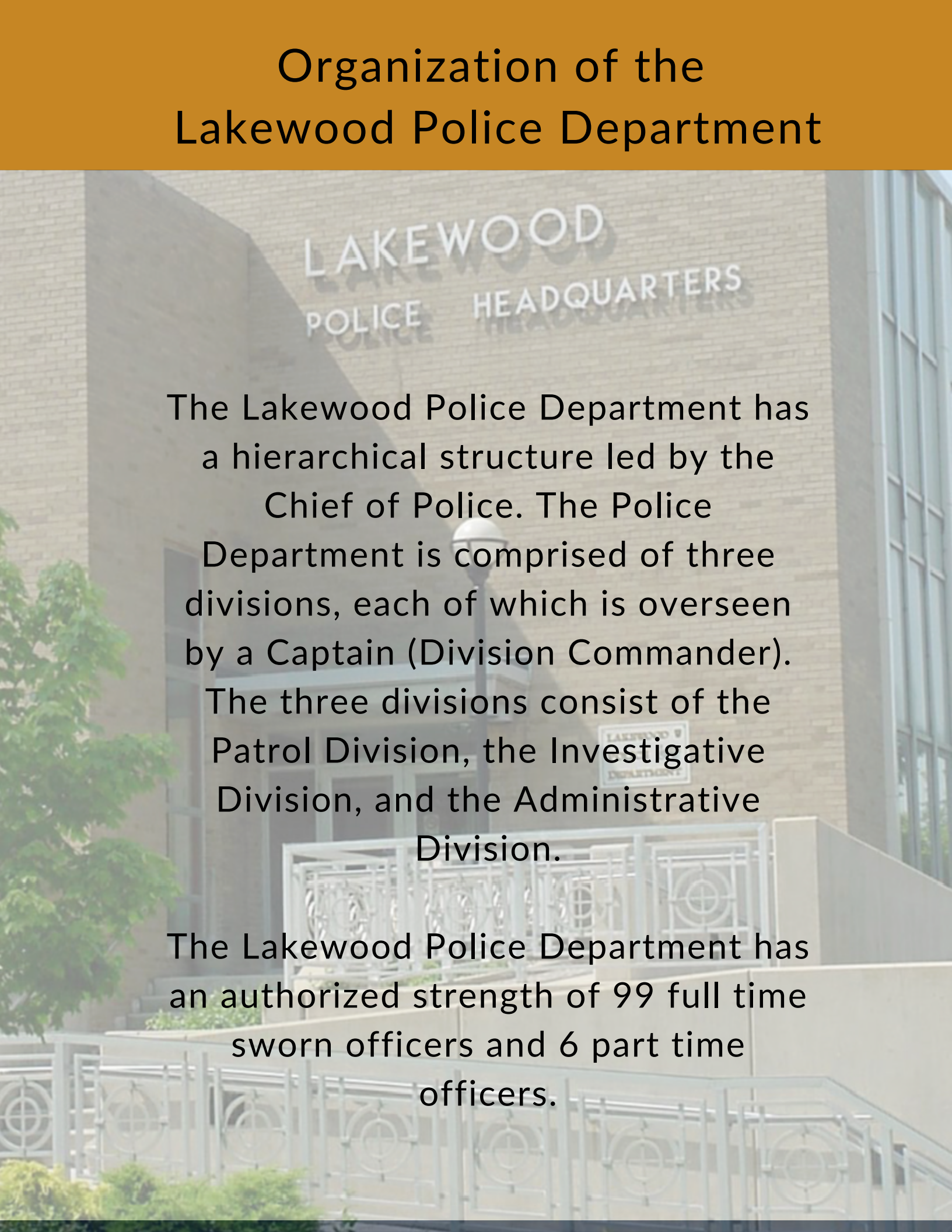
MISSION STATEMENT



It is the mission of the Lakewood Police Department to safeguard the lives and property of the people we serve, to reduce the incidence, and fear of crime, and to enhance public safety while working with the diverse communities to improve their quality of life. Our mandate is to do so with honor and integrity, while at all times conducting ourselves with the highest ethical standards to maintain public confidence.



Organization of the Lakewood Police Department

The Lakewood Police Department has a hierarchical structure led by the Chief of Police. The Police Department is comprised of three divisions, each of which is overseen by a Captain (Division Commander). The three divisions consist of the Patrol Division, the Investigative Division, and the Administrative Division.

The Lakewood Police Department has an authorized strength of 99 full time sworn officers and 6 part time officers.

Patrol Division

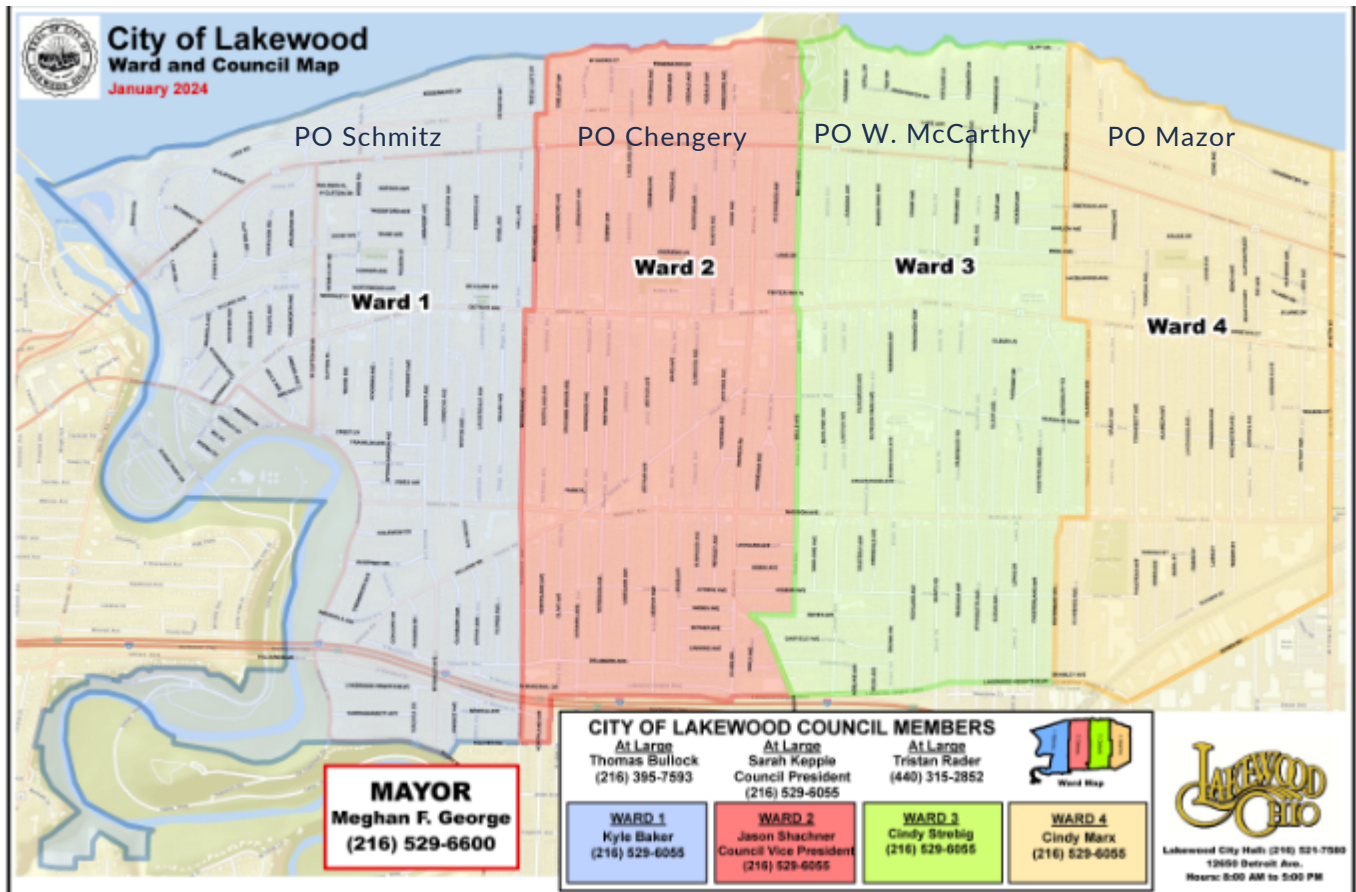


The Patrol Division is the largest division in the police department and it is also referred to as the Uniform Division. This Division employs the officers who wear a police uniform every day and patrol the city in marked police cars. These are the officers that respond to emergencies, citizens complaints, and crimes in progress. They enforce the criminal laws and traffic laws. The Special Operations Unit is part of the Patrol Division.

Patrol Shifts

Officers in the Patrol Division work twelve-hour shifts. There is a Day Shift , and Night Shift, each of which is overseen by a Shift Lieutenant. Each shift is split into two platoons, and two sergeants are assigned to each platoon. The Lieutenants and Sergeants supervise and assist the officers on their shifts and/or platoons.

Special Operations Unit



The Special Operations Unit consists of our in-house training unit, our Neighborhood Police Officers, our DARE/School Resource Officers, Uniformed Technology Officer, and our Part Time Officers. These officers typically work eight hour shifts and are supervised by the Special Operations Unit Sergeant and Lieutenant.

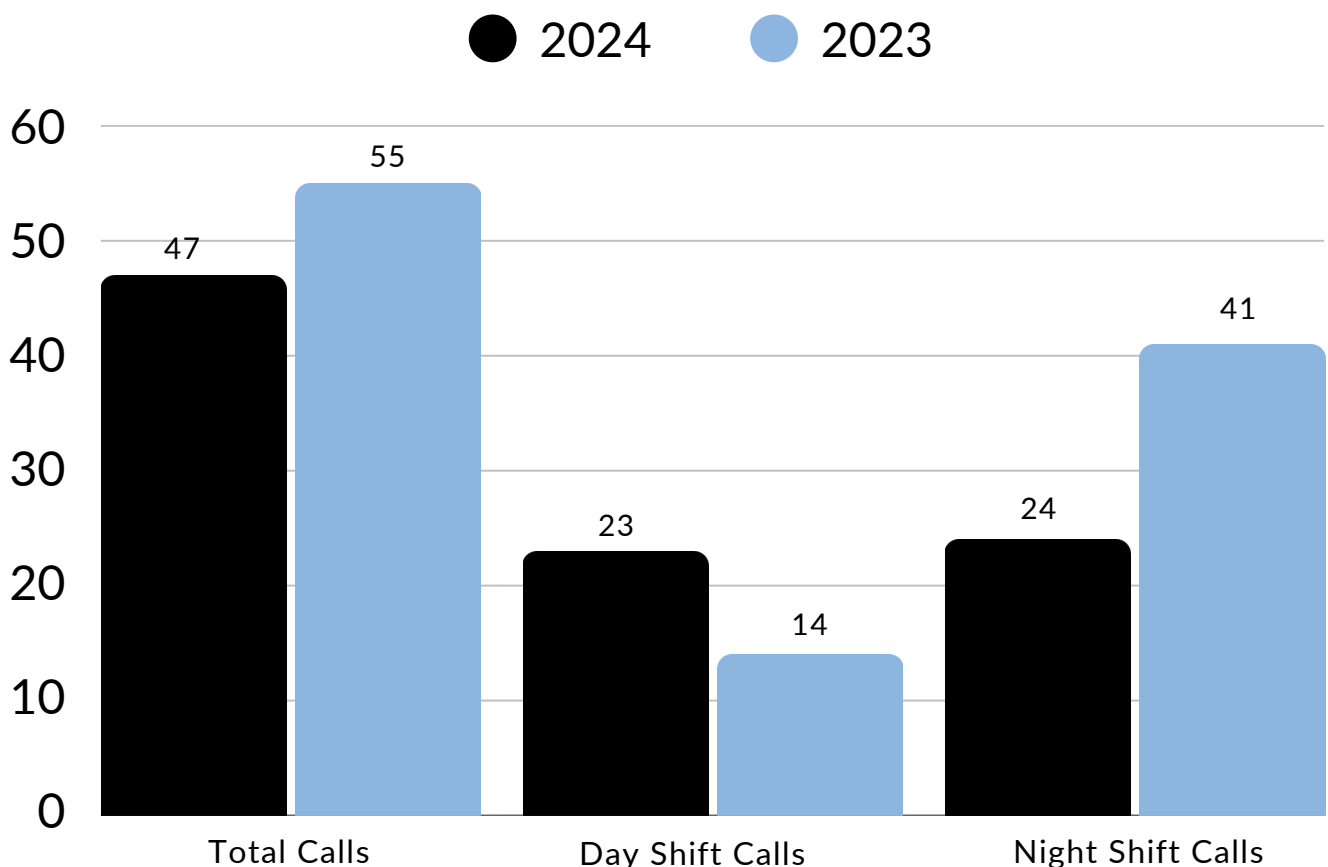
Training Unit

Our inhouse Training Unit enables the Lakewood Police Department to deliver training to all of our employees in a cost efficient manner. The training unit generally puts together and conducts quarterly in-service training each year. This training includes range days where officers qualify with their pistols and patrol rifles. At the in-services , the officers also receive their yearly training in the proper use of the Taser and OC Spray, as well as a review of our policies including but not limited to the following: Use of Force, Pursuit Driving, and Legal Updates. Our officers also complete the mandated 24 hours of continued professional training required by the Ohio Police Officers Training Association (OPOTA). Our officers attend specialized training throughout Ohio and other nearby states.

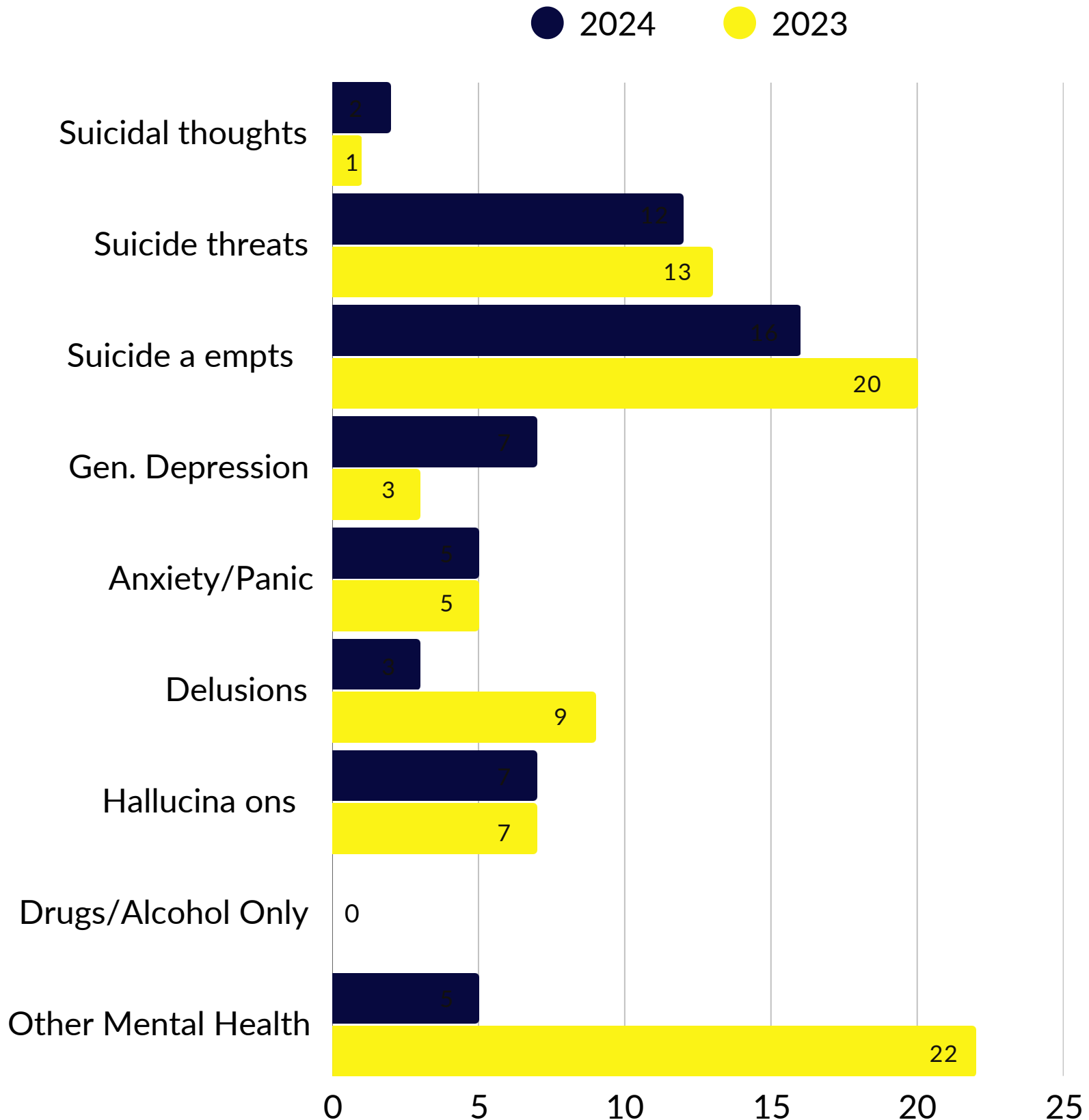
In 2024, 132 employees received 10,541 hours and 59 minutes of training. This averages 79.8 hours of training per trained employee.

Crisis Intervention Team (CIT)

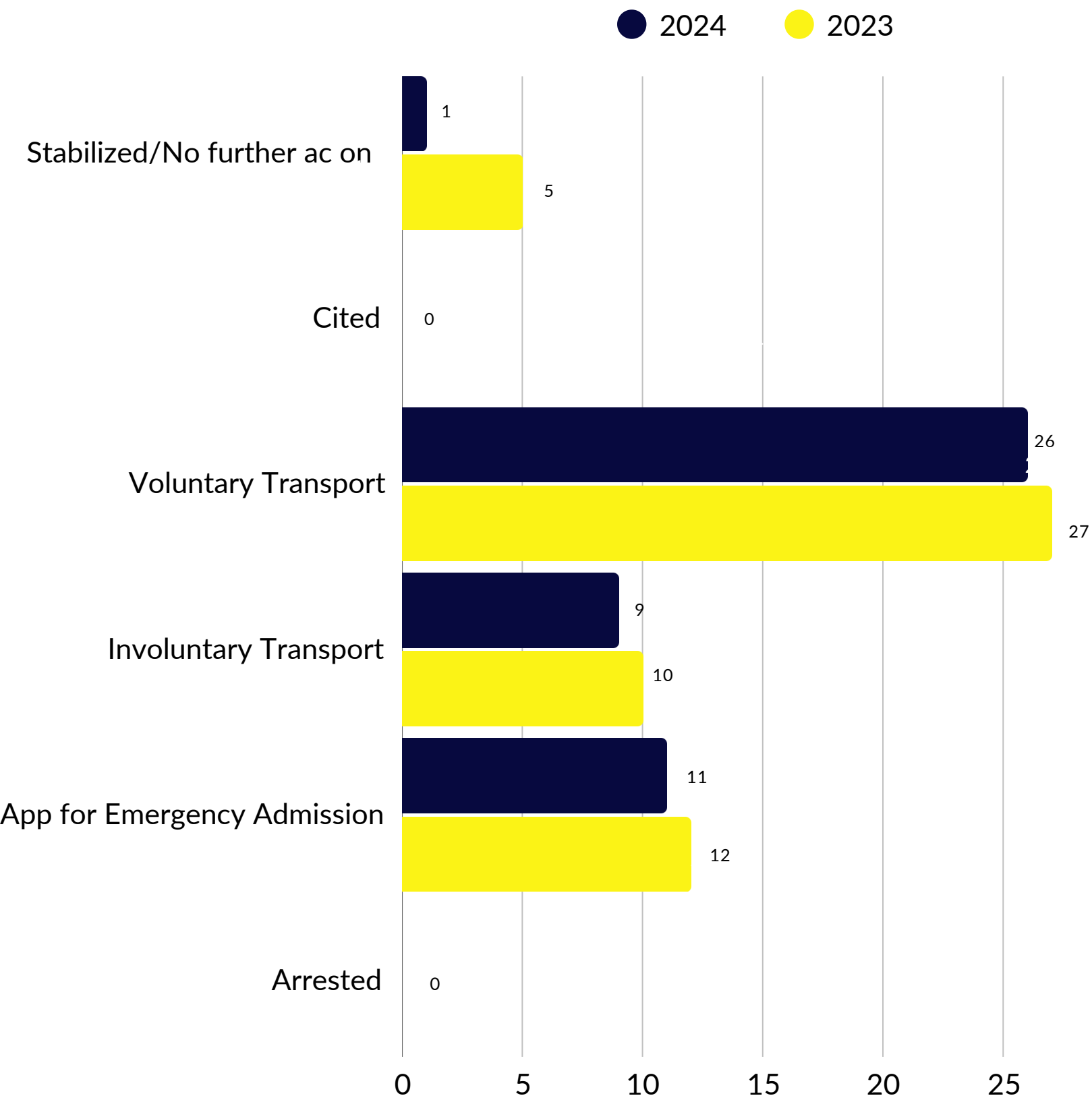
The Lakewood Police Department's Crisis Intervention Team responds to the calls in which people are experiencing a mental health emergency. The specially trained CIT officers try to bring about the best resolution for these people in crisis by talking with them and getting them the assistance and services that they need. Every one of our CIT officers volunteered to be on the team.

Investigative Division

The Investigative Division is also referred to at the Detective Bureau. There are fourteen detectives. Ten are assigned as general duty detectives that have specialties in financial crimes, juvenile/sex crimes, family crimes, arson, and violent crimes. There are four detectives in the narcotics/vice unit. They deal with drug cases, overdoses, and prostitution cases.

Investigative Division personnel work eight-hour shifts, rotating between day shift and afternoon shift. One sergeant is assigned to oversee both “squads” of detectives.

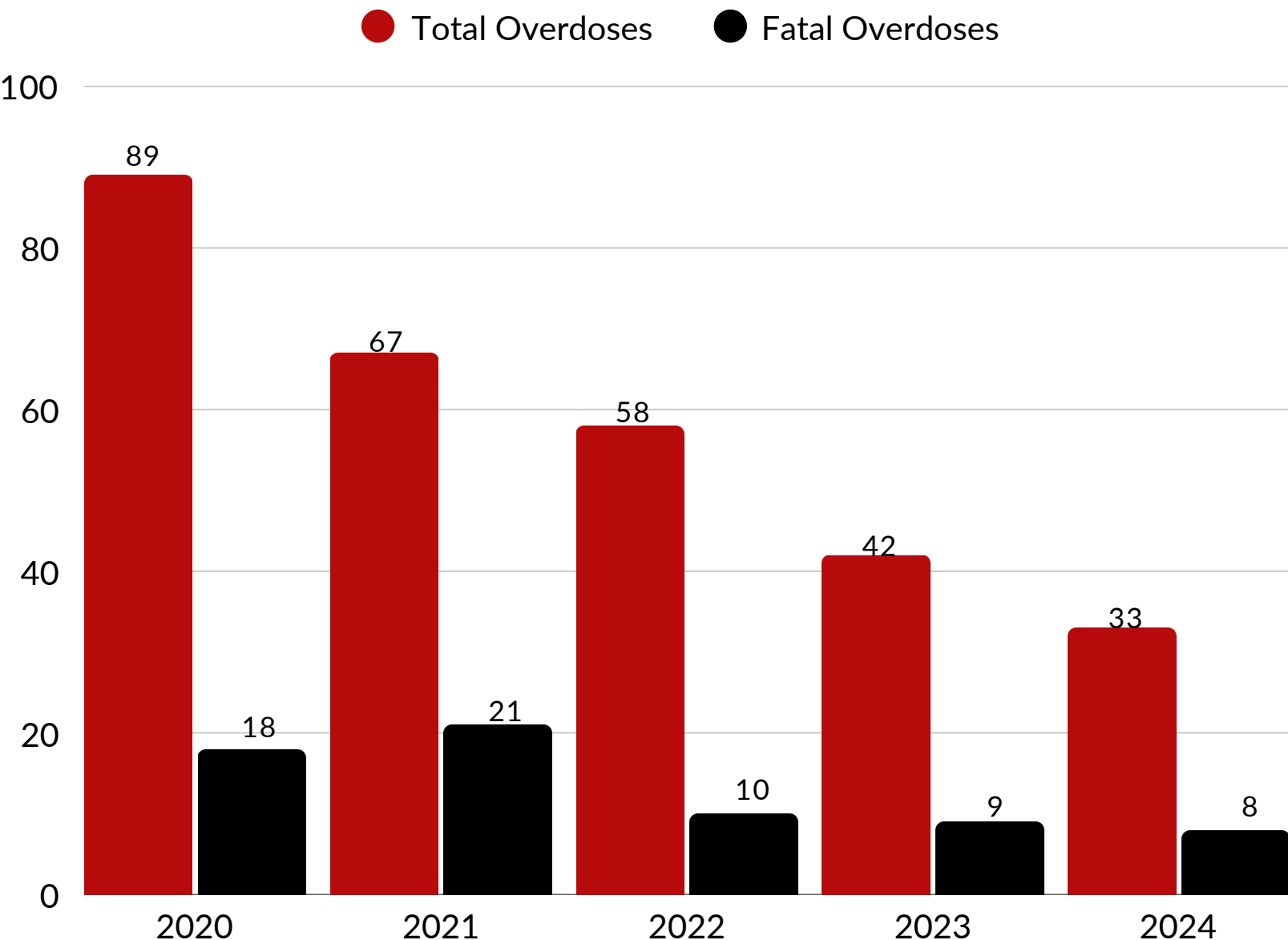

Narcotics and Vice Unit

The Lakewood Police Department has one Lieutenant and four Detectives assigned to the Narcotics and Vice Unit. They maintain strong relationships with Federal , State, and Local partners to investigate and prosecute narcotics related violations. All police officers of the Lakewood Police Department are issued and trained to administer the lifesaving drug Narcan to those that overdose on opiates.



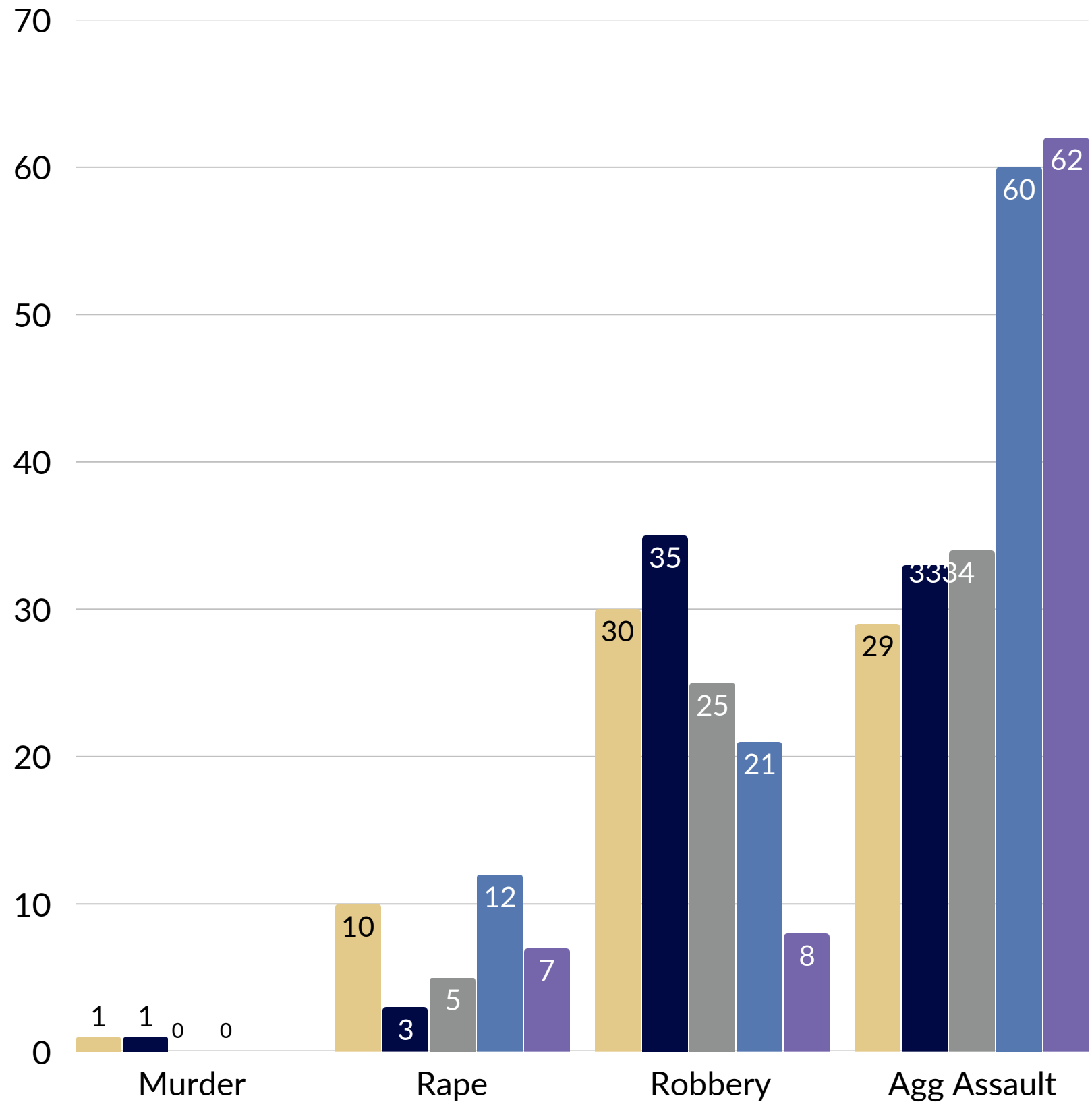
Crime Statistics

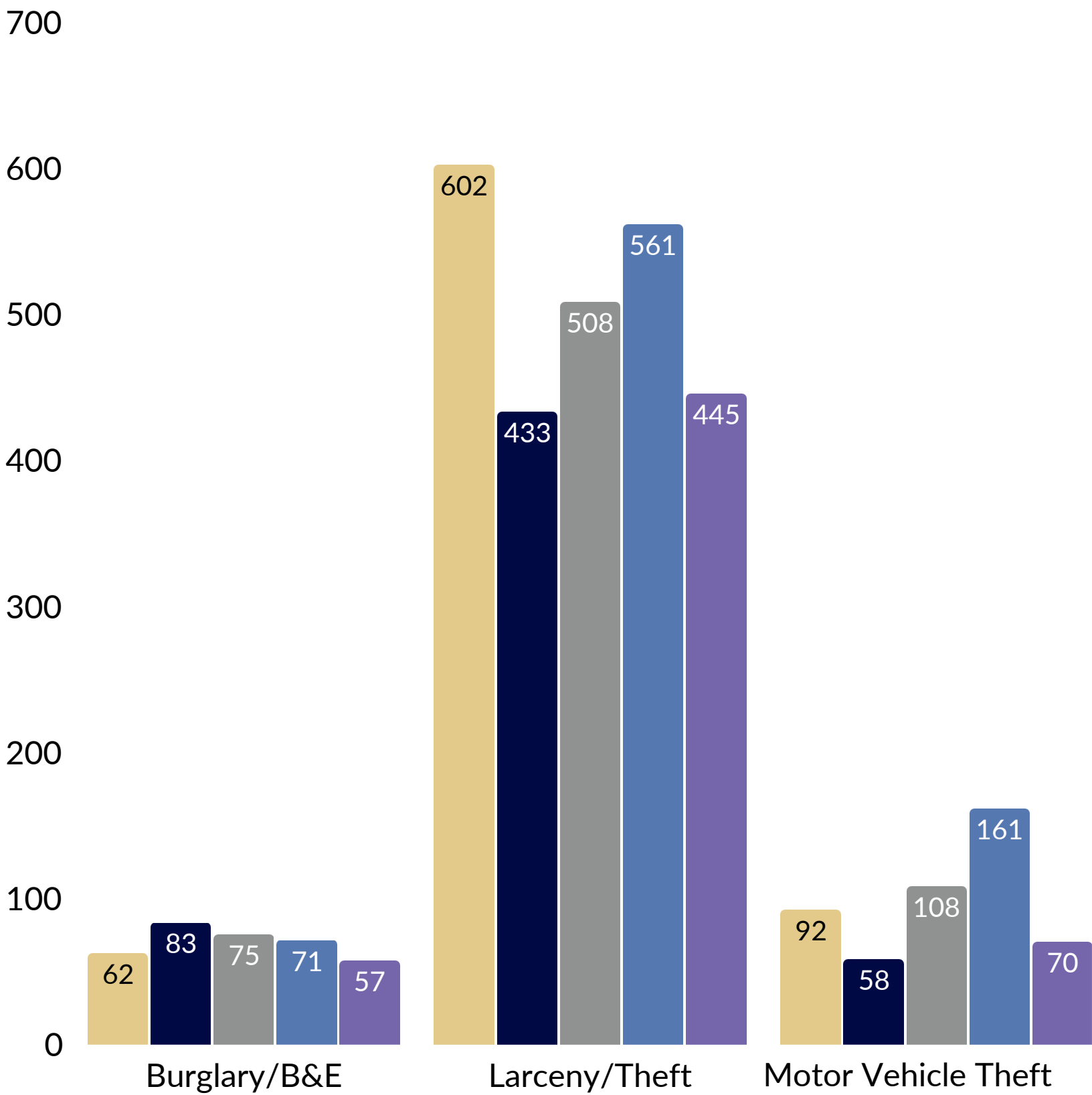
Violent Crime Total

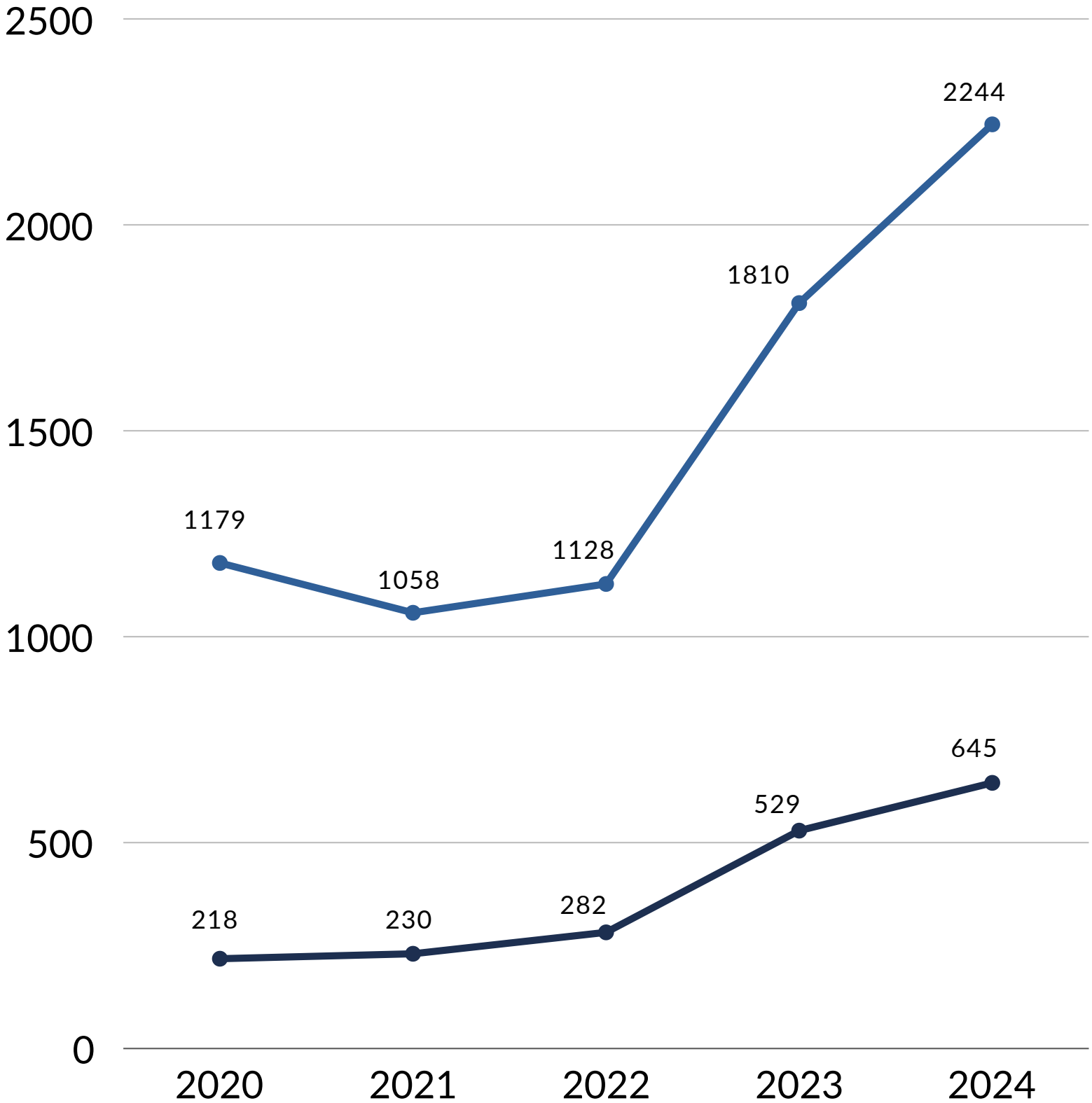
Property Crime Total

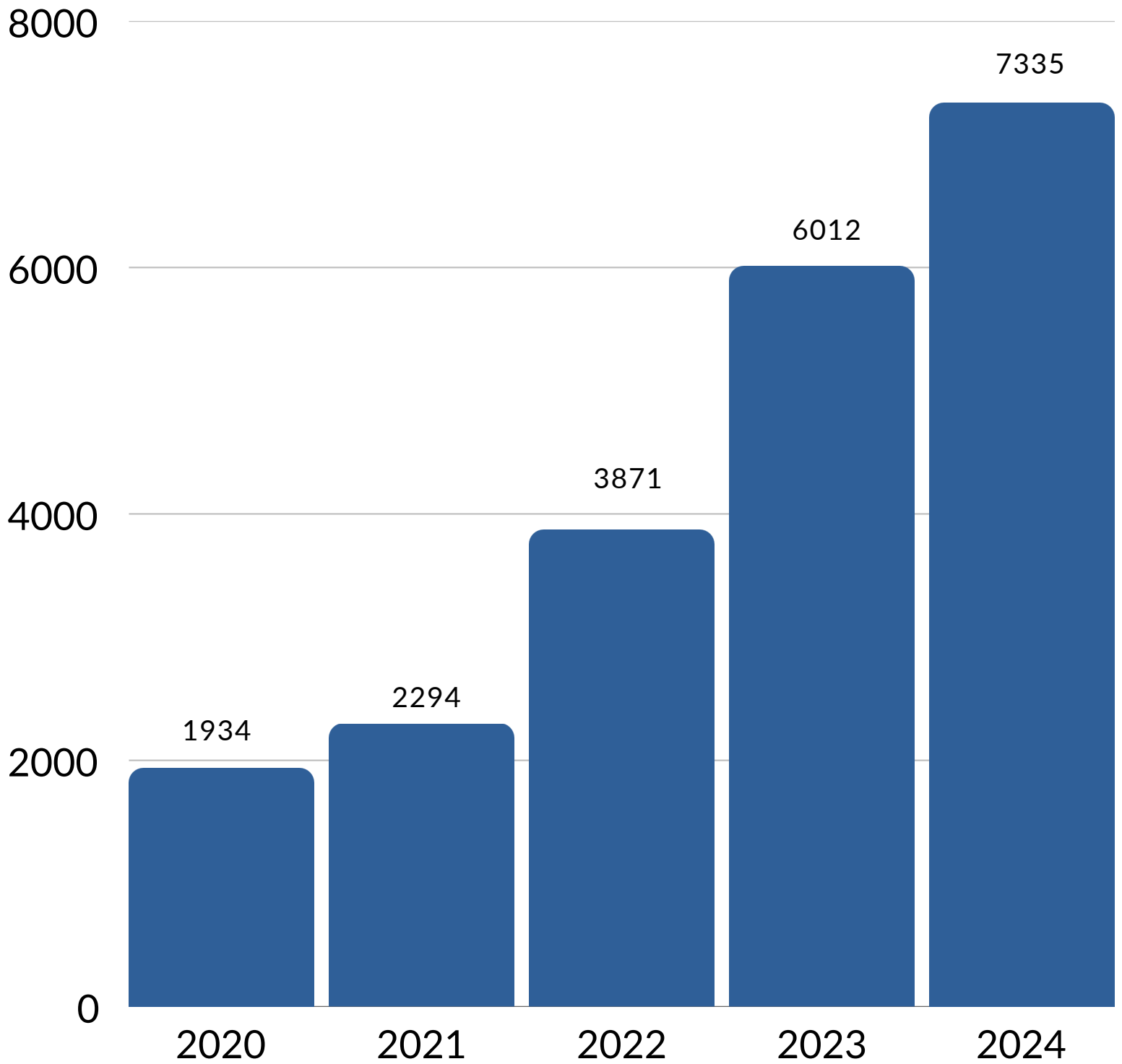

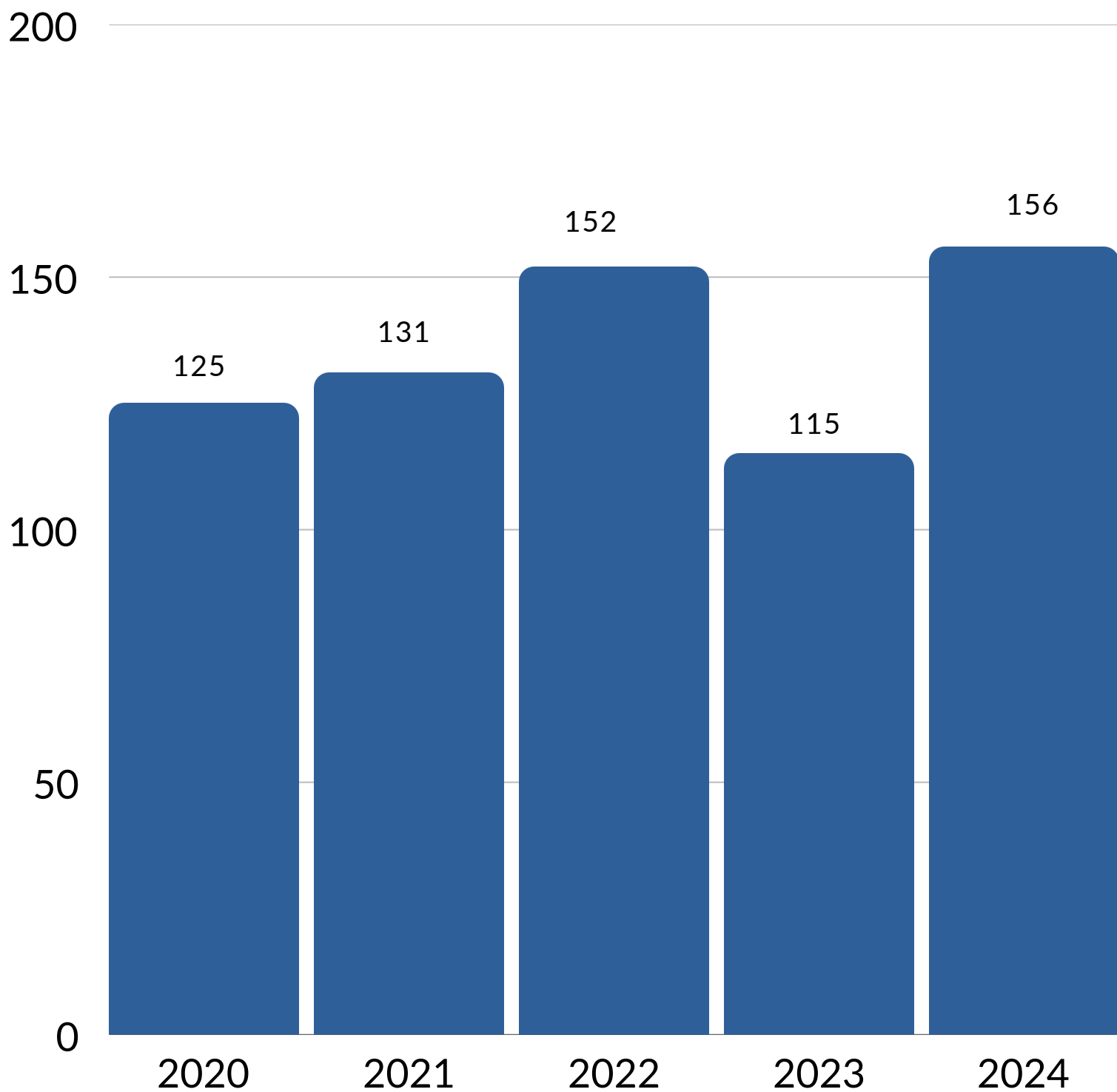

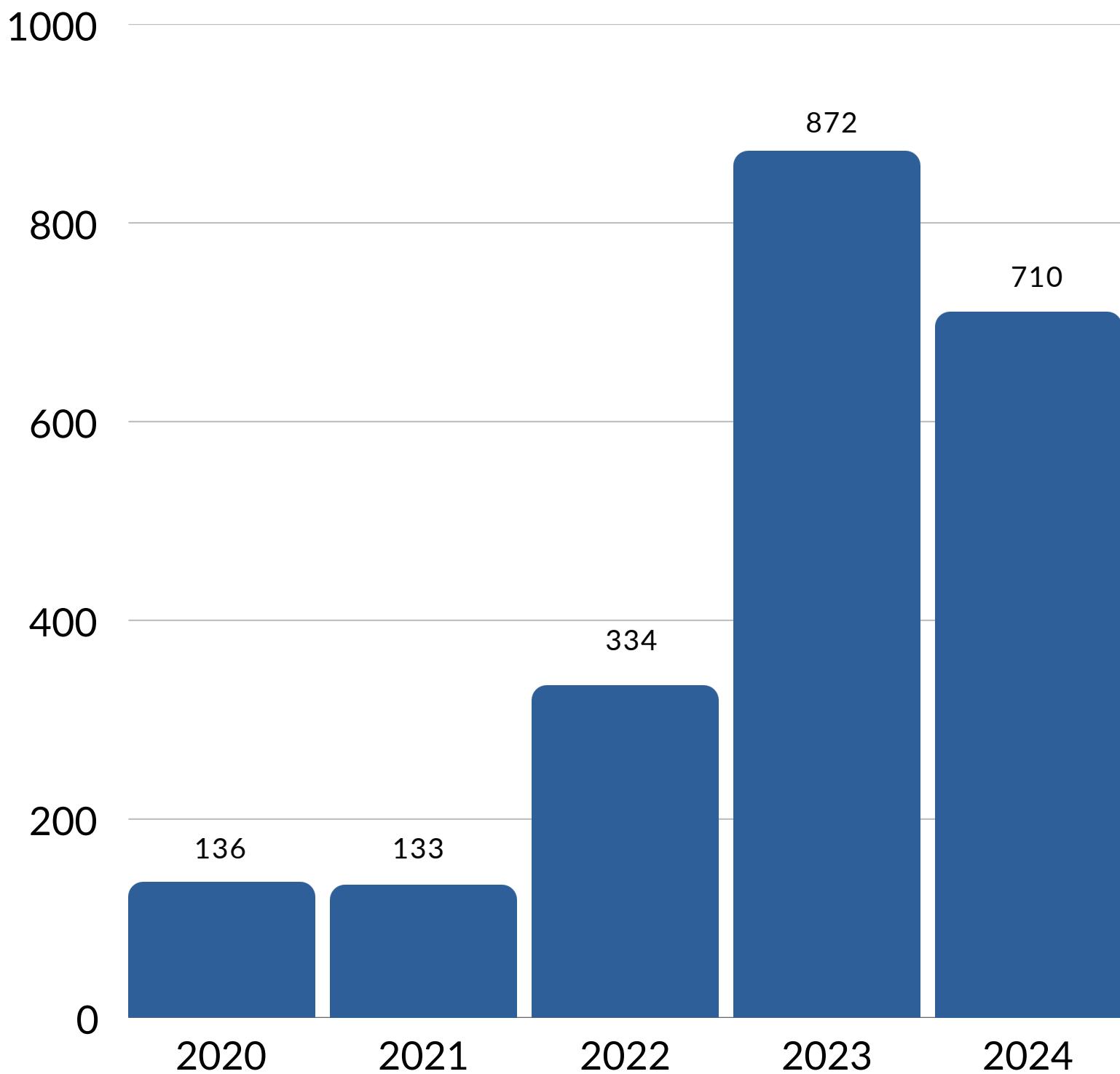
Traffic Arrests



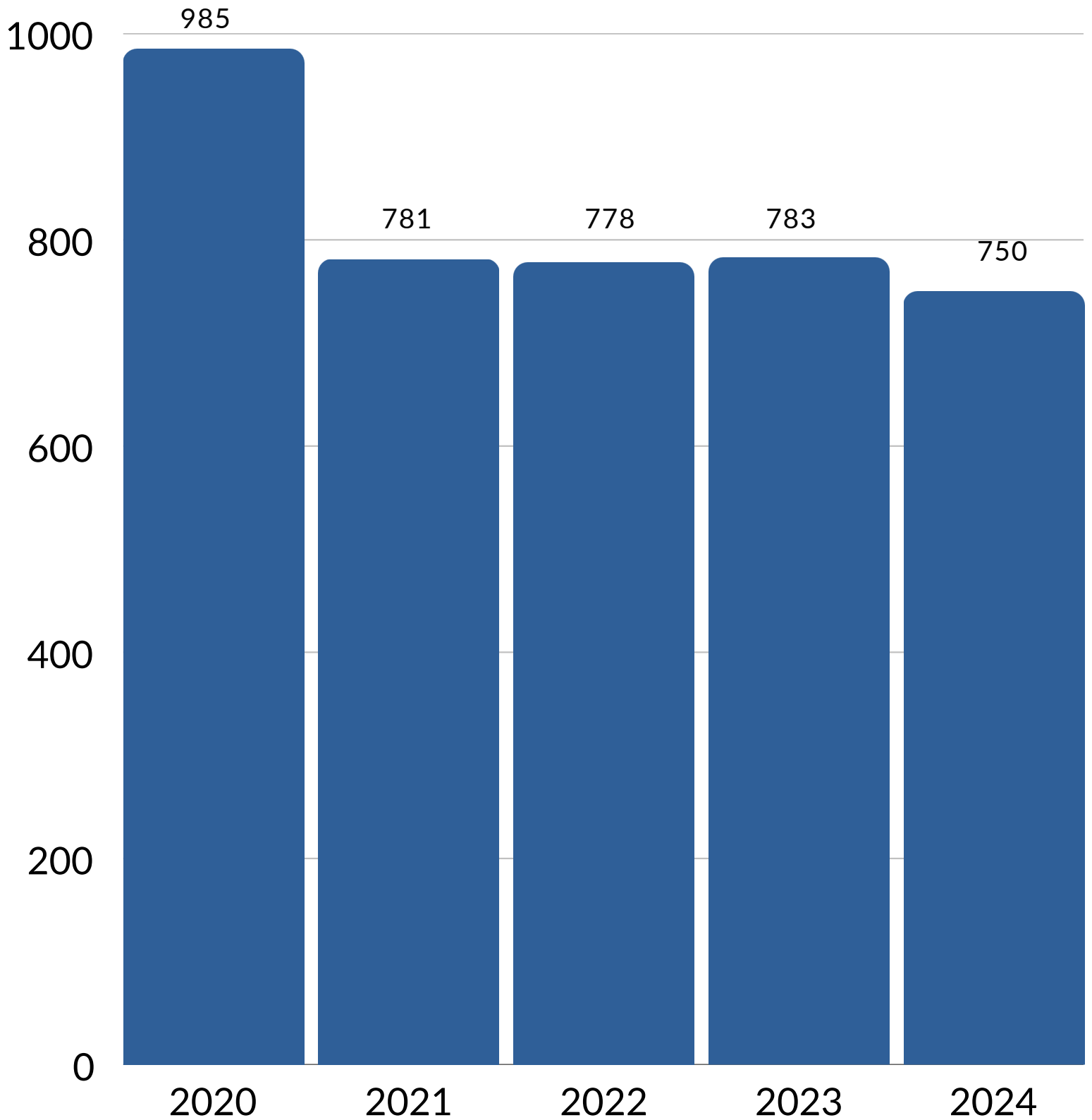
OVI Arrests



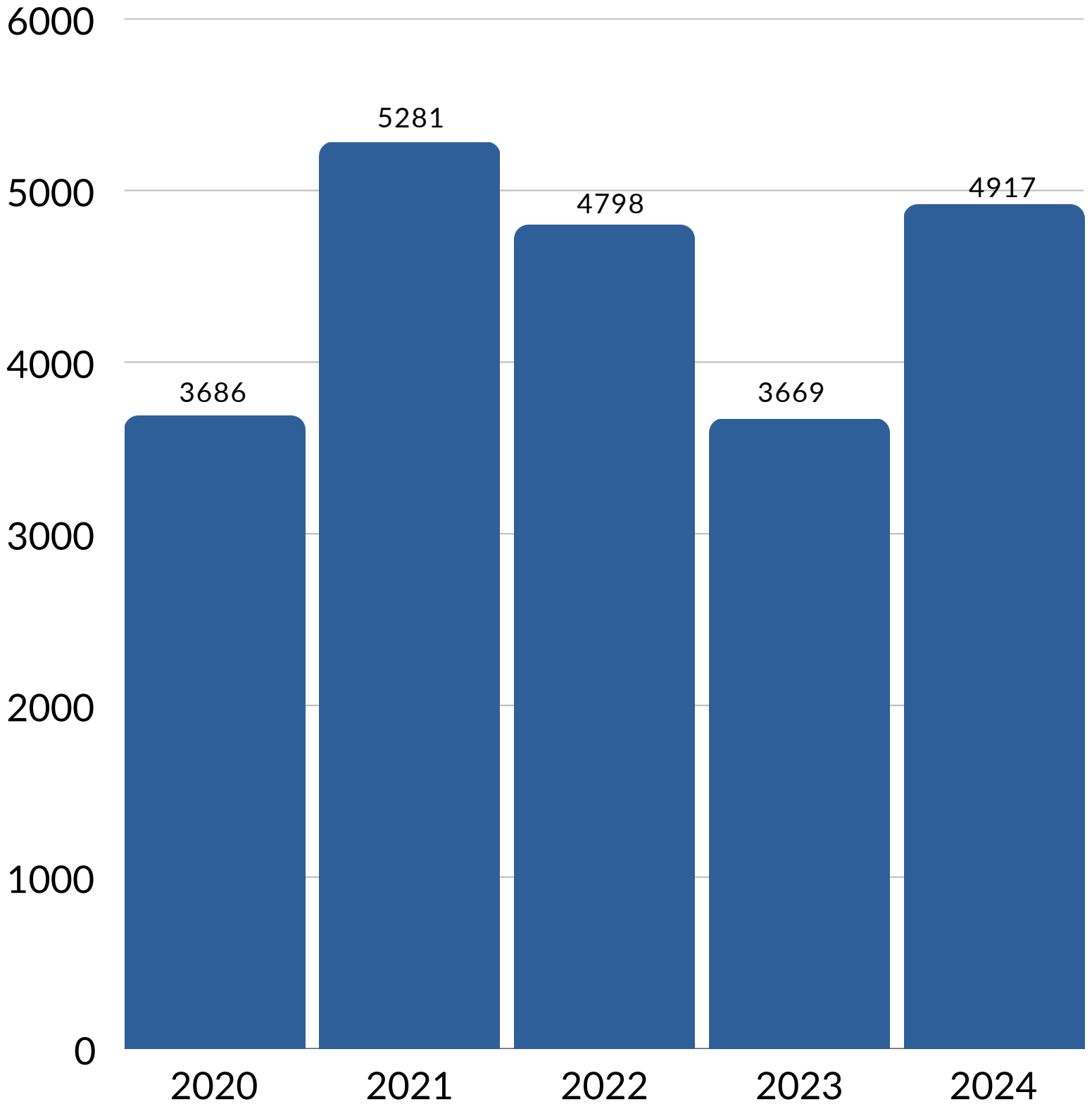
Radar Citations



Traffic Crashes



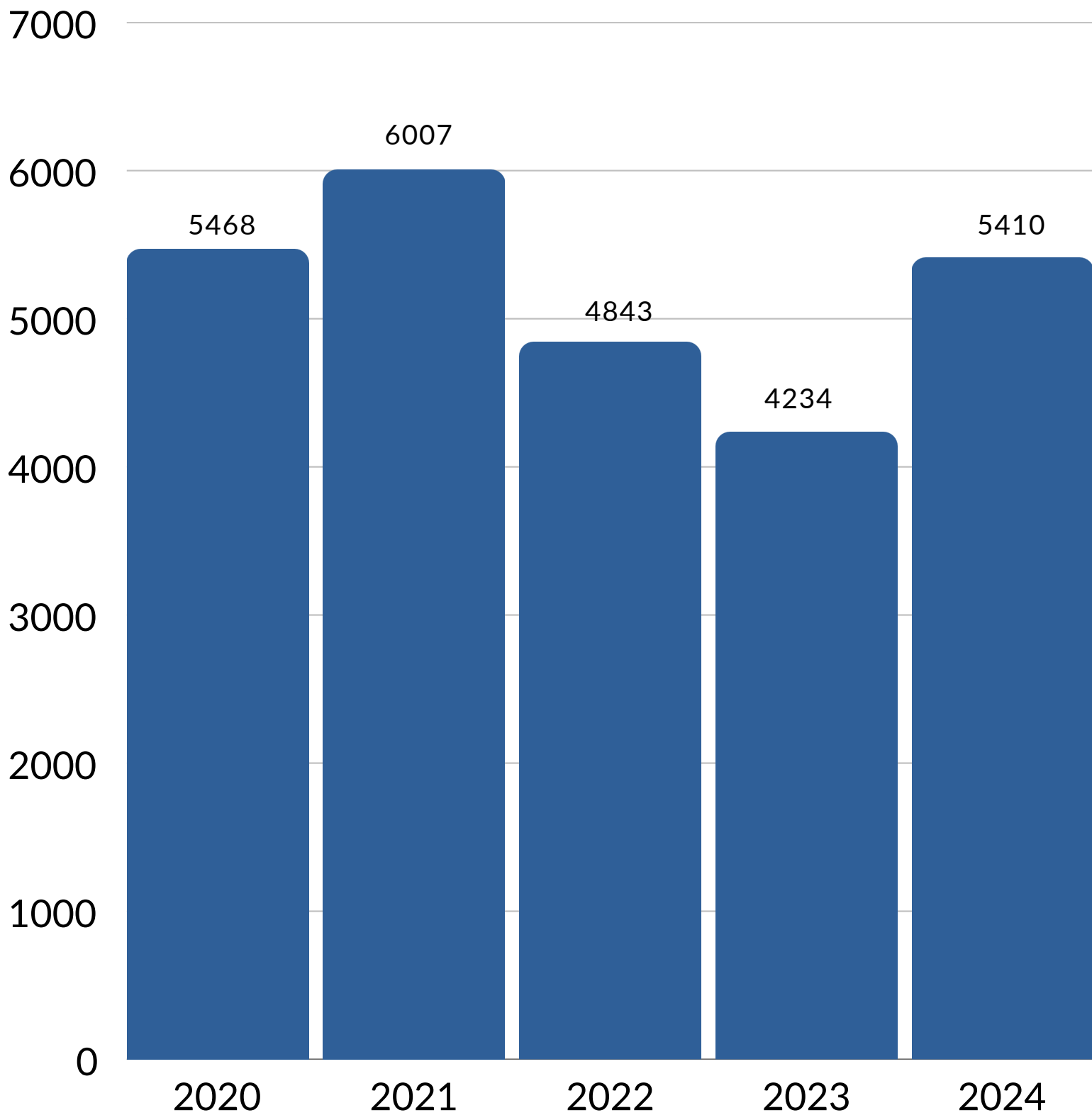
Parking Tickets (Non Meter)



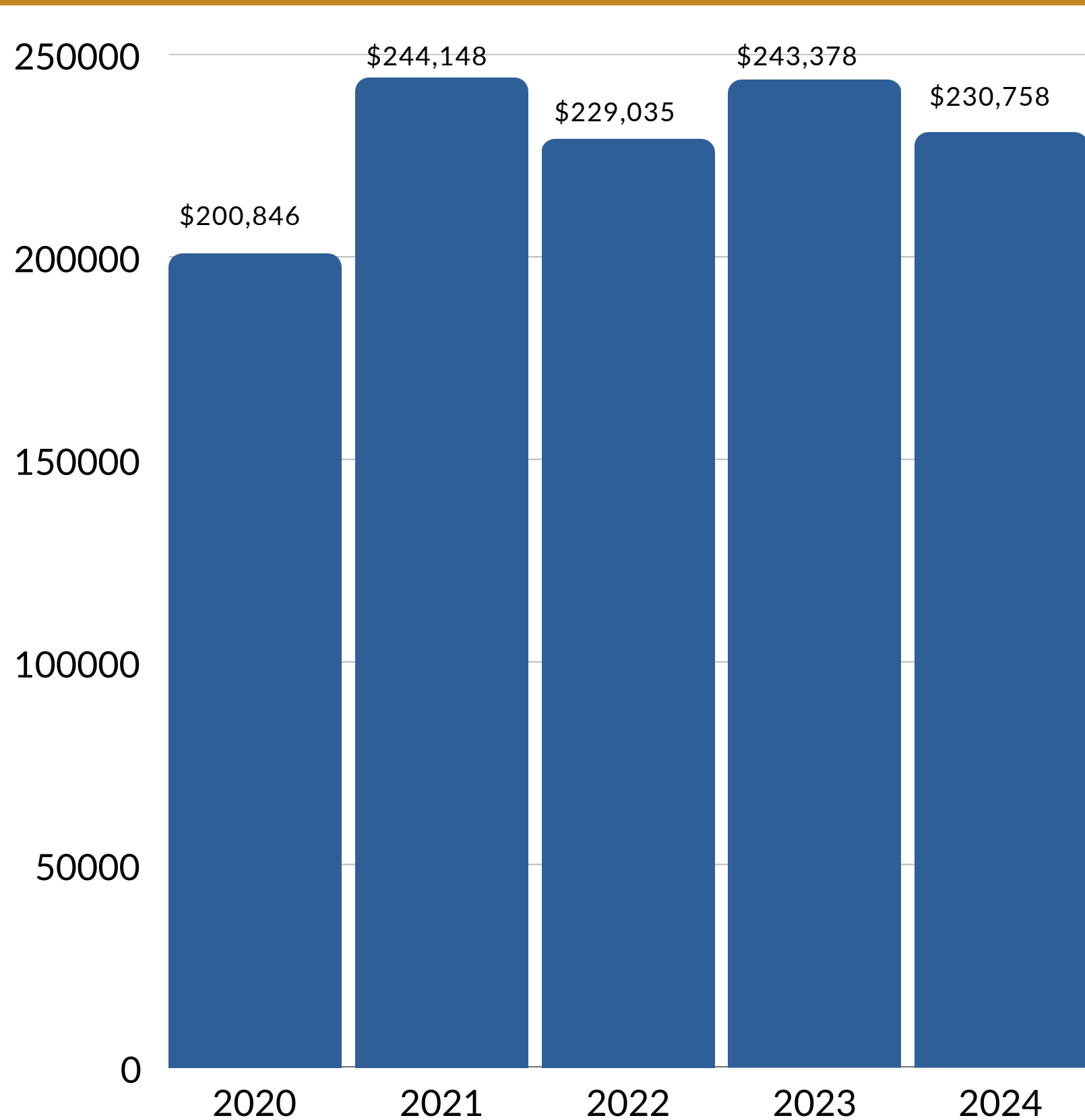
Parking Enforcement Unit

The Parking Enforcement Unit is responsible for enforcing parking violations in City owned lots as well as metered spaces on the street. They conduct maintenance on the meters to ensure that they are functioning properly. The proceeds collected from the metered lots and spaces pay for the personnel in the unit, their equipment, as well as improvements. The unit is supervised by the Special Operations Lieutenant.

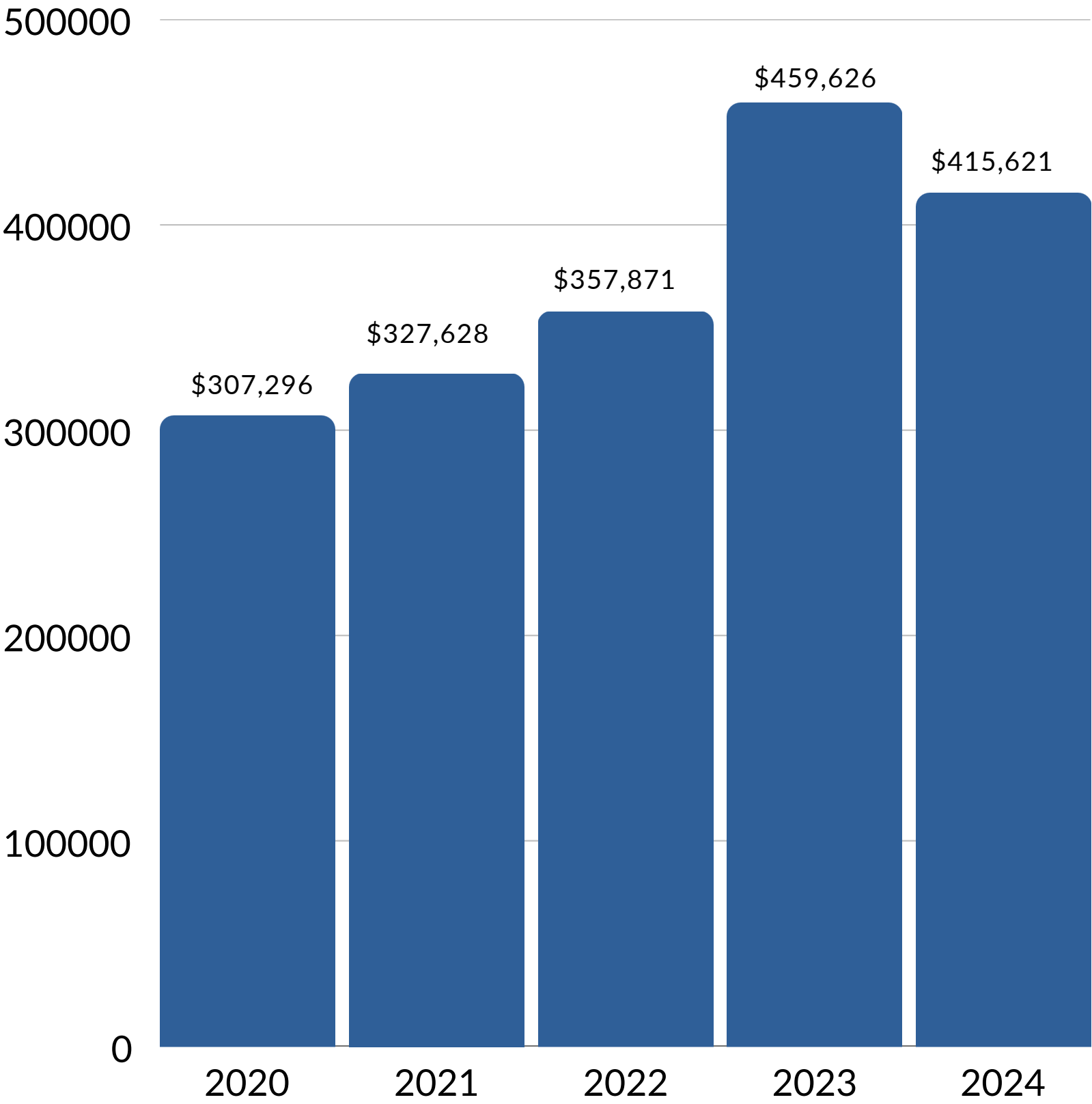
Parking Tickets (Meter)

Administrative Division

The Administrative Division is where most of our non-sworn personnel are found. These employees include our Dispatchers, Correction Officers, Animal Control Officers, and support personnel. These employees are supervised by the Administrative Division Commander.

Lakewood City Jail

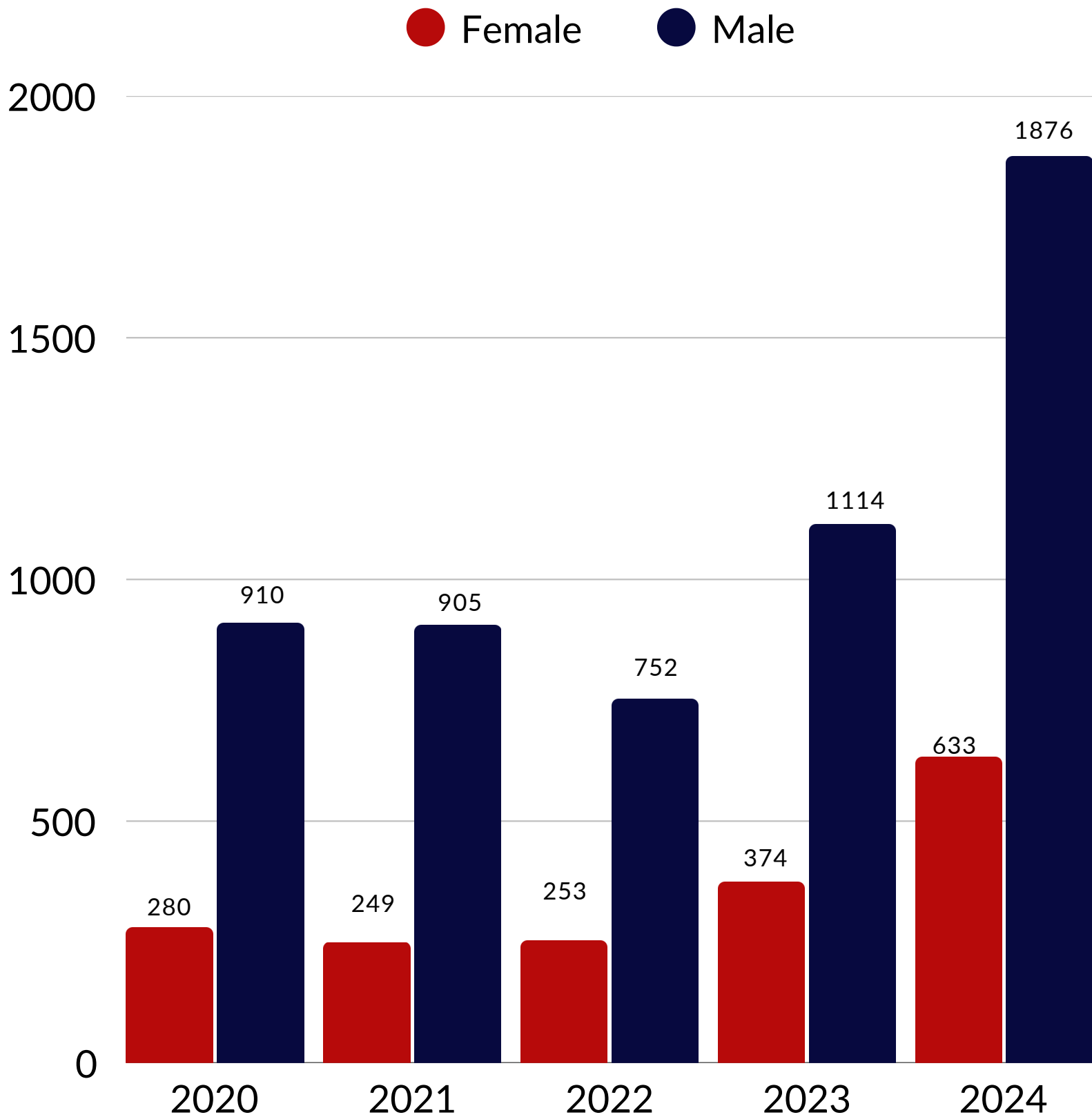
The Lakewood Police Department's Jail is a 12 day facility meant to house prisoners on a temporary basis. It is staffed 24 hours a day by two full time Correction Officers, and when they are not on duty, the Patrol Division staffs the Jail with specialty trained police officers.

In 2022 the City of Lakewood's cost to house prisoners at alternative facilities drastically increased because Cuyahoga County Jail would no longer receive the bulk of prisoners who were sentenced for misdemeanors under state code.

The City of Lakewood was reimbursed for the jail costs.

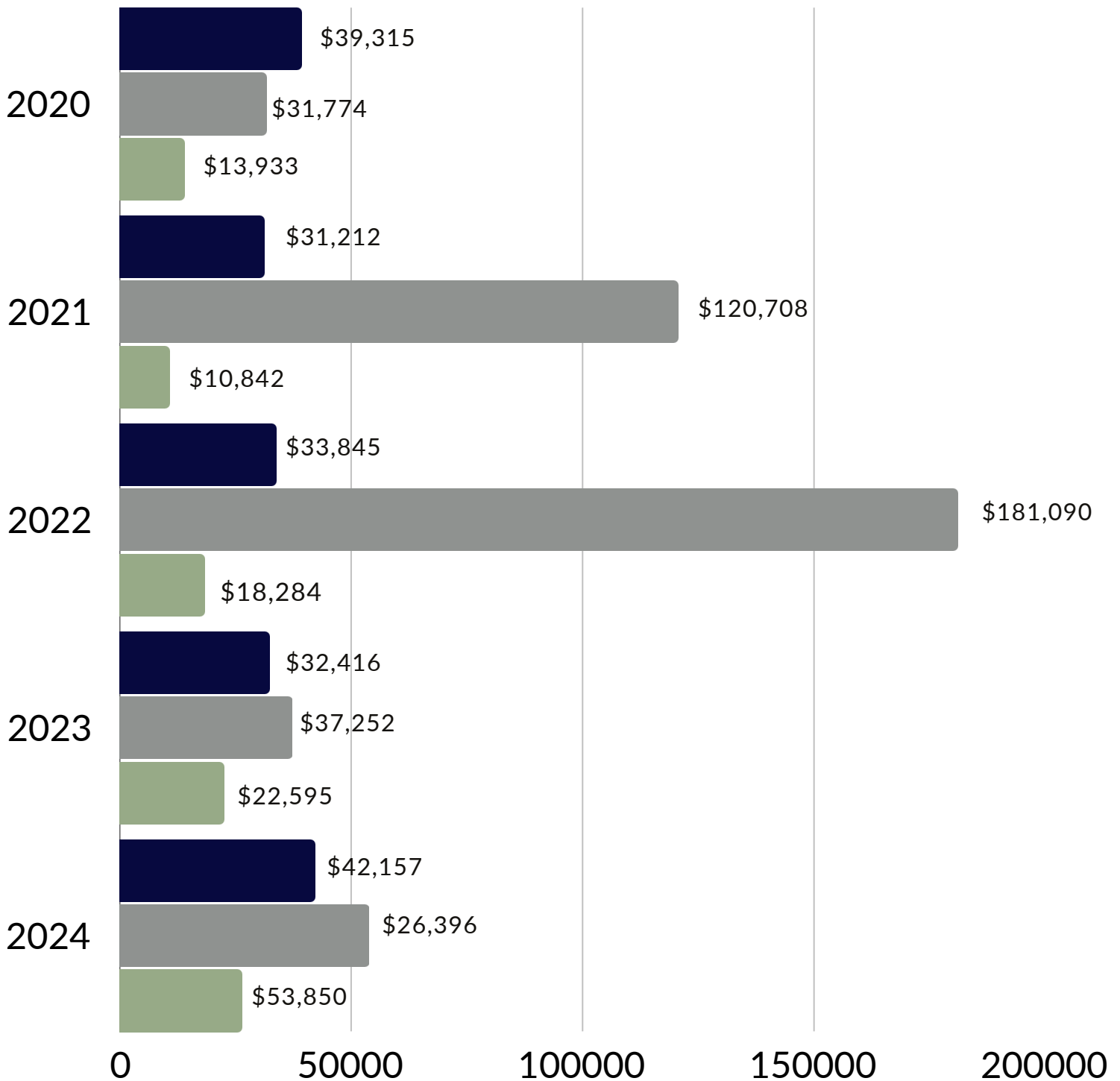
The total amount was approximately \$137,000. The city had been reimbursed \$37,000 in 2023. They received \$100,000 from Cuyahoga County and a resolution was passed by Lakewood City Council on 05/24/24.

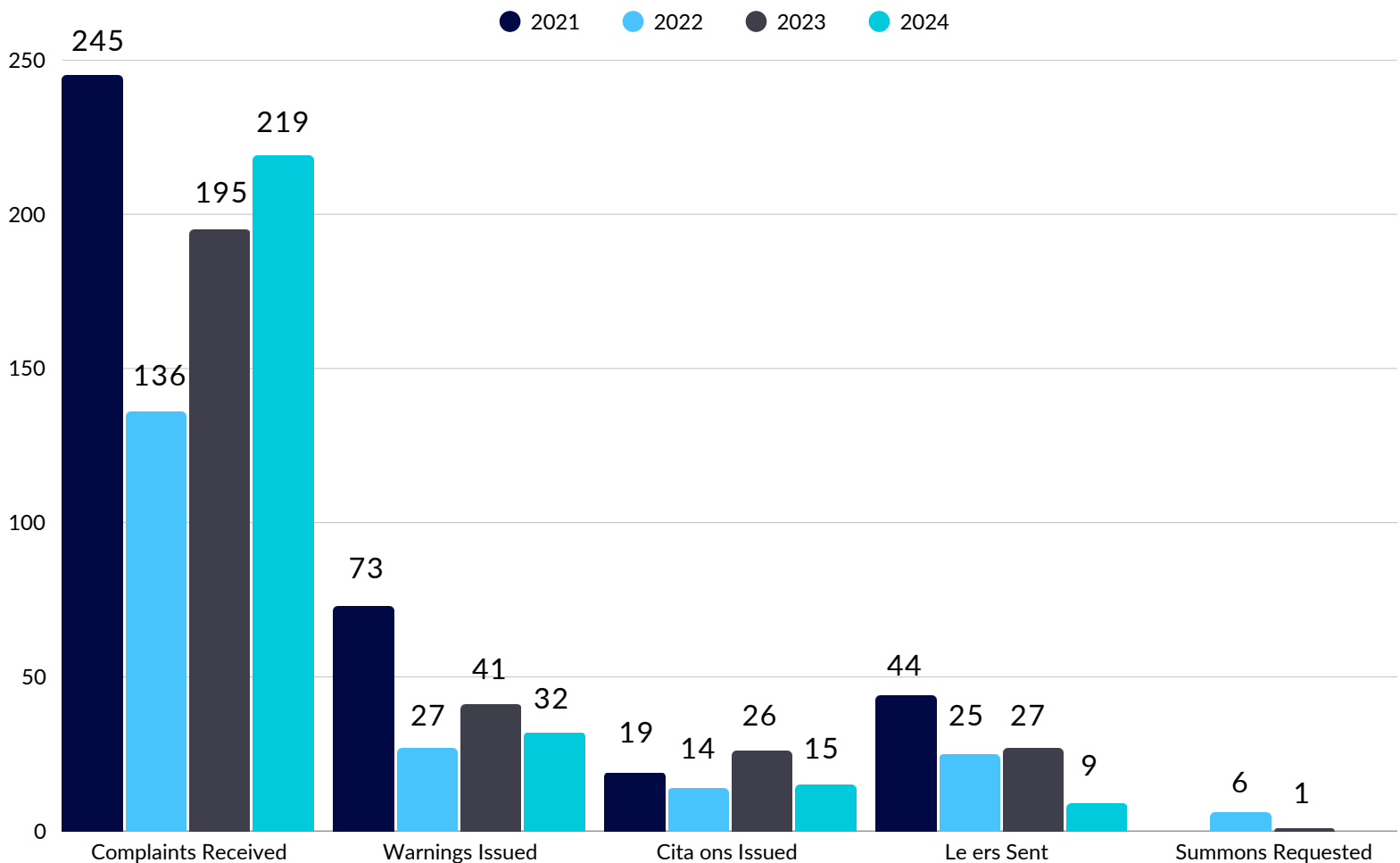

Animal Control Officers

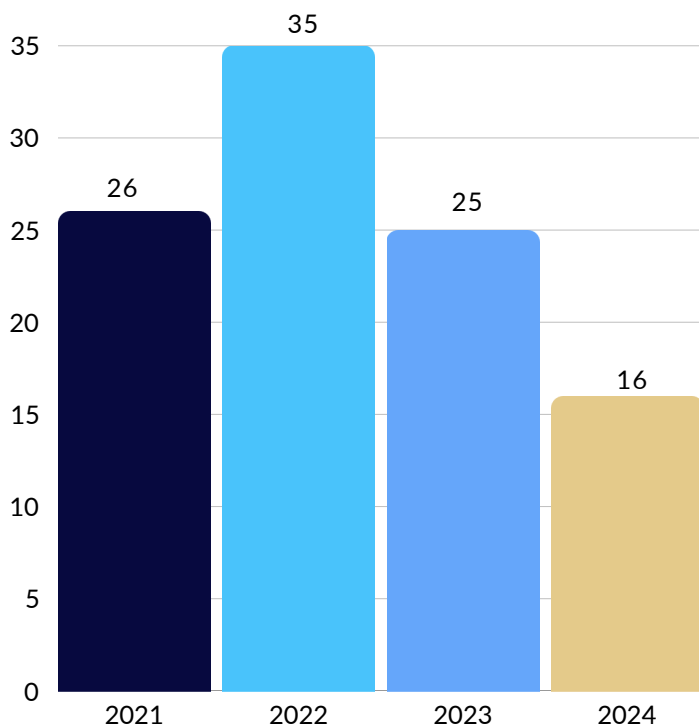
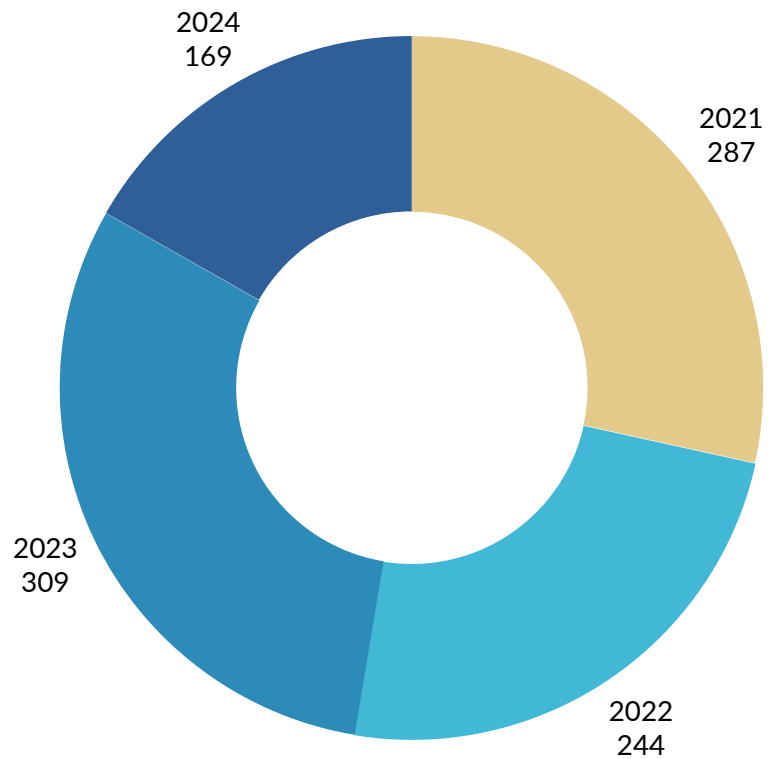
The Lakewood Police Department's Animal Control Officers respond to calls for service regarding animal cruelty, animal noise disturbances, animal bites, and any other situation involving animals. The Animal Control Officers work with county agencies and citizens groups to reduce nuisance complaints and to find new homes for stray and abandoned pets.

Dead Animal Pickup 2021 - 2024



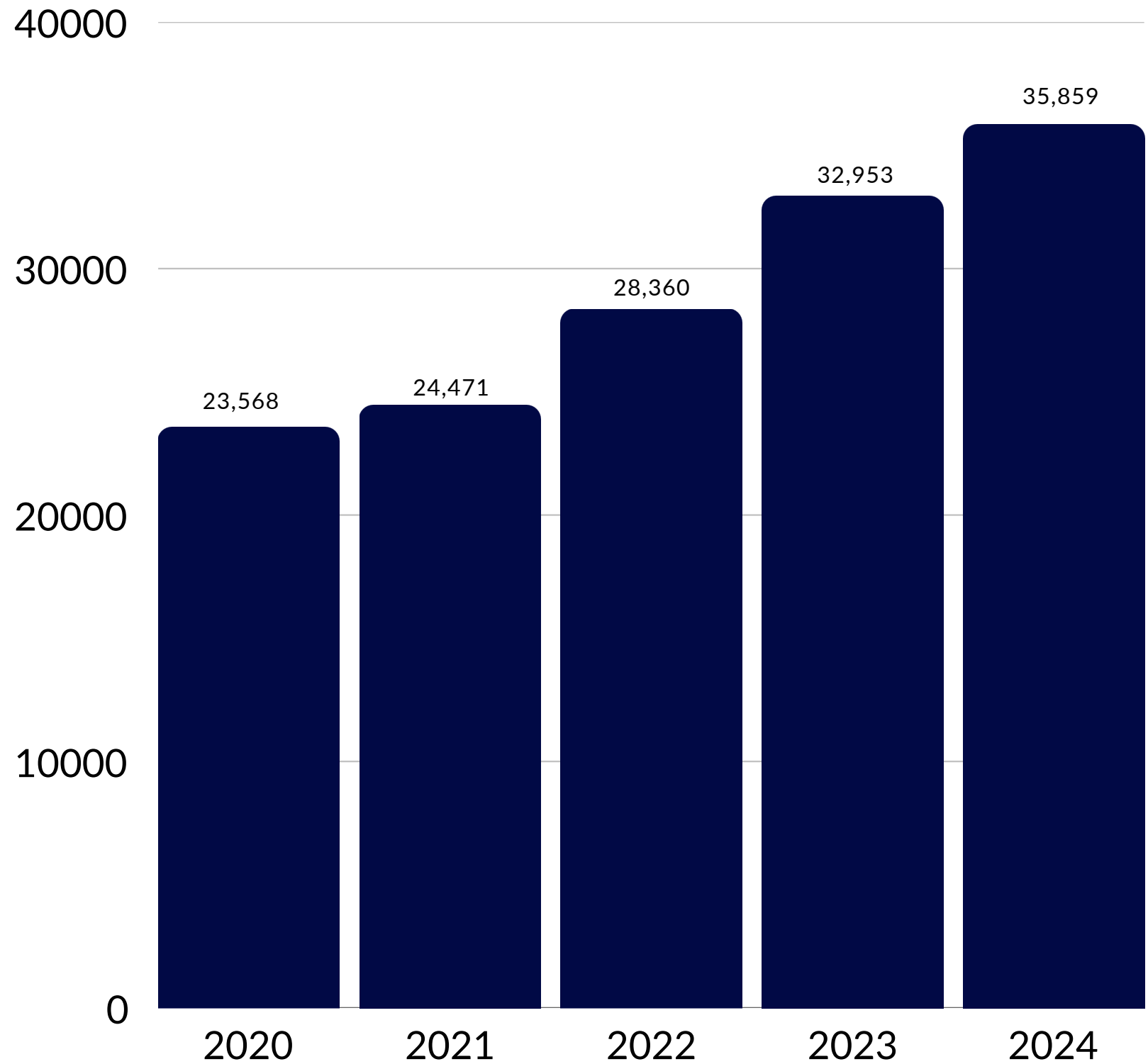
Animal Bite Investigations 2021 - 2024

Emergency Dispatch Center

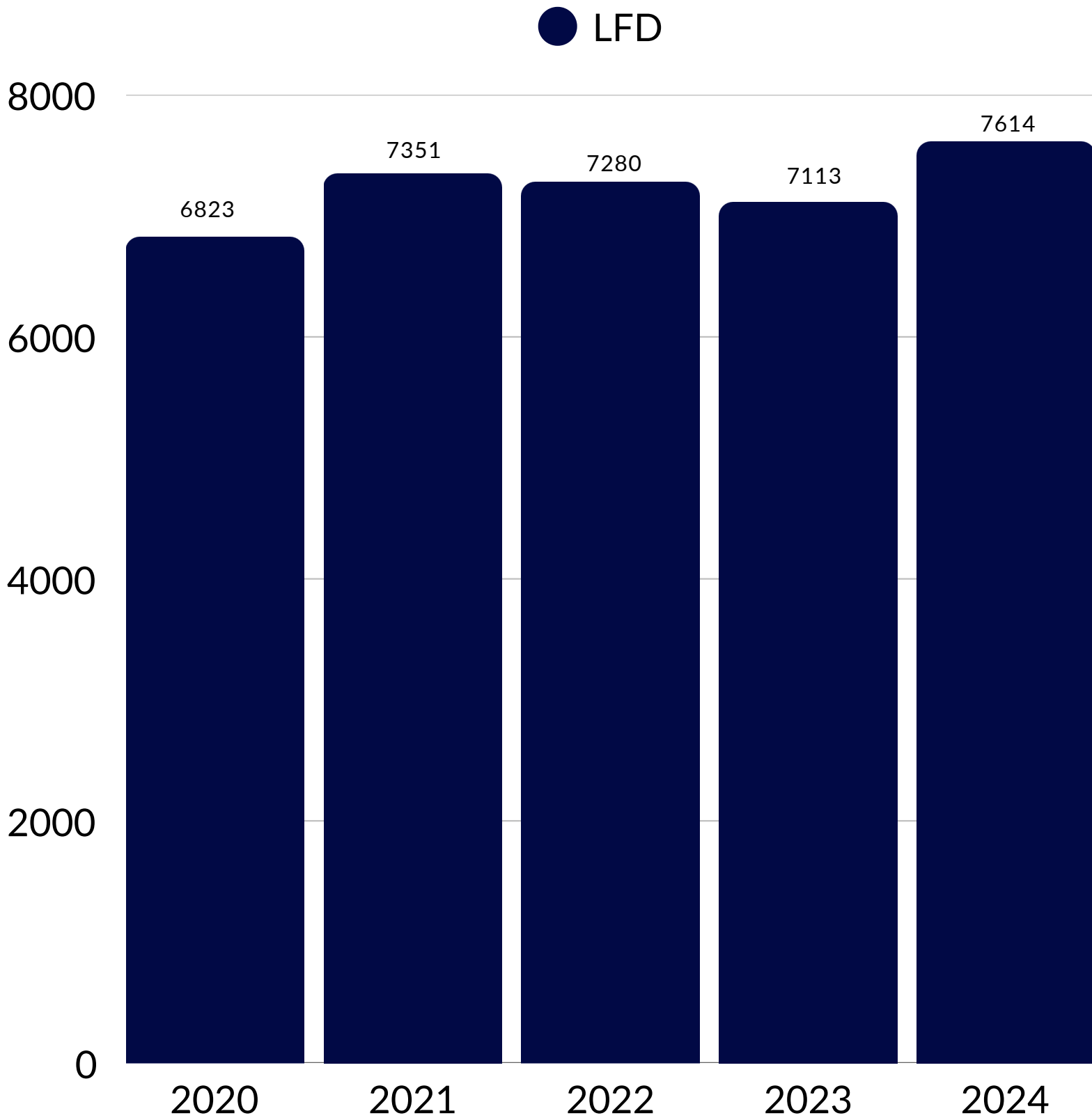
The Lakewood Police Department's Emergency Dispatch center is staffed 24 hours a day by civilian Dispatchers who have received specialized training in answering calls for assistance from the public for Police, Fire, and EMS services. The Dispatchers determine which public safety forces get sent to a particular call and they gather critical information which is relayed to the responding personnel. Our Dispatch center provides dedicated service to the citizens of Lakewood (we are not part of a regionalized Dispatch Center.) There are currently 12 full time dispatchers who work a 12 hour shift schedule.

Total Calls For Police

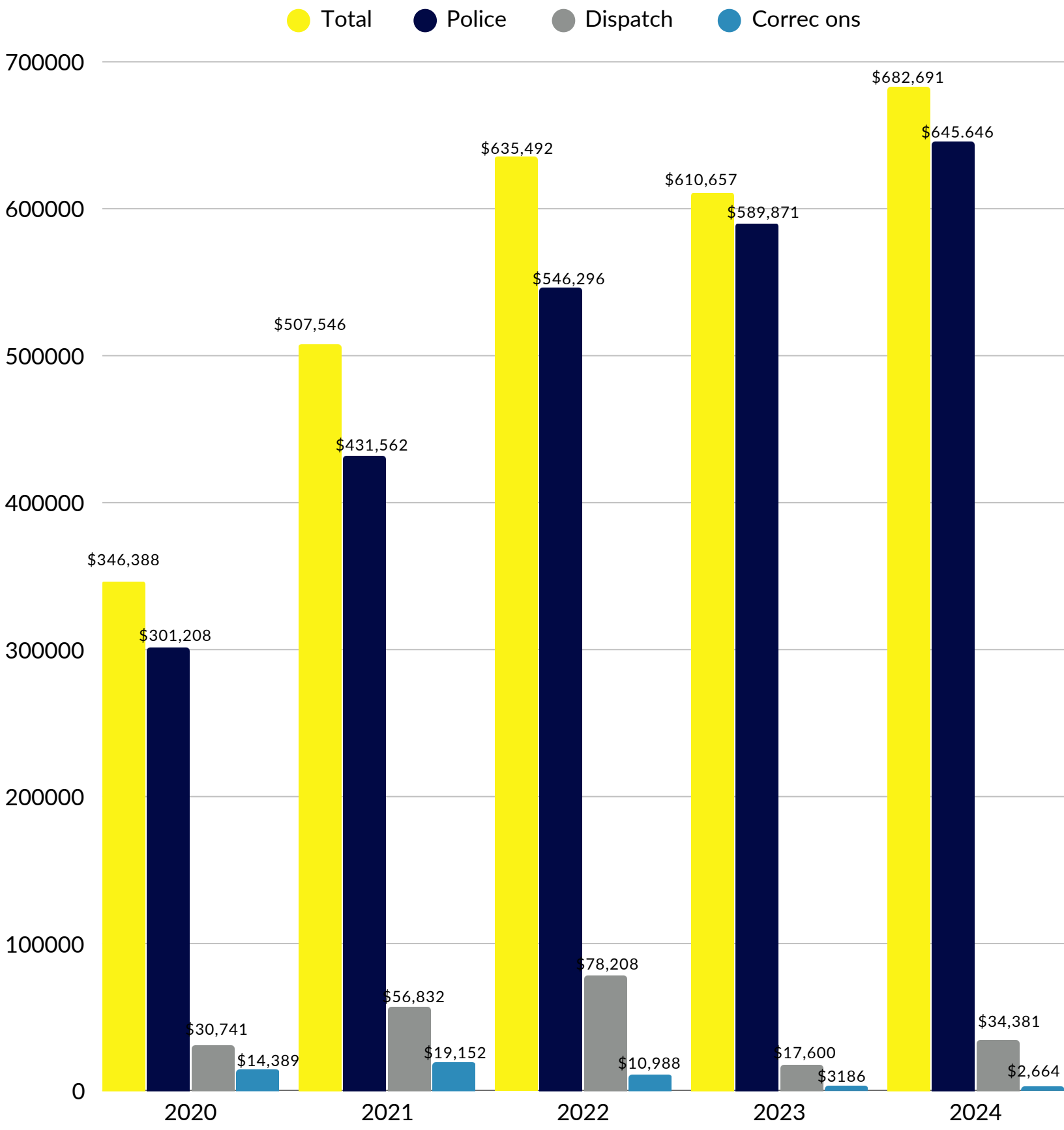

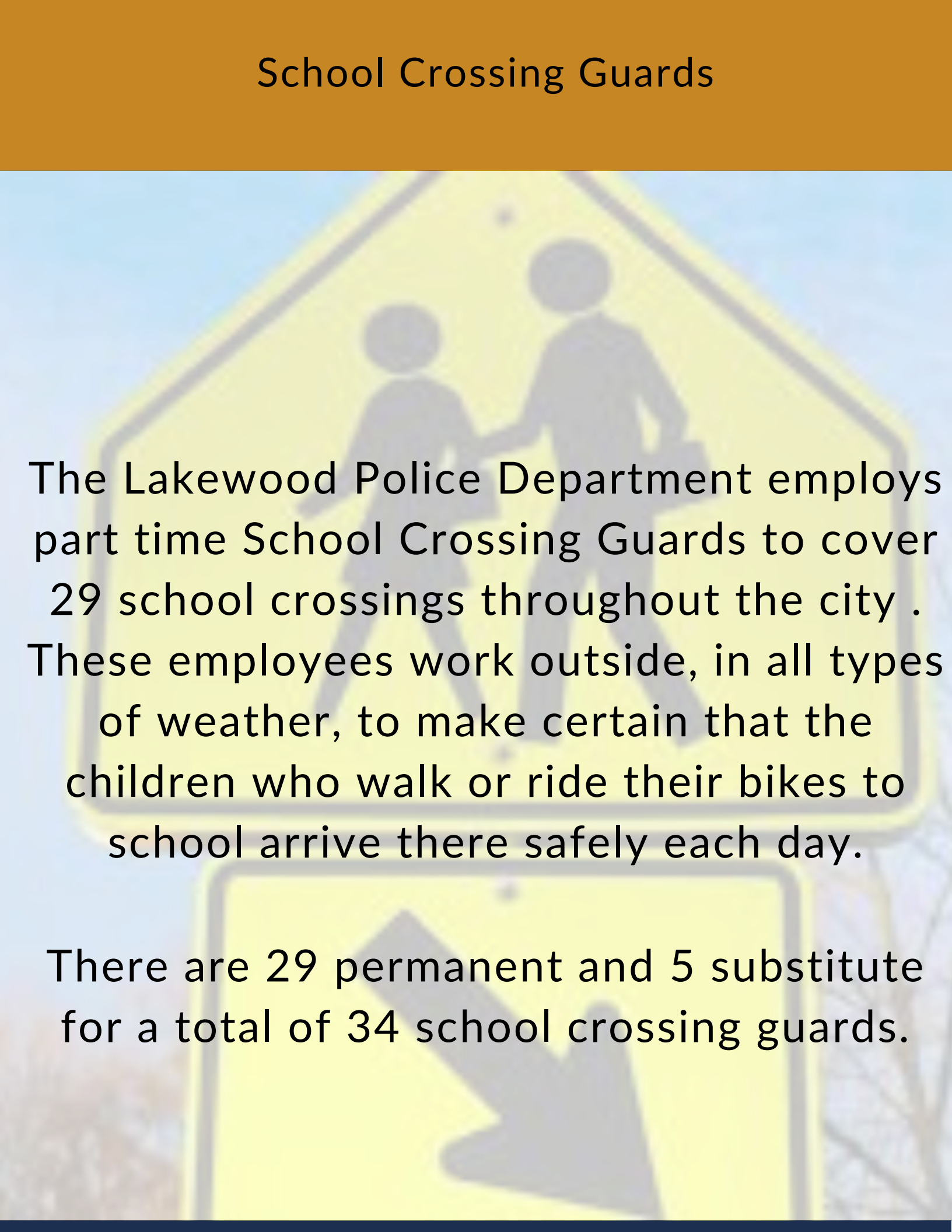
Total Calls For Fire & EMS

School Crossing Guards



The Lakewood Police Department employs part time School Crossing Guards to cover 29 school crossings throughout the city . These employees work outside, in all types of weather, to make certain that the children who walk or ride their bikes to school arrive there safely each day.

There are 29 permanent and 5 substitute for a total of 34 school crossing guards.

Auxiliary Police Unit

The Lakewood Auxiliary Police Unit's members volunteer their time and energy to assist the Lakewood Police Department at public events and in emergency conditions. Auxiliary Police Officers are also able to "ride along" with our sworn officers on patrol.
