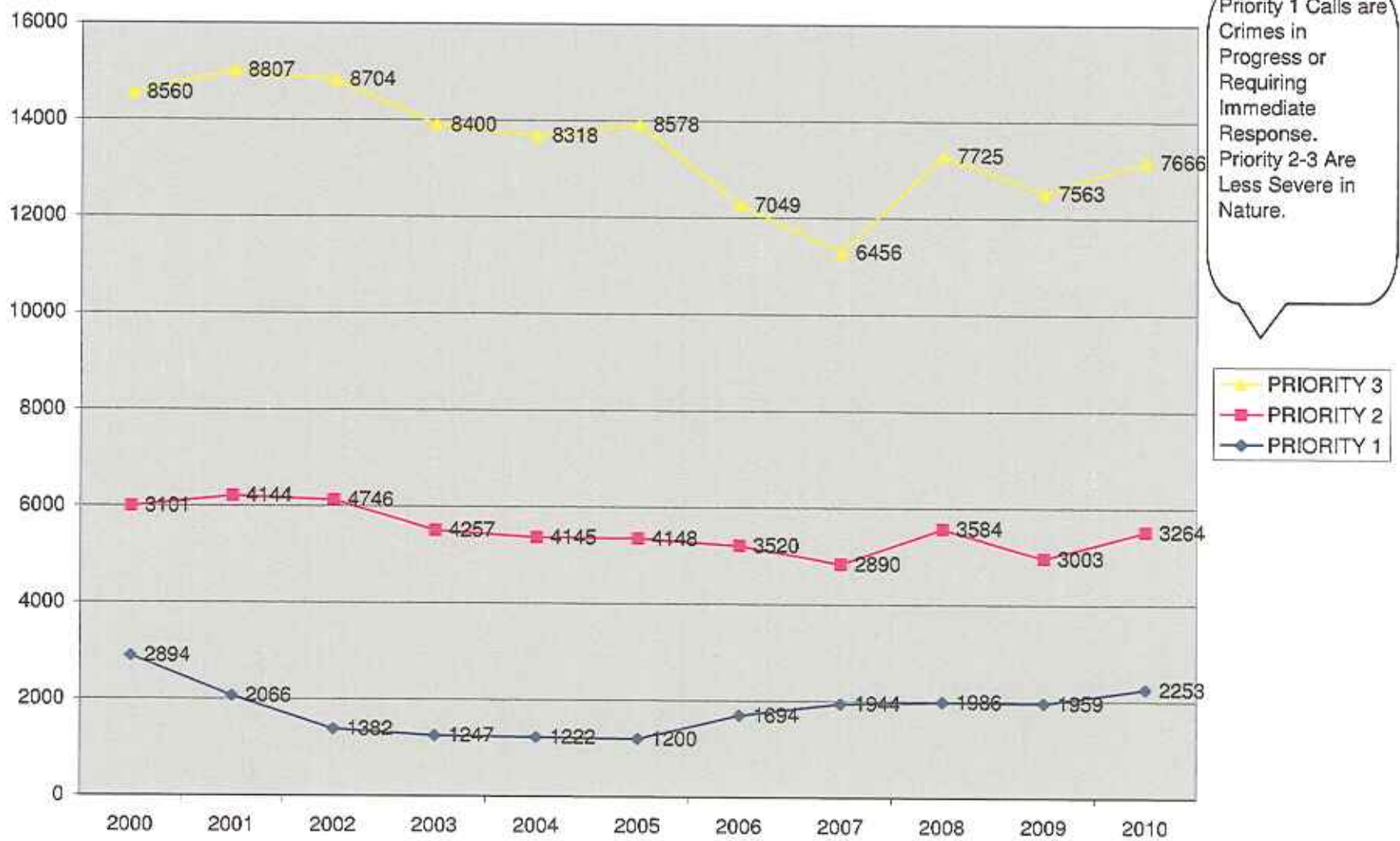
Call Summary by Hour/Percentage

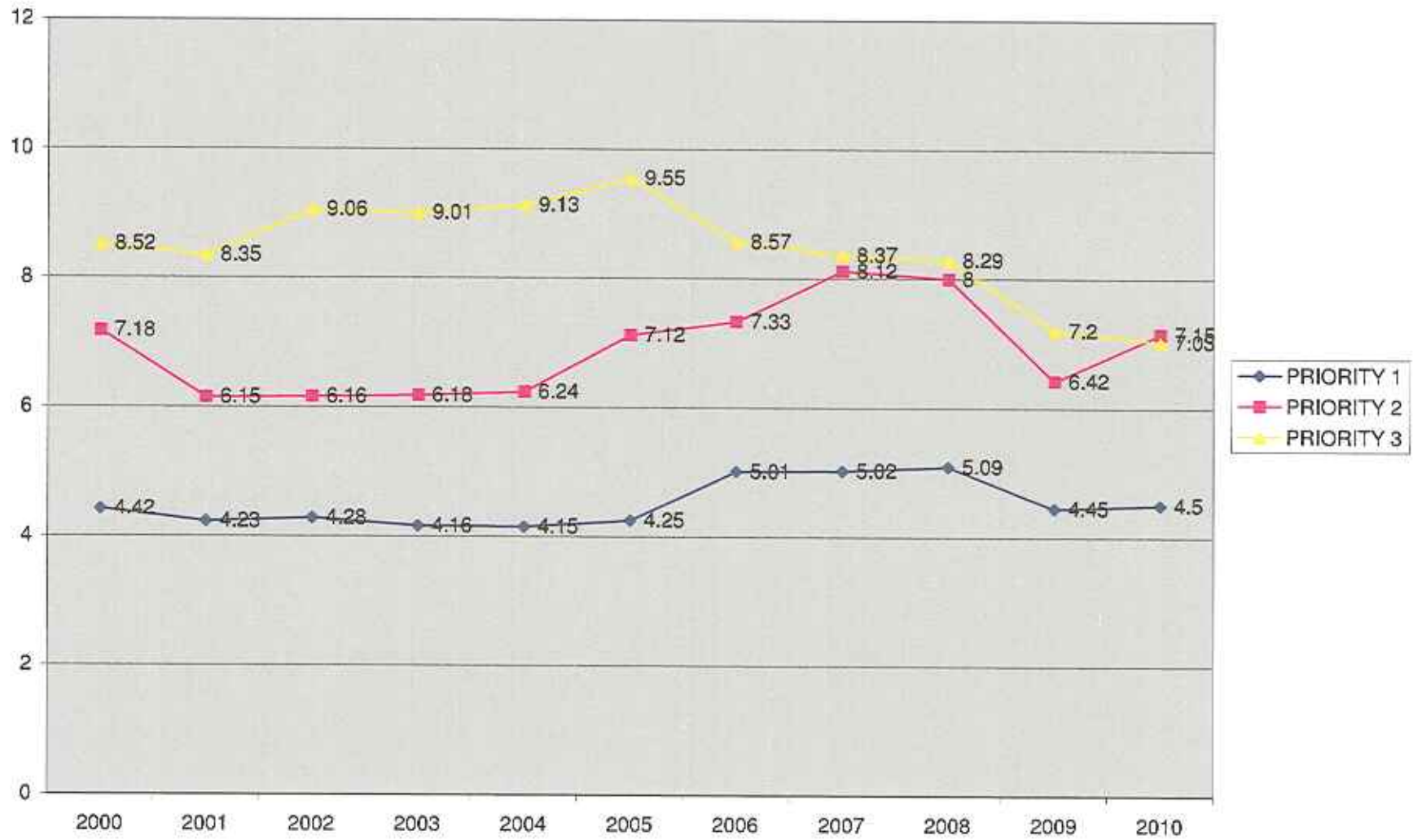

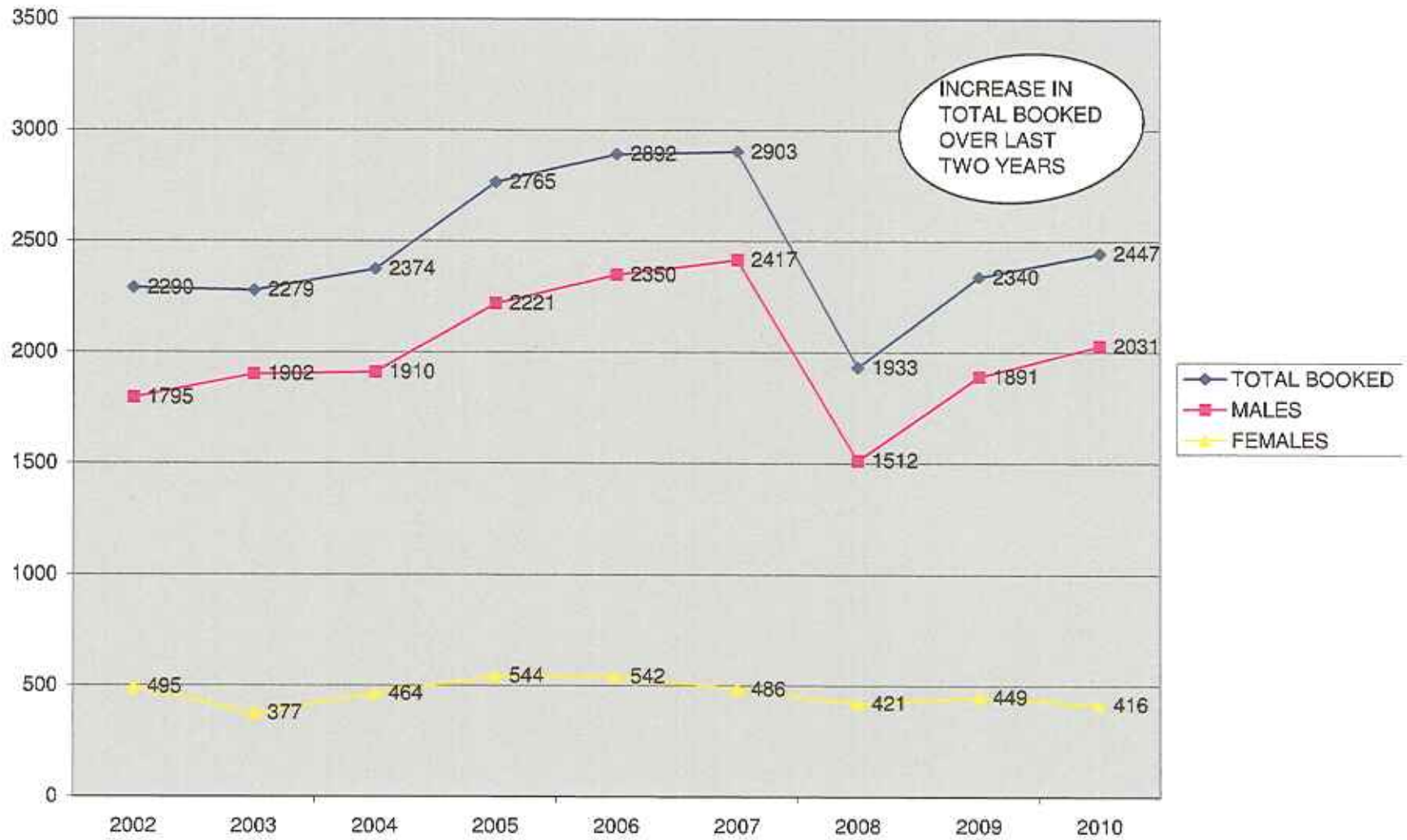
Response Time Comparison Dispatch to Arrival



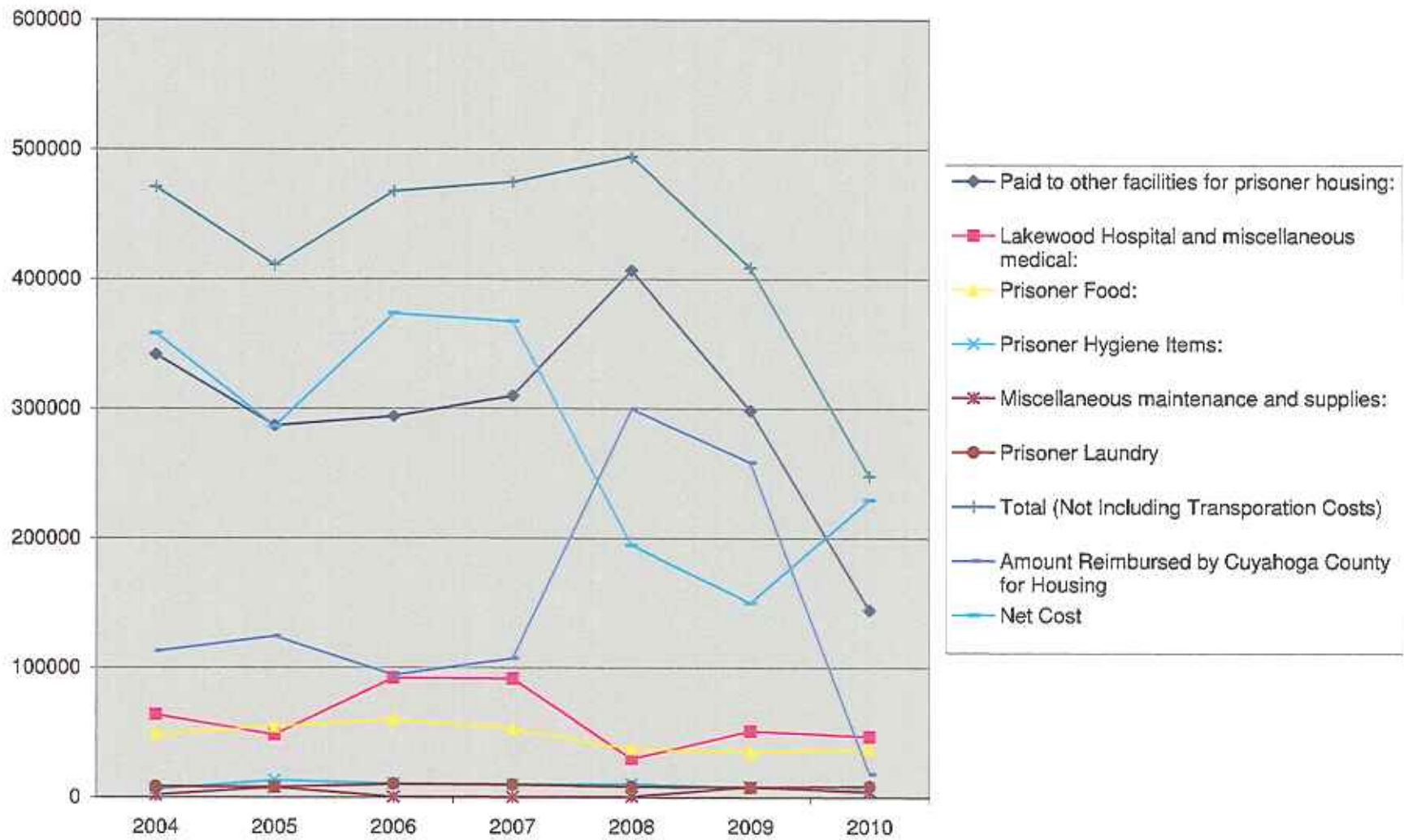
Response Time Comparison/Call Start to Arrival



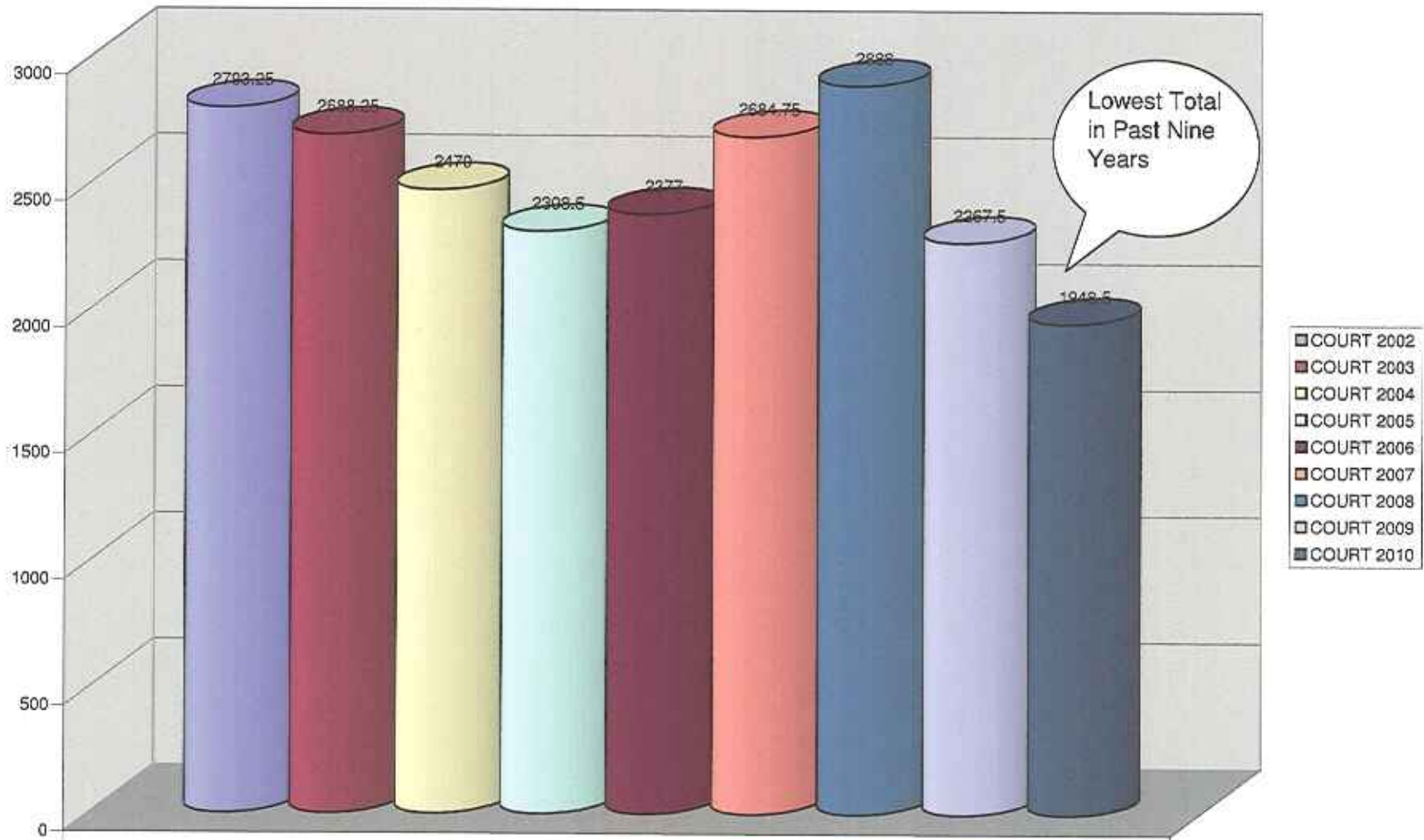
Jail Population Comparison



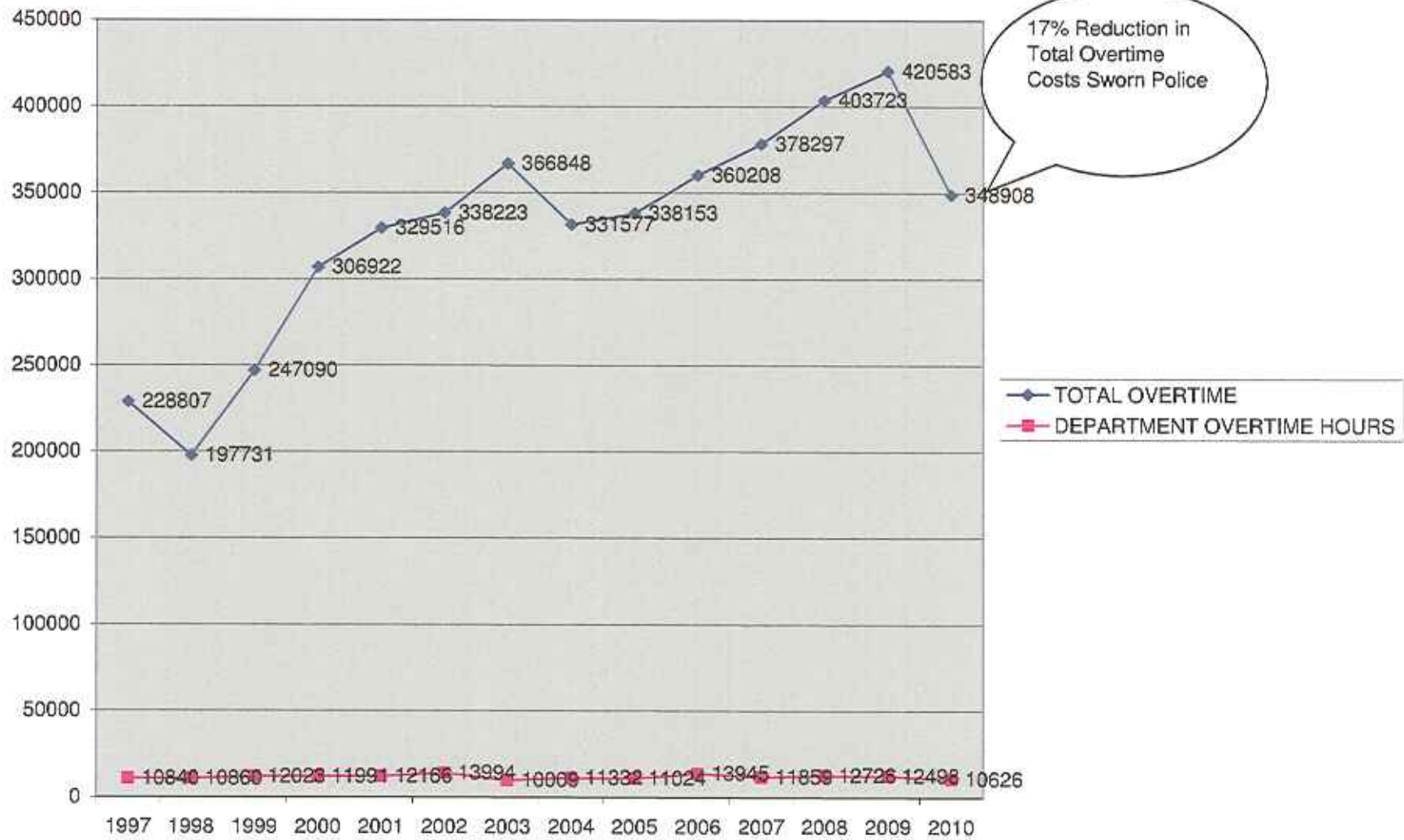

### TOTAL COURT OVERTIME COMPARISON

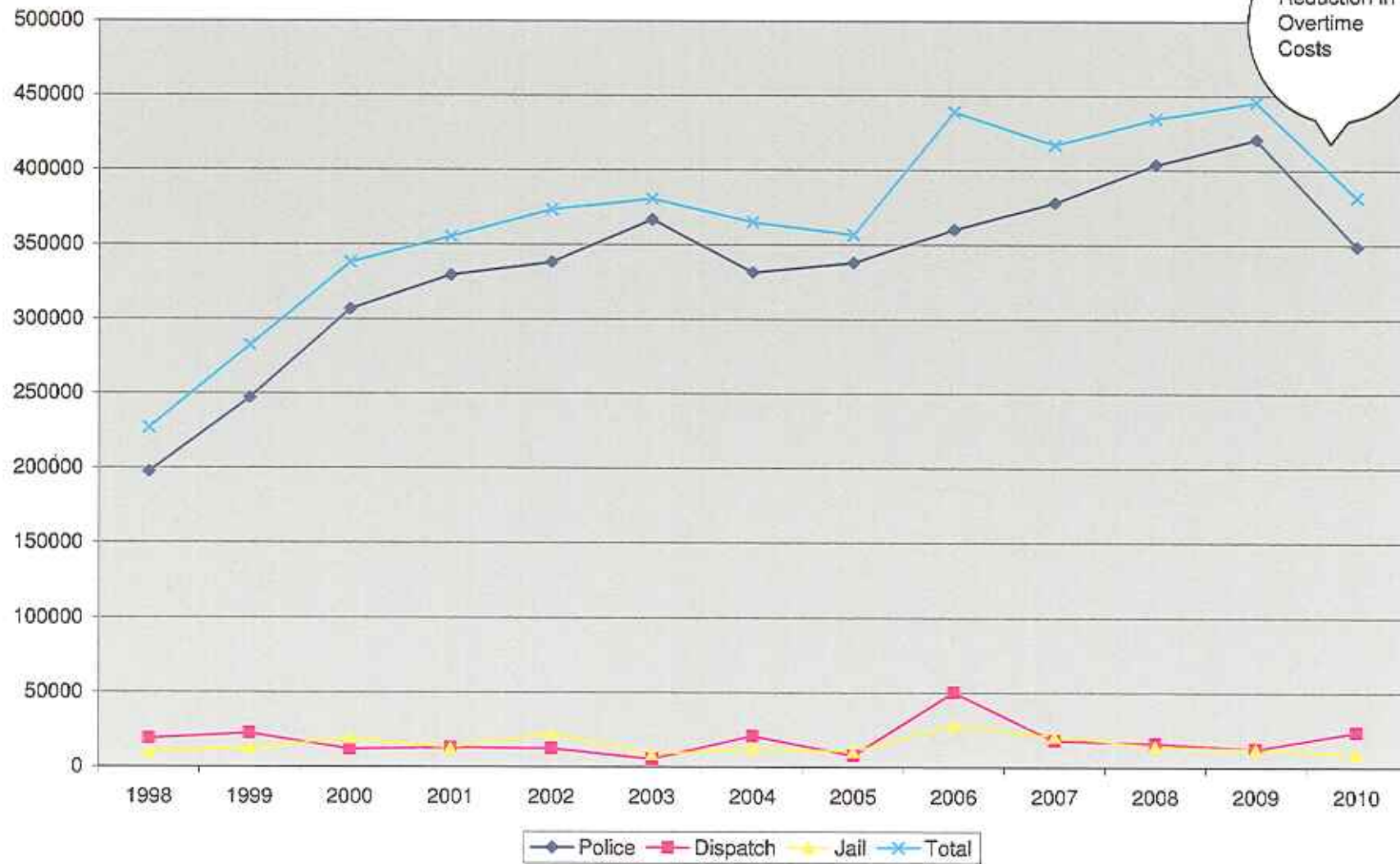

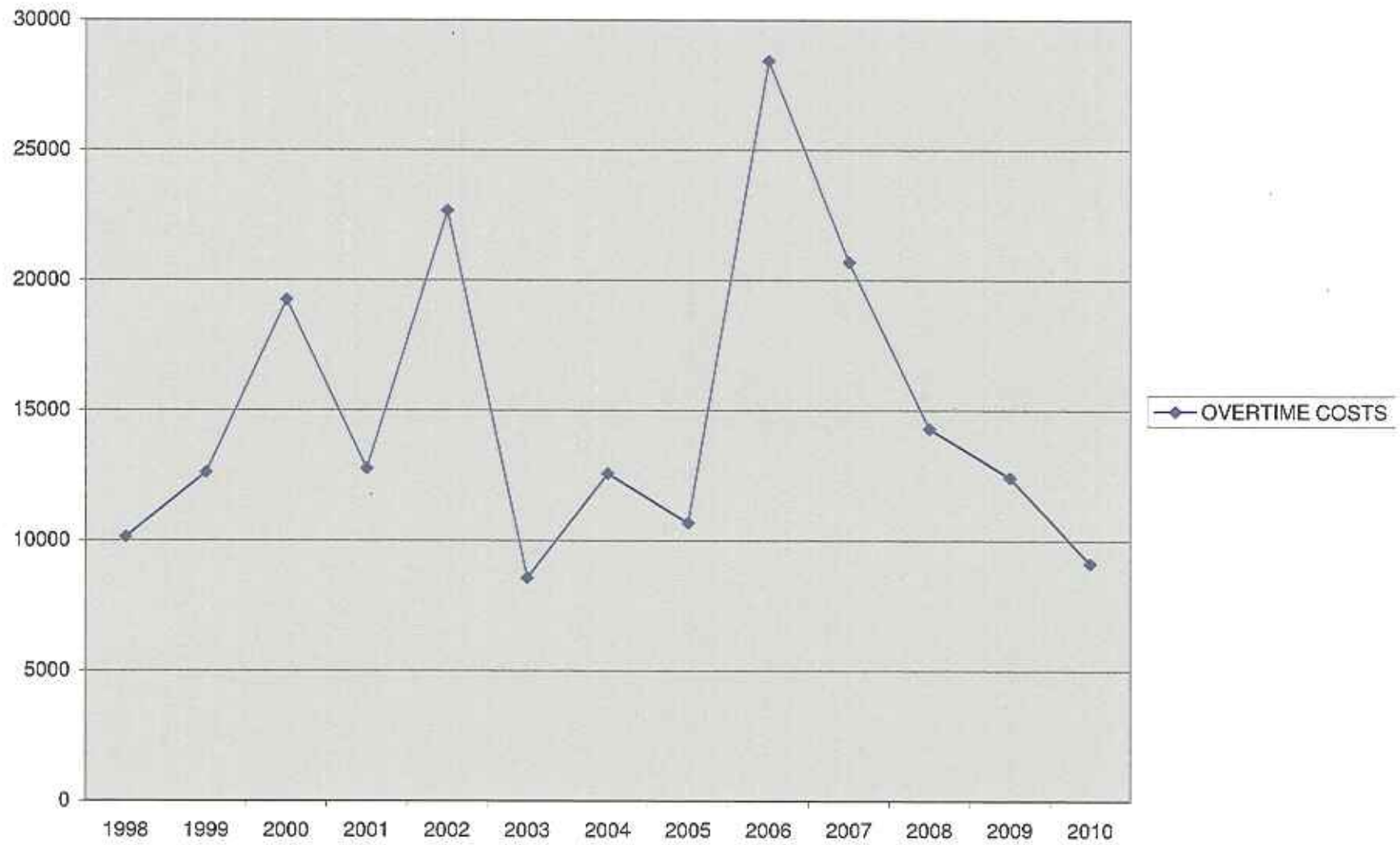

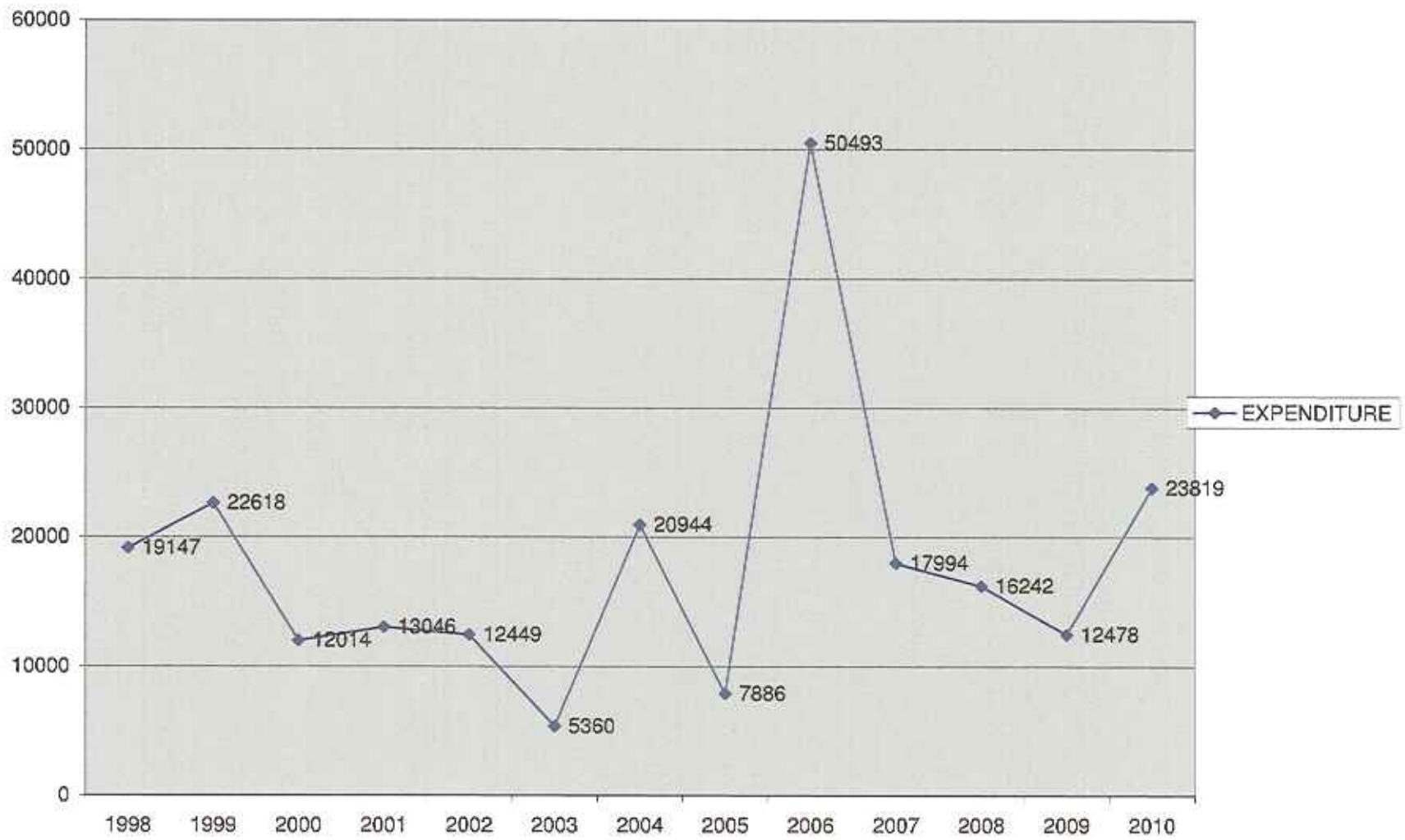

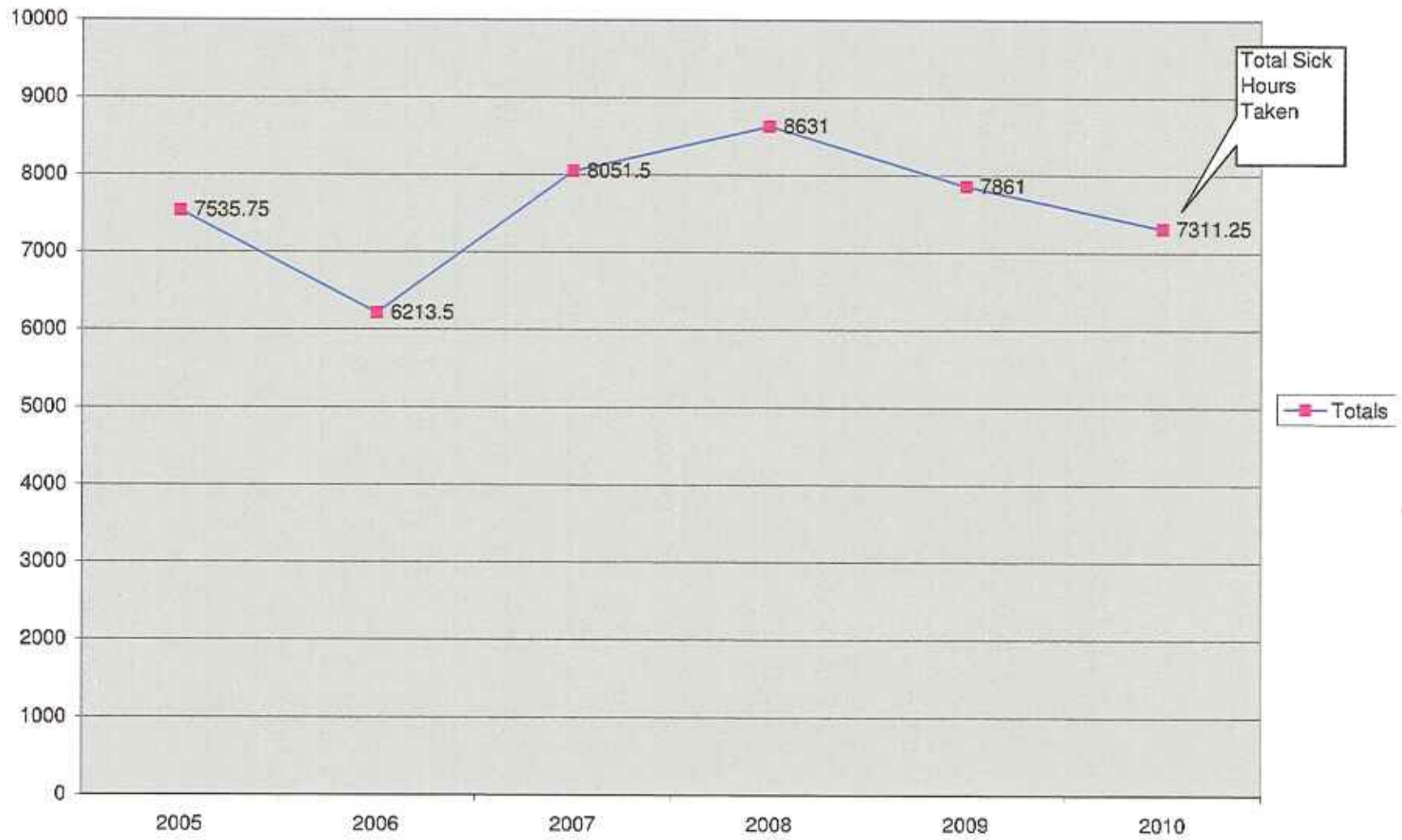

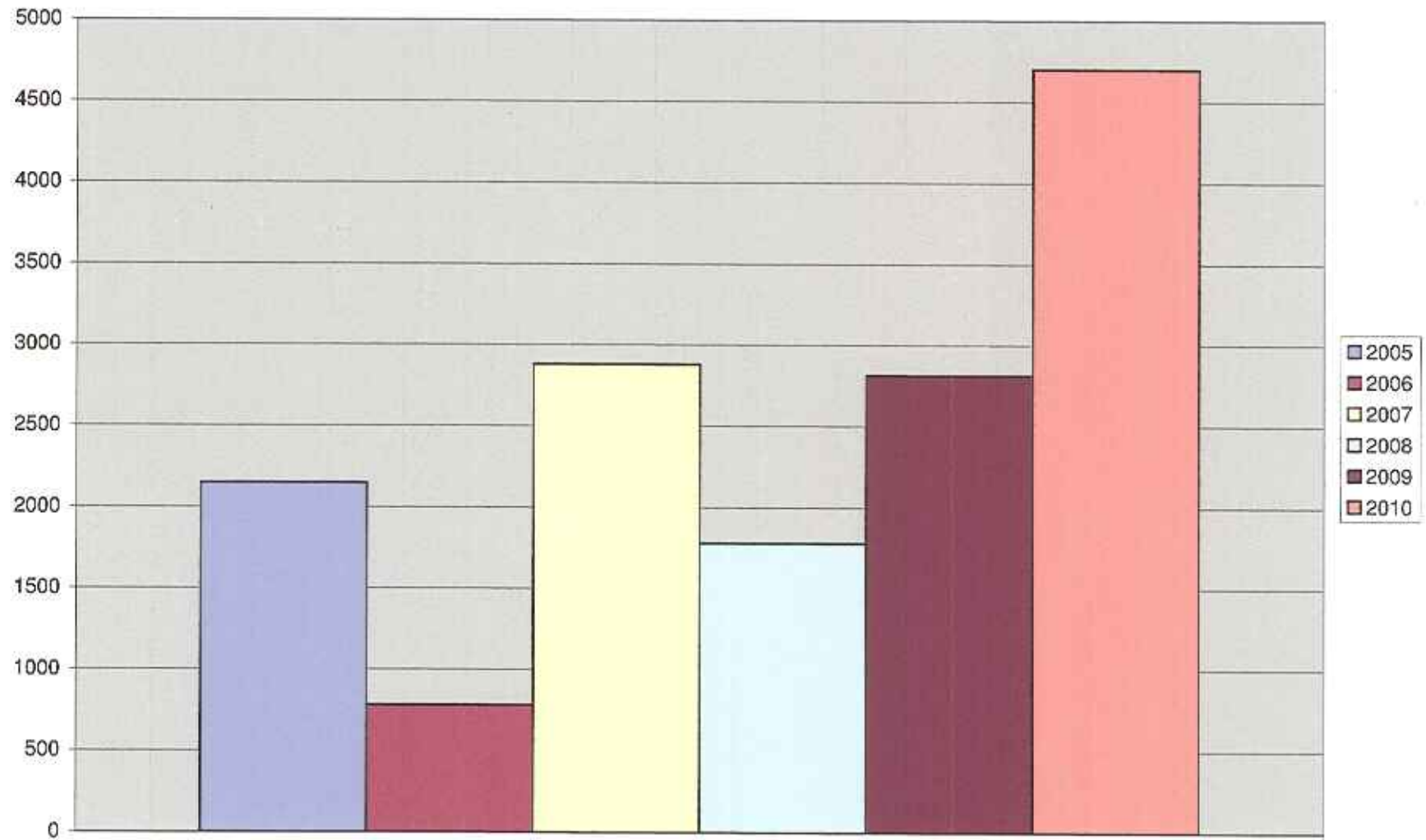
Number of Sworn Taking Sick Time



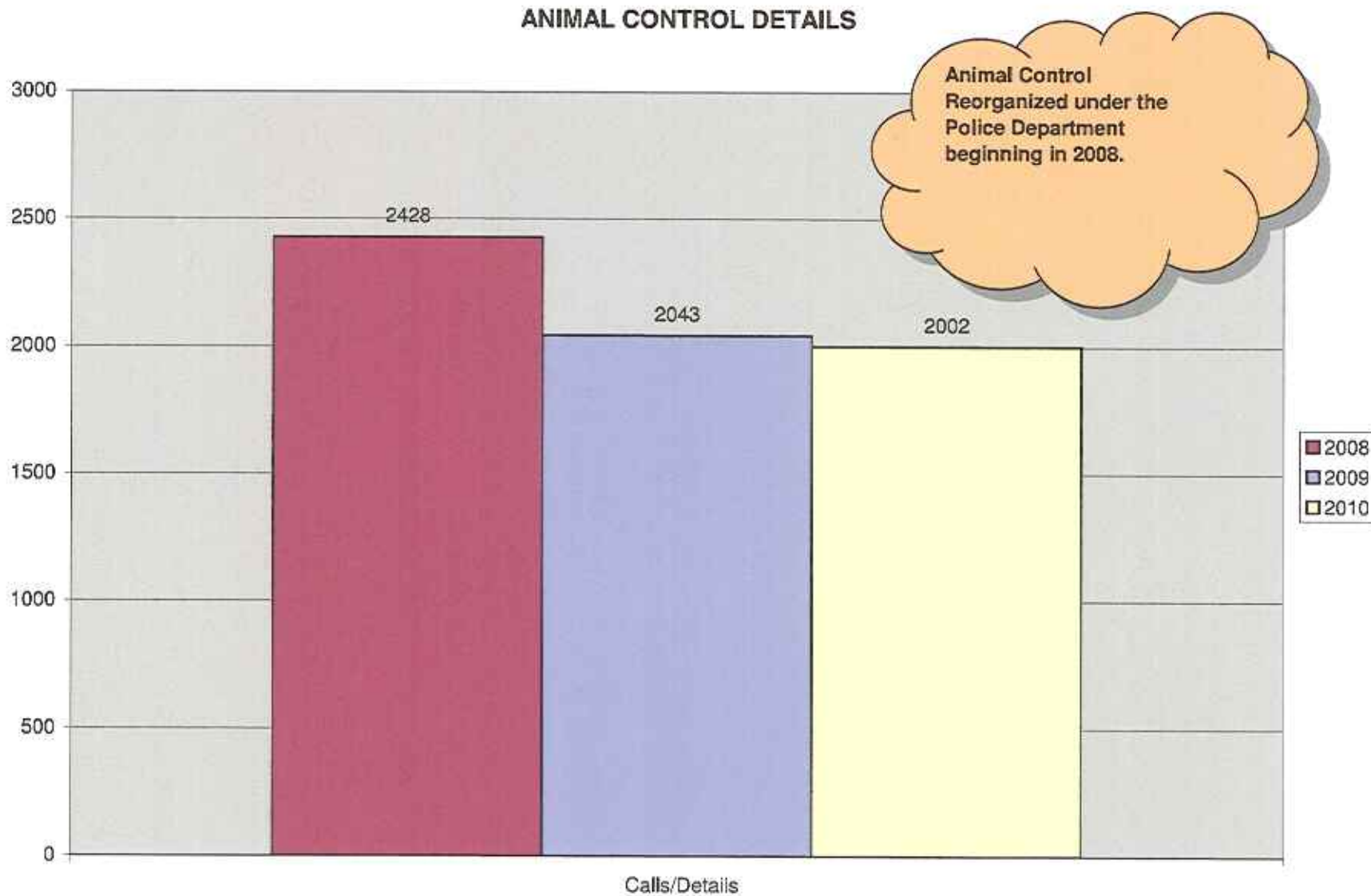

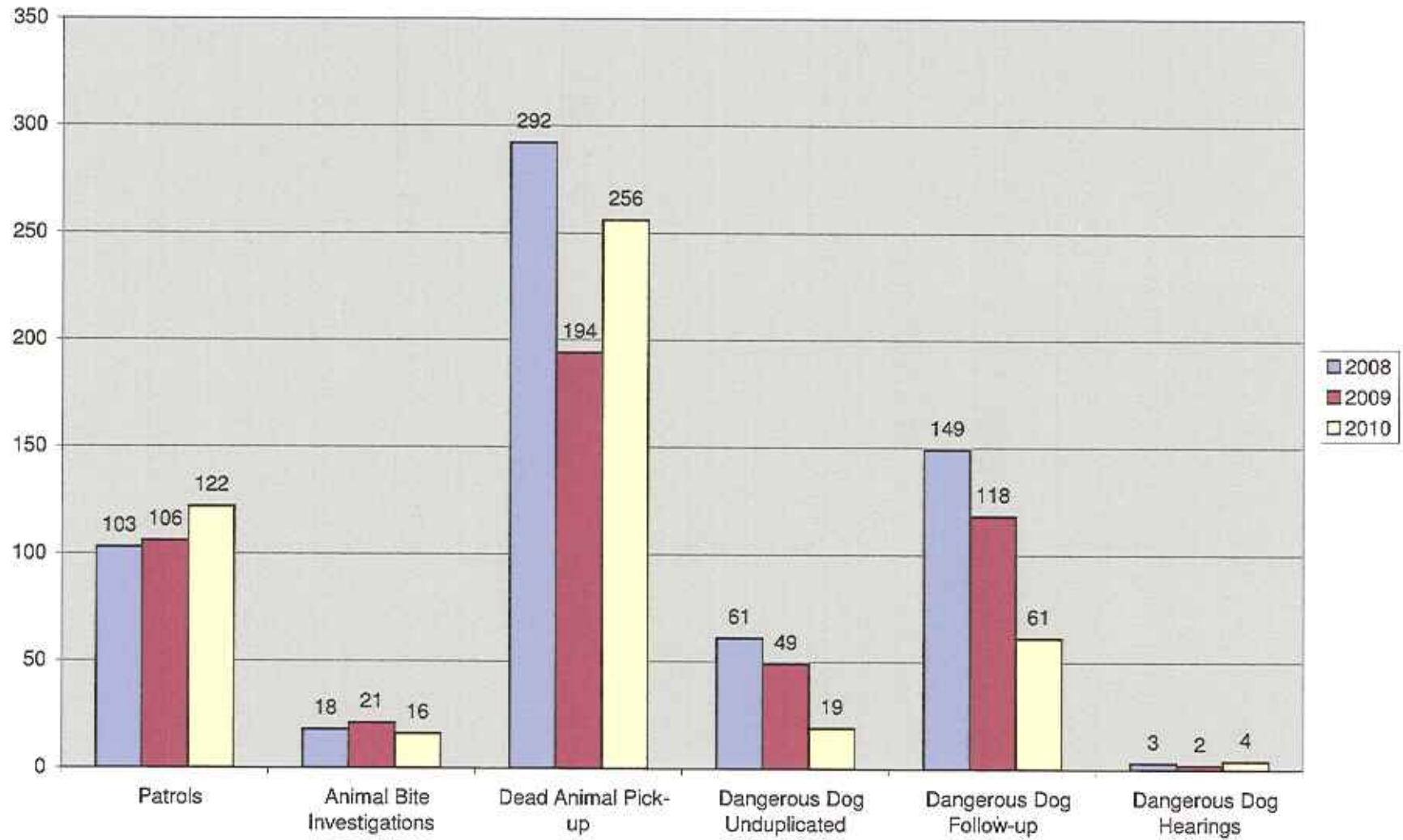

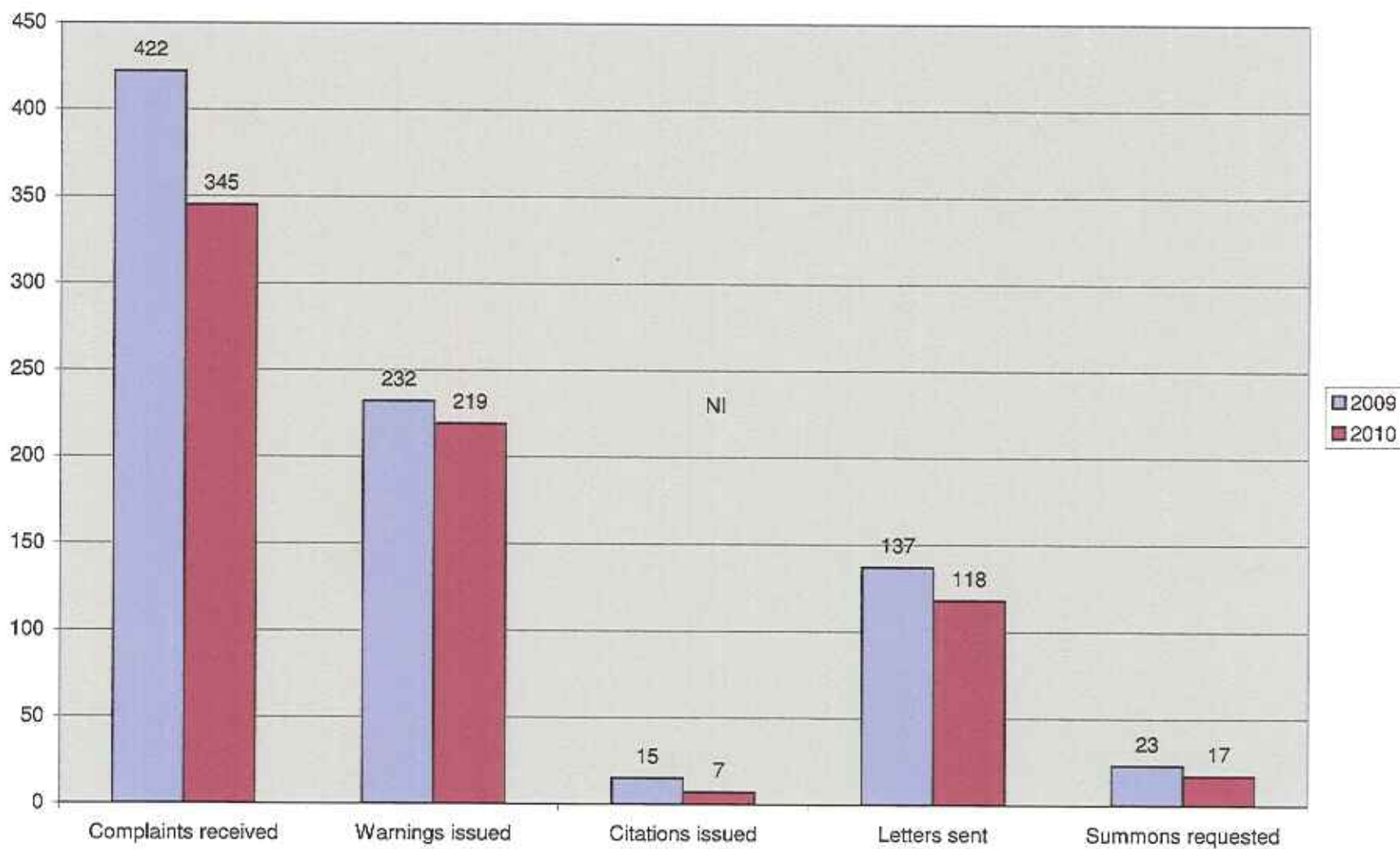
